4	this title, to be implemented over time, and make adjustments to the rules on
5	reimbursement methodologies as needed.
6	(7) Review and approve recommendations from the commissioner of
7	banking, insurance, securities, and health care administration, within 10
8	business days of receipt of such recommendations and taking into
9	consideration the requirements in the underlying statutes, changes in health
10	care delivery, changes in payment methods and amounts, and other issues at
11	the discretion of the board, on:
12	(A) any insurance rate increases pursuant to 8 V.S.A. chapter 107,
13	beginning January 1, 2012;
14	(B) hospital budgets pursuant to chapter 221, subchapter 7 of this
15	title, beginning July 1, 2012; and
16	(C) certificates of need pursuant to chapter 221, subchapter 5 of this
17	title, beginning July 1, 2012.
18	(8) Prior to the adoption of rules, review and approve, with
19	recommendations from the commissioner of Vermont health access, the benefit
20	package or packages for qualified health benefit plans pursuant to 33 V.S.A.

1	to the house committee on health care and the senate committee on health and
2	welfare within 15 days following its approval of the initial benefit package and
3	any subsequent substantive changes to the benefit package.
4	(9)(A) Develop and maintain a method for evaluating systemwide
5	performance and quality, including identification of the appropriate process
6	and outcome measures:
7	(i) for determining public and health care professional satisfaction
8	with the health system;
9	(ii) for utilization of health services;
10	(iii) in consultation with the department of health and the director
11	of the Blueprint for Health, for quality of health services and the effectiveness
12	of prevention and health promotion programs;
13	(iv) for cost-containment and limiting the growth in health care
14	expenditures;
15	(v) for determining the adequacy of the supply and distribution of
16	health care resources in this state; and
17	(vi) for other measures as determined by the board.
18	(B) The board shall adopt evaluation criteria pursuant to subdivision

16	shall facilitate and supervise the participation of health care professionals and

19	§ 9377. PAYMENT REFORM; PILOTS
20	(a) It is the intent of the general assembly to achieve the principles stated in
21	section 9371 of this title. In order to achieve this goal and to ensure the

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success of health care reform, it is the intent of the general assembly that
payment reform be implemented and that payment reform be carried out as
described in this section. It is also the intent of the general assembly to ensure

patients and health care professionals, and further the following objectives:
(A) payment reform pilot projects should align with the Blueprint for
Health strategic plan and the statewide health information technology plan;

1	(B) health care professionals should coordinate patient care through a
2	local entity or organization facilitating this coordination or another structure
3	which results in the coordination of patient care and a sustained focus on
4	disease prevention and promotion of wellness that includes individuals,
5	employers, and communities;
6	(C) health insurers, Medicaid, Medicare, and all other payers should
7	reimburse health care professionals for coordinating patient care through
8	consistent payment methodologies, which may include a global budget; a
9	system of cost containment limits, health outcome measures, and patient
10	consumer satisfaction targets which may include risk-sharing or other
11	incentives designed to reduce costs while maintaining or improving health
12	outcomes and patient consumer satisfaction; or another payment method
13	providing an incentive to coordinate care and control cost growth;
14	(D) the scope of services in any capitated payment should be broad
15	and comprehensive, including prescription drugs, diagnostic services, acute
16	and sub-acute home health services, services received in a hospital, mental
17	health and substance abuse services, and services from a licensed health care
18	practitioner; and
19	(E) health insurers, Medicaid, Medicare, and all other payers should
20	reimburse health care professionals for providing the full spectrum of
21	evidence-based health services.

