Enclosed please find one (1) item, which the Joint Fiscal Office has received from the Administration.

JFO #3200: \$1,105,839.00 to the Department of Public Safety, VT Emergency Management from the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Funds for the repair and replacement of facilities affected during the severe storm and flooding event in Addison County from August 3-5, 2023. Funds cover 100% of the management cost and 75% of the damage estimate. The 25% State match will utilize \$151,714.00 of state Emergency Relief and Assistance Funds (ERAF) with the remainder supplied by the local applicants. [Received April 29, 2024]

Dear Mr. President:

Under the provisions of Section 401 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5207 (Stafford Act), and implemented by 44 C.F.R. § 206.36, I request you declare a Major Disaster for the State of Vermont for heavy rainfall and severe flooding that occurred in Addison and Rutland Counties August 3-5, 2023. I'm requesting Public Assistance for Addison and Rutland Counties and Hazard Mitigation Assistance statewide.

This flooding occurred as a direct extension and aftermath of the catastrophic flooding of July 7-21, 2023, which has been declared as DR4720-VT. The Vermont State Emergency Operations Center remained in full activation July 7, 2023 through August 5, 2023.

State Emergency Operations Center Activation:

Partners participating in the ongoing SEOC activation included: Agency of Agriculture, Agency of Human Services, Agency of Transportation, Agency of Digital Services, Public Service Department, Radio Technology Services, Department of Health, Vermont State Police, Division of Fire Safety, Department of Labor, Buildings and General Services, Agency of Education, Urban Search and Rescue, Department of Environmental Conservation, Department Forest Parks & Recreation, Vermont National Guard, American Red Cross, SerVermont and Vermont-211.

Impact Summary

Fortunately, there were no casualties, injuries, or missing persons reported as a result of this storm. Critical infrastructure damage occurred at the Middlebury Wastewater Treatment Facility. There was severe damage to the municipal road network in Hancock, Vermont.

Addison County:

On August 3, 2023, the Town of Middlebury received over six inches of rain within a three-hour window. According to NOAA Atlas 14

(https://hdsc.nws.noaa.gov/pfds/pfds map cont.html?bkmrk=vt), this equates to a 1000+ year storm (0.1% chance of occurrence in the region). It is important to note that event came on the heels of excessive precipitation which began on July 7, 2023 which was declared as VT-4720-DR, and has a FEMA-determined incident period through July 21, 2023. The July storms resulted in heavy rainfall amounts of over five inches of rain in a 12-hour period (this type of rainfall is classified as a 100-year storm). Due to the track of the polar jet-stream in the days following the storms of July, Vermont soils did not have a chance to dry out, Vermont received successive rains, and soils remained saturated. The Middlebury Wastewater Treatment Facility recorded 23 days of rain recorded during the month of July, totaling 10.92 inches. East Middlebury and Ripton received even higher amounts.

Because soils were so saturated and it rained so much so fast in Middlebury, sheet run-off caused extensive flooding. More than 250 Middlebury households called Vermont-211 to report flood damage, mostly to basements including many with damage to furnaces and electrical systems.

Bridport reported two washed out roads and major flooding issues. Cornwall reported major flooding issues and three washed out roads. Other notable damage locations included New Haven and Ripton. Several buildings flooded in Starksboro. Weybridge reported major flooding with three roads washed out, flooded basements and lightning strikes at a campground which caused a fire requiring emergency response.

Hardest hit of all the rural Addison County communities was Hancock, situated in the mountains, where major damages to multiple roads far exceeded local resources.



Rutland County:

The City of Rutland experienced major flooding issues. Vermont swift-water rescue teams deployed to evacuate approximately fifty individuals to shelters. Damage included 5 flooded roads and flooded basements in several homes.

The local liaisons were activated on August 4-5, 2023, to report damages. Results of local liaison reporting are summarized in this map:



On August 11, 2023, VEM Interim Director Eric Forand submitted a PDA request for August 3-8, 2023, in the counties of Addison and Rutland, for Public Assistance for the flooding which began on August 3, 2023. It was subsequently confirmed during Preliminary Damage Assessments that all the damages reported occurred during August 3-5, 2023, and so the requested incident period has been narrowed to those dates.

Demographics of Impacted Counties

Addison and Rutland counties are rural and sparsely populated. Both counties have median household incomes which are below the statewide average. Rutland's poverty rate is 10.7%, above Vermont's average of 10.3%.

