
Act 113 Changes to the GA Housing Program

Act 113: "The utilization of hotel and motel rooms pursuant to this subdivision shall be capped at 1,100 rooms per night between September 15, 2024, through November 30, 2024, and between April 1, 2025, through June 30, 2025. (2) The maximum number of days that an eligible household receives emergency housing in a hotel or motel under this section, per 12-month period, shall not exceed 80 days."

The number of eligible households in September and October has started to decline due to 840 households have exhausted their 80 eligible days between 9/19/2024 and 10/28/2024.

Currently, it is estimated that approximately an additional 50 households will exhaust their 80 days by the middle of November.

Administrative Procedures for Act 113

During times where the number of eligible households exceeds 90% of the 1,100 per night room cap, or 90% of hotel capacity during time periods when the 1,100 per night room cap is not in place, the department will use the following procedure for providing emergency housing assistance.

High Risk Households

Households with a member who:

- Is a child 19 years of age or under.
- Is pregnant.
- Is experiencing domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, human trafficking, hate violence, or other dangerous or life-threating conditions related to violence against the individual that caused the household to lose its housing.
- Is 65 years of age or older.
- Is otherwise categorically eligible and includes a member who is 50 years of age or older.

Length of Authorization

· Granted in up-to 28-day increments.

Applying with ESD

- Can apply for emergency housing between the hours of 8am and 4:30pm Monday through Friday.
- Can reapply for housing up to 10 days in advance of the end date of their current authorization.

All Other Eligible Households

Length of Authorization

· Granted in up-to-4-day increments.

Applying with ESD

- Can apply for emergency housing between the hours of 12pm and 4:30pm Monday through Friday.
- Can reapply for housing on the day their current authorization ends.



Screening and Case Management

- The Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO), Field Services, Blueprint Program and Vermont Chronic Care Initiative (VCCI) are working together to help identify people who have had a Coordinated Entry assessment who need connections to other services and/or a team-based care approach to their care. The Coordinated Entry assessment assesses health and social needs in addition to housing needs. This information will be used to identify needs and referrals to services, resources, and/or Team Based Care. The Department of Aging, Disabilities and Independent Living and Department of Mental Health are also consulted on a regular basis for connections to their programs and resources for eligible Vermonters, including the new iCARE skilled nursing facility in Bennington.
- The updated Coordinated Entry Assessment will have an integrated Vermont Team Based Care referral processes for those who need and want a team-based approach to their health and social health needs.
- Each region has community health teams and Adult Local Interagency teams that can be resources to help people connect to teambased care. We have also developed escalation pathways for these teams for complex cases the local providers struggle to resolve through a multi-department Triage Team and Adult State Interagency Team.
- Each region is also engaged in a Team Based Care Learning Collaborative led by the Blueprint Program Managers, Field Directors and an expert technical assistance coach to improve each regions approach and workflows in relation to Team Based Care. The teams have identified regional improvement projects they will be working on over the next several months to enhance local Team Based Care processes.

Subpopulations Enrolled in Coordinated Entry September 2024







CE New and Returning Enrollments by Region