1	(3) In addition to the objectives identified in subdivision (a)(3) of this
2	section, the design and implementation of payment reform pilot projects may
3	consider:
4	(A) alignment with the requirements of federal law to ensure the full
5	participation of Medicare in multipayer payment reform; and
6	(B) with input from long-term care providers, the inclusion of home
7	health services and long-term care services as part of capitated payments.
8	(c) To the extent required to avoid federal antitrust violations, the board

Committee 9 members who are not legislators shall be entitled to per diem compensation 10 and reimbursement of expenses on the same basis as that applicable to the 11 legislative members, and their compensation and reimbursements shall be paid 12 out of the budget of the Green Mountain Care board. 13 (d) The Green Mountain Care board nominating committee shall use the 14 qualifications described in section 9392 of this title for the nomination of 15 candidates for the chair and members of the Green Mountain Care board. The 16 nominating committee shall adopt procedures for a nomination process based 17 on the rules adopted by the judicial nominating board, and shall make such 18 procedures available to the public. 19 (e) A quorum of the committee shall consist of five members. 20 (f) The board is authorized to use the staff and services of appropriate state

agencies and departments as necessary to conduct investigations of applicants.

12	(a) It is the intent of the general assembly to establish a Vermont health
13	benefit exchange which meets the policy established in 18 V.S.A. § 9401 and,
14	to the extent allowable under federal law or a waiver of federal law, becomes
15	the mechanism to create Green Mountain Care.
16	(b) The purpose of the Vermont health benefit exchange is to facilitate the

7	Act and any more restrictive deductible requirements specified by the secretary

10	Mountain Care board established in 18 V.S.A. chapter 220.
11	(c) A qualified health benefit plan shall meet the following minimum
12	prevention, quality, and wellness requirements:

14	community providers in underserved areas, appropriate services to enable

16	improvement, and information on quality measures for health benefit plan

17	(E) Provide information in a timely manner to an individual, upon
18	request, regarding the cost-sharing amounts for that individual's health benefit
19	<u>plan.</u>
20	(2) A health insurer offering a qualified health benefit plan shall comply
21	with all other insurance requirements for health insurers as provided in

1	8 V.S.A. chapter 107 and as specified by rule by the commissioner of banking,
2	insurance, securities, and health care administration.
3	(f) Consistent with Section 1311(e)(1)(B) of the Affordable Care Act, the
4	Vermont health benefit exchange shall not exclude a health benefit plan:
5	(1) on the basis that the plan is a fee-for-service plan;
6	(2) through the imposition of premium price controls by the Vermont
7	health benefit exchange; or
8	(3) on the basis that the health benefit plan provides for treatments
9	necessary to prevent patients' deaths in circumstances the Vermont health
10	benefit exchange determines are inappropriate or too costly.
11	§ 1807. NAVIGATORS
12	(a)(1) The Vermont health benefit exchange shall establish a navigator
13	program to assist individuals and employers in enrolling in a qualified health
14	benefit plan offered under the Vermont health benefit exchange. The Vermont
15	health benefit exchange shall select individuals and entities qualified to serve
16	as navigators and shall award grants to navigators for the performance of their
17	<u>duties.</u>
18	(2) The Vermont health benefit exchange shall ensure that navigators
19	are available to provide assistance in person or through interactive technology
20	to individuals in all regions of the state in a manner that complies with the
21	Americans with Disabilities Act.

1	(3) Consistent with Section 1311(i)(4) of the Affordable Care Act,
2	health insurers shall not serve as navigators, and no navigator shall receive any
3	compensation from a health insurer in connection with enrolling individuals or
4	employees in qualified health benefit plans.
5	(b) Navigators shall have the following duties:
6	(1) Conduct public education activities to raise awareness of the
7	availability of qualified health benefit plans;
8	(2) Distribute fair and impartial information concerning enrollment in
9	qualified health benefit plans and concerning the availability of premium tax
10	credits and cost-sharing reductions;
11	(3) Facilitate enrollment in qualified health benefit plans, Medicaid,
12	Dr. Dynasaur, VPharm, VermontRx, and other public health benefit programs:
13	(4) Provide referrals to the office of health care ombudsman and any
14	other appropriate agency for any enrollee with a grievance, complaint, or
15	question regarding his or her health benefit plan, coverage, or a determination
16	under that plan or coverage;
17	(5) Provide information in a manner that is culturally and linguistically
18	appropriate to the needs of the population being served by the Vermont health
19	benefit exchange; and
20	(6) Distribute information to health care professionals, community
21	organizations, and others to facilitate the enrollment of individuals who are