Additional Factors for Consideration

The storms of the summer of 2023 have had very detrimental impacts on Vermont. The impacts of the repeated flooding include reduced tourist traffic, exhaustion of State and town road crews and emergency responders, and debris so extensive that I announced a special campaign to clean up debris piles in time for the economically vital fall foliage season.

While towns in Vermont obtain insurance through the Vermont League of Cities and Towns' Property and Casualty Intermunicipal Fund (PACIF), roads, water crossings and drainage structures are not covered, and insurance coverage is not commercially available in most cases.

State/ Local Resources for Assistance

Vermont's resource referral hotline, Vermont-211, took damage reports from impacted residents. As noted above, more than 250 Middlebury households called Vermont-211to report flood damages incurred on August 3-5, 2023.

Vermont's Emergency Relief and Assistance Fund (ERAF) provides the non-federal share of declared disasters for eligible municipal Public Assistance applicants and is funded through the Vermont General Fund. This event will add to the need for additional ERAF appropriations to be allocated from the General Fund through Budget Adjustment when the legislature reconvenes.

Vermont Disaster History

The impacts of this storm clearly exceed the resources of the State of Vermont. Since 2013, Vermont has experienced 13 federally declared and numerous non-declared disasters: DR4120 (May 2013 flooding), DR4140 (June-July 2013 flooding), DR4163 (December 2013 ice storm), DR4178 (April 2014 flooding), DR4207 (December 2014 severe winter storm), DR4232 (June 9, 2015 flooding), DR4330 (June-July 2017 flooding), DR4356 (October 29-30, 2018 severe storm and flooding), DR4380 (May 4-5, 2018 severe storm), DR4445 (April 15, 2019 severe storm and flooding), DR4474 (Severe storm and flooding, October 31- November 1, 2019), DR4621 (Severe storms and flooding, July 29, 2021-July 30, 2021), DR4532 (COVID-19), DR4695 (Severe storm and flooding, Dccember 22-24, 2022) and DR4720 (Severe storms and flooding, landslides and mudslides, July 7-21, 2023).

Hazard Mitigation Damage Avoidance

Vermont and FEMA have been successful in recent years in making use of available funding via Section 404 (42 U.S. § 5170c) and Section 406 (42 U.S. § 5172).

The impacts of this flooding would have been even more devastating if not for mitigation work previously accomplished, particularly more than 140 acquisitions and removals of flood-prone structures accomplished through Hazard Mitigation Assistance since Tropical Storm Irene. The Town of Brandon in Rutland County, has been frequently cited as a hazard mitigation success story thanks to culvert upgrades in the downtown business district and buy-outs of residences in Forest Dale, a flood prone area of the community. We are committed to continuing our ongoing efforts to build resiliency and reduce flood vulnerability using Section 406 and Section 404 Hazard Mitigation.

Conclusion

For Addison and Rutland Counties of Vermont, the August 3-5, 2023 severe storms and flooding event compounded the impacts of earlier flooding and overwhelmed state and local resources. Accordingly, I request a Major Disaster Declaration under the Stafford Act for Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Assistance statewide.

Heavy Rainfall Events

August 3rd




Figure 1 - Radar estimated rainfall for the Middlebury vicinity on August 3rd, 2023.




Figure 2 - 24 hour Rainfall Maps and specific observed rainfall vales for August 3rd and August 4th, 2023

Thunderstorms developed across the Adirondacks of New York during the afternoon hours of August 3rd and moved into the Middlebury, VT vicinity around 6 pm, but then back-built across the same region before exiting around 9 pm. Rainfall rates as high as 3 inches per hour were estimated by radar and event rainfall totals of 3 to 6 inches were estimated by radar (Figure 1) and supported by ground truth observations (Figure 2).

August 4th




Figure 3 – Radar estimated rainfall for the Rutland vicinity on August 3rd, 2023.

Thunderstorms developed in the Rutland vicinity around 330 pm and remained quasistationary as other heavy rain showers and thunderstorms from New York and Addison County moved into the same area before exiting by 530 pm. Rainfall rates up to 2 inches per hour fell across the urbanized areas resulting in rapid urban flooding. Radar estimates (Figure 3) and ground truth reports (Figure 2) of 2 to 4 inches occurred in a very short period of time.

Damage assessments were performed from August 17-25, 2023, then extended through September 11, 2023 to capture the damage that occurred in the smaller towns. The validated PDA Results for Addison County totaled \$1,246,088 & Rutland County totaled \$102,485 which exceeded the State threshold (\$1,138,246). 9.
