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## Fiscal Note

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### **S.223 (Act 175) – An act relating to water quality of the waters of Vermont**

As Enacted<sup>1i</sup>

#### **Bill Summary**

This act creates a 16-member Water Quality, Lake Classification, and Antidegradation Study Group. The Study Group is required to submit a report with its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly on or before December 15, 2026.

**The Study Group created by this act could cost up to approximately \$21,500 to the General Assembly in fiscal year 2027.**

#### **Fiscal Impact**

Per diem compensation and expense reimbursement for the Study Group is expected to cost up to approximately \$21,500 to the General Assembly in fiscal year 2027.

#### **Background and Details**

Section 1 of the act creates a 16-member Water Quality, Lake Classification, and Antidegradation Study Group. The Study Group is charged with evaluating various elements of Vermont's water classification designations, antidegradation requirements, and regulatory frameworks. The Study Group shall present recommendations to the General Assembly on legislative or policy changes to strengthen environmental protection, provide regulatory certainty, and support public uses of State waters.

The Study Group is comprised of:

- three current members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- three current members of the Senate, appointed by the Committee on Committees;
- the Secretary of Natural Resources or designee;
- a Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) water quality scientist or technical staff member, appointed by the Secretary of Natural Resources;
- two persons representing businesses, industries, or development that interact with water quality permitting, including the State antidegradation policy, use of high quality waters, and water classification, one of whom shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House and one of whom shall be appointed by the Committee on Committees;
- two persons representing nonprofit environmental advocacy groups, one of whom shall be appointed

by the Speaker of the House and one of whom shall be appointed by the Committee on Committees;

- one person representing the Federation of Vermont Lakes and Ponds, appointed by the Governor;
- one person representing the Green Mountain Water Environment Association, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- one person representing the Memphremagog Watershed Association, appointed by the Speaker of the House; and
- one person representing the Lake Champlain Citizen’s Advisory Committee, appointed by the Committee on Committees.

The Study Group has the administrative, technical, and legal assistance of the Agency of Natural Resources (ANR) and the legal and drafting assistance of the Office of Legislative Counsel. The Secretary of Natural Resources is required to call the first meeting of the Study Group to occur on or before August 1, 2026. The Study Group is required to submit a report to the General Assembly on or before December 15, 2026, and will cease to exist on February 15, 2027.

Legislators and members of the Study Group who are not State employees are entitled to per diem compensation and expense reimbursement for not more than eight meetings. These costs (up to approximately \$21,500 in fiscal year 2027) will be paid from the budget of the General Assembly. The act does not include an appropriation for this purpose.