1	eligible for Medicaid, Dr. Dynasaur, VPharm, VermontRx, other public health
2	benefit programs, or the Vermont health benefit exchange in order to ensure
3	that all eligible individuals are enrolled.
4	§ 1808. FINANCIAL INTEGRITY
5	(a) The Vermont health benefit exchange shall:
6	(1) Keep an accurate accounting of all activities, receipts, and
7	expenditures and submit this information annually as required by federal law;
8	(2) Cooperate with the secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and
9	Human Services or the inspector general of the U.S. Department of Health and
10	Human Services in any investigation into the affairs of the Vermont health
11	benefit exchange, any examination of the properties and records of the
12	Vermont health benefit exchange, or any requirement for periodic reports in
13	relation to the activities undertaken by the Vermont health benefit exchange.
14	(b) In carrying out its activities under this subchapter, the Vermont health
15	benefit exchange shall not use any funds intended for the administrative and
16	operational expenses of the Vermont health benefit exchange for staff retreats,
17	promotional giveaways, excessive executive compensation, or promotion of
18	federal or state legislative or regulatory modifications.
19	§ 1809. PUBLICATION OF COSTS AND SATISFACTION SURVEYS
20	(a) The Vermont health benefit exchange shall publish the average costs of
21	licensing, regulatory fees, and any other payments required by the exchange, as

1	well as the administrative costs of the exchange on a website intended to
2	educate consumers about such costs. This information shall include
3	information on monies lost to waste, fraud, and abuse.
4	(b) The Vermont health benefit exchange shall publish the deidentified
5	results of the satisfaction surveys and other evaluation mechanisms required
6	pursuant to subdivision 1805(13) of this title on a website intended to enable
7	consumers to compare the qualified health benefit plans offered through the
8	exchange.
9	<u>§ 1810. RULES</u>
10	The secretary of human services may adopt rules pursuant to 3 V.S.A.
11	chapter 25 as needed to carry out the duties and functions established in this
12	subchapter.
13	Subchapter 2. Green Mountain Care
14	<u>§ 1821. PURPOSE</u>
15	The purpose of Green Mountain Care is to provide, as a public good,
16	comprehensive, affordable, high-quality, publicly financed health care
17	coverage for all Vermont residents in a seamless and equitable manner
18	regardless of income, assets, health status, or availability of other health
19	coverage. Green Mountain Care shall contain costs by:
20	(1) providing incentives to residents to avoid preventable health
21	conditions, promote health, and avoid unnecessary emergency room visits;

1	(2) establishing innovative payment mechanisms to health care
2	professionals, such as global payments;
3	(3) encouraging the management of health services through the
4	Blueprint for Health; and
5	(4) reducing unnecessary administrative expenditures.
6	§ 1822. IMPLEMENTATION; WAIVER
7	(a) Green Mountain Care shall not be implemented unless the Green
8	Mountain Care Board has determined that each of the following conditions will
9	be met:
10	(1) Each Vermont resident covered by Green Mountain Care will
11	receive benefits with an actuarial value of 80 percent or greater.
12	(2) Implementation of Green Mountain Care will not have a negative
13	aggregate impact on Vermont's economy.
14	(3) The financing for Green Mountain Care is fair, equitable, and
15	sustainable.
16	(4) Administrative expenses will be reduced.
17	(5) Cost-containment efforts will result in a reduction in Vermont's
18	per-capita health care spending below the rate of growth in per-capita health
19	care spending nationally, adjusted to account for demographic differences.
20	(6) Health care professionals will be reimbursed at levels sufficient to
21	allow Vermont to recruit and retain high-quality health care professionals.

