S. 146 - An act relating to substance misuse prevention

The bill proposes to establish a Substance Misuse Prevention Advisory Council to replace the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council. It also proposes establishing two new positions within the Agency of Human Services for the purposes of directing and coordinating substance misuse prevention strategies across State government and in collaboration with community partners.

Substance Misuse Prevention Advisory Council

Sec. 5 creates the Substance Misuse Prevention Advisory Council (SMPAC) that would replace the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Council (ADAC). The SMPAC will have a membership of 10 people, of which 7 members are expected to be non-state employees eligible to receive per diem compensation for up to 6 meetings under this bill. The ADAC currently has the same number of members eligible to receive per diems. As such, this section is anticipated to be budget neutral.

The bill as passed the House Committee on Human Services (HHS) also appropriated up to \$400,000 from the Evidence-Based Education & Advertising Fund to the Department of Health (VDH) for the purpose of funding the prevention of prescription drug misuse efforts undertaken by the Substance Misuse Prevention Council. The House Committee on Appropriations (HAC) amended the bill removing the \$400,000 appropriation and will consider an appropriation for such purposes as part of the overall budget construct in the budget bill.

Fiscal Impact:

- SMPAC Stipends = Budget Neutral

Director & Manager of Substance Misuse Prevention

Sec. 5 also creates two new permanent positions:

- Director of Substance Misuse Prevention – created within the Office of the Secretary in the Agency of Human Services (AHS) for the purpose of directing and coordinating systemic trauma-informed prevention strategies across State government and in collaboration with community partners.

- Manager of Substance Misuse Prevention – Created within the Department of Health for the purpose of coordinating the work of the SMPAC, coordinating strategic regional plans, and serving as a liaison to the Director of Substance Misuse Prevention.

According to AHS, no new positions need to be created since positions already exist within AHS (related to the Opioid Coordination Council) that can be reconstituted for the purposes laid out in this bill. The positions are currently filled but could be adapted to reflect the intent of S.146.

While these two positions are not currently funded in the Governor’s proposed FY 2020 budget, AHS planned to fund the existing positions with carryforward funds appropriated in Act 11 of the 2018 Special Session for the purpose of supporting substance use disorder activities.¹

Fiscal Impacts:

- Two Positions = Potentially Budget Neutral

¹ Sec. C.1000(a)(14) appropriated \$7.1 million to AHS to maintain critical health care services that have lost federal funding and to support substance use disorder activities including needle exchange programs, active case management of opioid addicted persons and the distribution of naloxone.