1	(b) Green Mountain Care shall be implemented 90 days following the last
2	to occur of:
3	(1) Receipt of a waiver under Section 1332 of the Affordable Care Act
4	pursuant to subsection (c) of this section.
5	(2) Enactment of a law establishing the financing for Green Mountain
6	Care.
7	(3) Approval by the Green Mountain Care board of the initial Green
8	Mountain Care benefit package pursuant to 18 V.S.A. § 9375.
9	(4) Enactment of the appropriations for the initial Green Mountain Care
10	benefit package proposed by the Green Mountain Care board pursuant to
11	<u>18 V.S.A. § 9375.</u>
12	(5) The board's determinations pursuant to subsection (a) of this section.
13	(c) As soon as allowed under federal law, the secretary of administration
14	shall seek a waiver to allow the state to suspend operation of the Vermont
15	health benefit exchange and to enable Vermont to receive the appropriate
16	federal fund contribution in lieu of the federal premium tax credits,
17	cost-sharing subsidies, and small business tax credits provided in the
18	Affordable Care Act. The secretary may seek a waiver from other provisions
19	of the Affordable Care Act as necessary to ensure the operation of Green
20	Mountain Care.

1	§ 1823. DEFINITIONS
2	For purposes of this subchapter:
3	(1) "Agency" means the agency of human services.
4	(2) "Board" means the Green Mountain Care board established in
5	18 V.S.A. chapter 220.
6	(3) "CHIP funds" means federal funds available under Title XXI of the
7	Social Security Act.
8	(4) "Chronic care" means health services provided by a health care
9	professional for an established clinical condition that is expected to last one
10	year or more; that requires ongoing clinical management; and that requires
11	health services that attempt to restore the individual to highest function,
12	minimize the negative effects of the condition, and prevent complications
13	related to chronic conditions. Examples of chronic conditions include
14	diabetes, hypertension, cardiovascular disease, cancer, asthma, pulmonary
15	disease, substance abuse, mental illness, spinal cord injury, and
16	hyperlipidemia.
17	(5) "Chronic care management" means a system of coordinated health
18	care interventions and communications for individuals with chronic conditions,
19	including significant patient self-care efforts, systemic supports for licensed
20	health care practitioners and their patients, and a plan of care emphasizing
21	prevention of complications utilizing evidence-based practice guidelines,

1	patient empowerment strategies, and evaluation of clinical, humanistic, and
2	economic outcomes on an ongoing basis with the goal of improving overall
3	<u>health.</u>
4	(6) "Health care professional" means an individual, partnership,
5	corporation, facility, or institution licensed or certified or otherwise authorized
6	by Vermont law to provide professional health services.
7	(7) "Health service" means any treatment or procedure delivered by a
8	health care professional to maintain an individual's physical or mental health
9	or to diagnose or treat an individual's physical or mental health condition,
10	including services ordered by a health care professional, chronic care
11	management, preventive care, wellness services, and medically necessary
12	services to assist in activities of daily living.
13	(8) "Hospital" shall have the same meaning as in 18 V.S.A. § 1902 and
14	may include hospitals located outside the state.
15	(9) "Preventive care" means health services provided by health care
16	professionals to identify and treat asymptomatic individuals who have risk
17	factors or preclinical disease, but in whom the disease is not clinically
18	apparent, including immunizations and screening, counseling, treatment, and
19	medication determined by scientific evidence to be effective in preventing or
20	detecting a condition.

1	(10) "Primary care" means health services provided by health care
2	professionals specifically trained for and skilled in first-contact and continuing
3	care for individuals with signs, symptoms, or health concerns, not limited by
4	problem origin, organ system, or diagnosis, and shall include family planning,
5	prenatal care, and mental health and substance abuse treatment.
6	(11) "Secretary" means the secretary of human services.
7	(12) "Vermont resident" means an individual domiciled in Vermont as
8	evidenced by an intent to maintain a principal dwelling place in Vermont
9	indefinitely and to return to Vermont if temporarily absent, coupled with an act
10	or acts consistent with that intent. An individual shall not be considered to be
11	a Vermont resident if he or she is 18 years of age or older and is claimed as a
12	dependent on the tax return of a resident of another state.
13	(13) "Wellness services" means health services, programs, or activities
14	that focus on the promotion or maintenance of good health.
15	§ 1824. ELIGIBILITY
16	(a)(1) Upon implementation, all Vermont residents shall be eligible for
17	Green Mountain Care, regardless of whether an employer offers health
18	insurance for which they are eligible. The agency shall establish standards by
19	rule for proof and verification of residency.
20	(2)(A) Except as otherwise provided in subdivision (C) of this
21	subdivision (2), if an individual is determined to be eligible for Green

1	Mountain Care based on information later found to be false, the agency shall
2	make reasonable efforts to recover from the individual the amounts expended
3	for his or her care. In addition, if the individual knowingly provided the false
4	information, he or she shall be assessed an administrative penalty of not more
5	<u>than \$5,000.00.</u>
6	(B) The agency shall include information on the Green Mountain
7	Care application to provide notice to applicants of the penalty for knowingly
8	providing false information as established in subdivision (2)(A) of this
9	subsection.
10	(C) An individual determined to be eligible for Green Mountain Care
11	whose health services are paid in whole or in part by Medicaid funds who
12	commits fraud shall be subject to the provisions of chapter 1, subchapter V of
13	this title in lieu of the administrative penalty described in subdivision (A) of
14	this subdivision (2).
15	(3)(A) Except as otherwise provided in this section, a person who is not
16	a Vermont resident shall not be eligible for Green Mountain Care.
17	(B) Except as otherwise provided in subdivision (C) of this
18	subdivision (3), an individual covered under Green Mountain Care shall inform
19	the agency within 60 days of becoming a resident of another state.
20	An individual who obtains or attempts to obtain health services through Green
21	Mountain Care more than 60 days after becoming a resident of another state

1	shall reimburse the agency for the amounts expended for his or her care and
2	shall be assessed an administrative penalty of not more than \$1,000.00 for a
3	first violation and not more than \$2,000.00 for any subsequent violation.
4	(C) An individual whose health services are paid in whole or in part
5	by Medicaid funds who obtains or attempts to obtain health services through
6	Green Mountain Care more than 60 days after becoming a resident of another
7	state shall be subject to the provisions of chapter 1, subchapter V of this title in
8	lieu of the administrative penalty described in subdivision (B) of this
9	subdivision (3).
10	(b) The agency shall establish a procedure to enroll residents in Green
11	Mountain Care.
12	(c)(1) The agency shall establish by rule a process to allow health care
13	professionals to presume an individual is eligible based on the information
14	provided on a simplified application.
15	(2) After submission of the application, the agency shall collect
16	additional information as necessary to determine whether Medicaid, Medicare,
17	CHIP, or other federal funds may be applied toward the cost of the health
18	services provided, but shall provide payment for any health services received
19	by the individual from the time the application is submitted.
20	(3) If an individual presumed eligible for Green Mountain Care pursuant
21	to subdivision (1) of this subsection is later determined not to be eligible for

1	the program, the agency shall make reasonable efforts to recover from the
2	individual the amounts expended for his or her care.
3	(d) The agency shall adopt rules pursuant to 3 V.S.A. chapter 25 to ensure
4	that Vermont residents who are temporarily out of the state and who intend to
5	return and reside in Vermont remain eligible for Green Mountain Care while
6	outside Vermont. The agency shall consider imposing a supplemental
7	financial contribution requirement and, if such a requirement is to be imposed,
8	shall define the circumstances in which it will be applied.
9	(e) A nonresident visiting Vermont, or his or her insurer, shall be billed for
10	all services received. The agency may enter into intergovernmental
11	arrangements or contracts with other states and countries to provide reciprocal
12	coverage for temporary visitors and shall adopt rules pursuant to 3 V.S.A.
13	chapter 25 to carry out the purposes of this subsection.
14	§ 1825. HEALTH BENEFITS
15	(a)(1) Green Mountain Care shall include primary care, preventive care,
16	chronic care, acute episodic care, and hospital services and shall include at
17	least the same covered services as those included in the benefit package in
18	effect for the lowest cost Catamount Health plan offered on January 1, 2011.
19	(2) It is the intent of the general assembly that Green Mountain Care
20	provide a level of coverage that includes benefits that are actuarially equivalent
21	to at least 87 percent of the full actuarial value of the covered health services.

1	(3) The Green Mountain Care board shall consider whether to impose
2	cost-sharing requirements; if so, whether to vary the cost-sharing requirements
3	based on an individual's ability to pay; and the impact of any cost-sharing
4	requirements on an individual's ability to access care. The board shall
5	consider waiving any cost-sharing requirement for chronic care for evidence-
6	based primary and preventive care; for palliative care; and for individuals
7	participating in chronic care management and, where circumstances warrant,
8	for individuals with chronic conditions who are not participating in a chronic
9	care management program.
10	(4)(A) The Green Mountain Care board established in 18 V.S.A. chapter
11	220 shall consider whether to include dental, vision, and hearing benefits in the
12	Green Mountain Care benefit package.
13	(B) The Green Mountain Care board shall consider whether to
14	include long-term care benefits in the Green Mountain Care benefit package.
15	(5) Green Mountain Care shall not limit coverage of preexisting
16	conditions.
17	(6) The Green Mountain Care board shall approve the benefit package
18	and present it to the general assembly as part of its recommendations for the
19	Green Mountain Care budget.
20	(b)(1)(A) For individuals eligible for Medicaid or CHIP, the benefit
21	package shall include the benefits required by federal law, as well as any

1	additional benefits provided as part of the Green Mountain Care benefit
2	package.
3	(B) Upon implementation of Green Mountain Care, the benefit
4	package for individuals eligible for Medicaid or CHIP shall also include any
5	optional Medicaid benefits pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1396d or services
6	covered under the state plan for CHIP as provided in 42 U.S.C. § 1397cc for
7	which these individuals are eligible on January 1, 2014. Beginning with the
8	second year of Green Mountain Care and going forward, the Green Mountain
9	Care board may, consistent with federal law, modify these optional benefits, as
10	long as at all times the benefit package for these individuals contains at least
11	the benefits described in subdivision (A) of this subdivision (b)(1).
12	(2) For children eligible for benefits paid for with Medicaid funds, the
13	benefit package shall include early and periodic screening, diagnosis, and
14	treatment services as defined under federal law.
15	(3) For individuals eligible for Medicare, the benefit package shall
16	include the benefits provided to these individuals under federal law, as well as
17	any additional benefits provided as part of the Green Mountain Care benefit
18	package.
19	§ 1826. BLUEPRINT FOR HEALTH
20	(a) It is the intent of the general assembly that within five years following
21	the implementation of Green Mountain Care, each individual enrolled in Green

1	Mountain Care will have a primary health care professional who is involved
2	with the Blueprint for Health established in 18 V.S.A. chapter 13.
3	(b) Consistent with the provisions of 18 V.S.A. chapter 13, if an individual
4	enrolled in Green Mountain Care does not have a medical home through the
5	Blueprint for Health, the individual may choose a primary health care
6	professional who is not participating in the Blueprint to serve as the
7	individual's primary care point of contact.
8	(c) The agency shall determine a method to approve a specialist as a
9	patient's primary health care professional for the purposes of establishing a
10	medical home or primary care point of contact for the patient. The agency
11	shall approve a specialist as a patient's medical home or primary care point of
12	contact on a case-by-case basis and only for a patient who receives the
13	majority of his or her health care from that specialist.
14	(d) Green Mountain Care shall be integrated with the Blueprint for Health
15	established in 18 V.S.A. chapter 13.
16	§ 1827. ADMINISTRATION; ENROLLMENT
17	(a)(1) The agency shall, under an open bidding process, solicit bids from
18	and award contracts to public or private entities for administration of certain
19	elements of Green Mountain Care, such as claims administration and provider
20	relations.

1	(2) The agency shall ensure that entities awarded contracts pursuant to
2	this subsection do not have a financial incentive to restrict individuals' access
3	to health services. The agency may establish performance measures that
4	provide incentives for contractors to provide timely, accurate, transparent, and
5	courteous services to individuals enrolled in Green Mountain Care and to
6	health care professionals.
7	(3) When considering contract bids pursuant to this subsection, the
8	agency shall consider the interests of the state relating to the economy, the
9	location of the entity, and the need to maintain and create jobs in Vermont.
10	The agency may utilize an econometric model to evaluate the net costs of each
11	contract bid.
12	(b) Nothing in this subchapter shall require an individual with health
13	coverage other than Green Mountain Care to terminate that coverage.
14	(c) An individual enrolled in Green Mountain Care may elect to maintain
15	supplemental health insurance if the individual so chooses.
16	(d) Except for cost-sharing, Vermonters shall not be billed any additional
17	amount for health services covered by Green Mountain Care.
18	(e) The agency shall seek permission from the Centers for Medicare and
19	Medicaid Services to be the administrator for the Medicare program in
20	Vermont. If the agency is unsuccessful in obtaining such permission, Green
21	Mountain Care shall be the secondary payer with respect to any health service

1	that may be covered in whole or in part by Title XVIII of the Social Security
2	Act (Medicare).
3	(f) Green Mountain Care shall be the secondary payer with respect to any
4	health service that may be covered in whole or in part by any other health
5	benefit plan, including private health insurance, retiree health benefits, or
6	federal health benefit plans offered by the Veterans' Administration, by the
7	military, or to federal employees.
8	(g) The agency may seek a waiver under Section 1115 of the Social
9	Security Act to include Medicaid and under Section 2107(e)(2)(A) of the
10	Social Security Act to include SCHIP in Green Mountain Care. If the agency
11	is unsuccessful in obtaining one or both of these waivers, Green Mountain
12	Care shall be the secondary payer with respect to any health service that may
13	be covered in whole or in part by Title XIX of the Social Security Act
14	(Medicaid) or Title XXI of the Social Security Act (CHIP), as applicable.
15	(h) Any prescription drug coverage offered by Green Mountain Care shall
16	be consistent with the standards and procedures applicable to the pharmacy
17	best practices and cost control program established in sections 1996 and 1998
18	of this title.
19	(i) Green Mountain Care shall maintain a robust and adequate network of
20	health care professionals located in Vermont or regularly serving Vermont
21	residents, including mental health and substance abuse professionals. The

1	agency shall contract with outside entities as needed to allow for the
2	appropriate portability of coverage under Green Mountain Care for Vermont
3	residents who are temporarily out of the state.
4	(j) The agency shall make available the necessary information, forms,
5	access to eligibility or enrollment systems, and billing procedures to health
6	care professionals to ensure immediate enrollment for individuals in Green
7	Mountain Care at the point of service or treatment.
8	(k) An individual aggrieved by an adverse decision of the agency or plan
9	administrator may appeal to the human services board as provided in 3 V.S.A.
10	<u>§ 3090.</u>
11	(l) The agency, in collaboration with the department of banking, insurance,
12	securities, and health care administration, shall monitor the extent to which
13	residents of other states move to Vermont for the purpose of receiving health
14	services and the impact of any such migration on Vermont's health care system
15	and on the state's economy, and recommend to the general assembly strategies
16	to address any related problems the agency and or department identifies.
17	§ 1828. BUDGET PROPOSAL
18	The Green Mountain Care board, in collaboration with the agencies of
19	administration and of human services, shall be responsible for developing each
20	year a three-year Green Mountain Care budget for proposal to the general
21	assembly and to the governor, to be adjusted annually in response to realized

1	revenues and expenditures, that reflects any modifications to the benefit
2	package and includes recommended appropriations, revenue estimates, and
3	necessary modifications to tax rates and other assessments.
4	§ 1829. GREEN MOUNTAIN CARE FUND
5	(a) The Green Mountain Care fund is established in the state treasury as a
6	special fund to be the single source to finance health care coverage for Green
7	Mountain Care.
8	(b) Into the fund shall be deposited:
9	(1) transfers or appropriations from the general fund, authorized by the
10	general assembly;
11	(2) if authorized by a waiver from federal law, federal funds for
12	Medicaid, Medicare, and the Vermont health benefit exchange established in
13	chapter 18, subchapter 1 of this title; and
14	(3) the proceeds from grants, donations, contributions, taxes, and any
15	other sources of revenue as may be provided by statute or by rule.
16	(c) The fund shall be administered pursuant to 32 V.S.A. chapter 7,
17	subchapter 5, except that interest earned on the fund and any remaining
18	balance shall be retained in the fund. The agency shall maintain records
19	indicating the amount of money in the fund at any time.
20	(d) All monies received by or generated to the fund shall be used only for:

1	(1) the administration and delivery of health services covered by Green
2	Mountain Care as provided in this subchapter; and
3	(2) expenses related to the duties and operation of the Green Mountain
4	Care board pursuant to 18 V.S.A. chapter 220.
5	§ 1830. COLLECTIVE BARGAINING RIGHTS
6	Nothing in this subchapter shall be construed to limit the ability of
7	collective bargaining units to negotiate for coverage of health services pursuant
8	to 3 V.S.A. § 904 or any other provision of law.
9	§ 1831. PUBLIC PROCESS
10	The agency of human services shall provide a process for soliciting public
11	input on the Green Mountain Care benefit package on an ongoing basis,
12	including a mechanism by which members of the public may request inclusion
13	of particular benefits or services. The process may include receiving written
14	comments on proposed new or amended rules or holding public hearings or
15	both.
16	Sec. 4a. HOUSEHOLD HEALTH INSURANCE SURVEY
17	The department of banking, insurance, securities, and health care
18	administration shall include questions on its household health insurance survey
19	that enable the department to determine the extent to which residents of other
20	states move to Vermont for the purpose of receiving health services. The

1	department shall provide its findings to the agency of human services to enable
2	the agency to monitor migration into the state as required in 33 V.S.A. § 1827.
3	Sec. 4b. EXCHANGE IMPLEMENTATION
4	(a) The commissioner of Vermont health access shall contract with at least
5	two health insurers to provide qualified health benefit plans, in addition to the
6	multistate plans required by the Affordable Care Act, in the Vermont health
7	benefit exchange in 2014; provided that the commissioner shall not be required
8	to solicit participation by insurers outside the state in order to contract with two
9	insurers.
10	(b) Nothing in this section shall be construed to require the commissioner
11	to contract with a health insurer to provide a plan that does not meet the
12	requirements specified in 33 V.S.A. chapter 18, subchapter 1.
13	Sec. 5. 33 V.S.A. § 401 is amended to read:
14	§ 401. COMPOSITION OF DEPARTMENT
15	The department of Vermont health access, created under 3 V.S.A. § 3088,
16	shall consist of the commissioner of Vermont health access, the medical
17	director, a health care eligibility unit; and all divisions within the department,
18	including the divisions of managed care; health care reform; the Vermont

14	(a) A Medicaid and exchange advisory committee is created for the purpose

16	development and program administration for the Vermont health benefit
17	exchange, Medicaid, and Medicaid-funded programs, consistent with the
18	requirements of federal law.
19	(b)(1) The commissioner shall appoint members of the advisory committee
20	established by this section, who shall serve staggered three-year terms. The
21	total membership of the advisory committee shall be 23 members. The

1	commissioner may remove members of the committee who fail to attend three
2	consecutive meetings and may appoint replacements.
3	(2)(A) The commissioner shall appoint up to three representatives of
