Subject: Position and Grant Requests – JFO #2936 - #2940

Enclosed please find five (5) items, including seven (7) limited-service positions, which the Joint Fiscal Office has received from the Administration.

JFO #2936 – Four (4) limited-service positions within the VT Dept. of Health. The respective position titles would be Substance Abuse Program Manager (2), Program Evaluation & Quality Assurance Specialist (1) and Program Technician II (1). The positions would be created to oversee an existing grant program aimed at combating the opioid crisis in Vermont. The existing grant was approved by the Joint Fiscal Committee in 2017 (JFO #2881). However, the grant has grown from \$2 million to \$4 million. The grant was also extended through September 2020 and the positions would be authorized for that period of time as well. [JFO received 11/28/18]

JFO #2937 – \$535,000 from the U.S. Dept. of Justice (DOJ) to the VT Dept. of Public Safety. This is a partner grant to one previously sent to the Joint Fiscal Committee for approval (JFO #2935). The funds are to be used to develop and enhance anti-human trafficking prevention and intervention strategies to stop trafficking statewide. *One (1) limited-service position, titled Law Enforcement Liaison, is associated with this request.* The position would be created to work with the VT Center for Crime Victim Services. The grant funds and position are authorized for a three-year period. State inkind match would be required in the amount of approximately \$163,000 over three years, which will be in the form of existing staff time. Additionally, approximately \$5,000 in general fund dollars would be required per year for a data analysis contract, totaling \$15,000 over the life of the grant. [*JFO received 11/30/18*]

JFO #2938 – \$173,780 from the U.S. Dept. of Justice (DOJ) to the VT Dept. of Public Safety. These grant funds would be utilized to update the technology utilized for the anonymous reporting of potential and/or actual threats to the safety of students and personnel in schools. The new technology is needed due to limited functionality and general outdatedness of the existing software. The grant funds would be used over three state fiscal years. [JFO received 11/30/18]

JFO #2939 – **\$231,464** from the U.S. Dept. of Justice (DOJ) to the VT Dept. of Public Safety. These grant funds would be utilized to enhance the SURVIVermont initiative aimed at educating the public on active shooter response best practices. Specifically, this funding would be used to 1) provide training to personnel and students to prevent school violence, 2) develop and operate anonymous reporting systems for threats of school violence, to include mobile apps, hotlines and websites, and 3) develop and operate school threat assessment and crisis intervention teams that may coordinate with law enforcement agencies and be trained to intervene and respond to individuals with mental health issues before they potentially become a threat to school safety. State funds would be utilized over the two years of the grant project in the amount of approximately \$38,000 per year to cover the costs of training and marketing materials relating to the SURVIVermont program. [*JFO received 11/30/18*]

JFO #2940 – Two (2) limited-service positions, one within the VT Dept. of Health (VDH) and one within the VT Dept. of Mental Health (DMH). This is a joint request for staffing necessary to oversee a project to expand early identification of maternal depression and provide access to mental health and substance use disorder screening, referral and treatment. The respective position titles would be Public Health Programs Administrator (VDH) and Grant Program Administrator (DMH). The positions would be funded through an ongoing federal grant from the U.S. Health Resources & Services Administration. The existing grant was approved by the Joint Fiscal Committee in 2014 (JFO #2708), however, the grant activities are changing from what was previously approved. This is a five-year project with an end-date of 9/29/2023. [JFO received 11/30/18]

Subject: Categorical Exclusion for Vermont Department of Public Safety

The FY 18 STOP School Violence Prevention and Mental Health Training Program is a program that supports efforts by state, local, and federally-recognized Indian tribes to prevent and reduce school violence. This program will address: (1) training school personnel and educating students to prevent student violence; (2) development and operation of anonymous reporting systems against threats of school violence, including mobile telephone applications, hotlines, and websites; and (3) development and operation of school threat assessment and crisis intervention teams that may include coordination with law enforcement agencies and school personnel as well as specialized training for school officials help intervene and respond to individuals with mental health issues that could impact school safety. None of the following activities will be conducted either under the OJP federal action or a related third party action:

1) New construction;

2) Any renovation or remodeling of a property either (a) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places or (b) located within a 100-year flood plain;

3) A renovation which will change the basic prior use of a facility or significantly change its size;

4) Research and technology whose anticipated and future application could be expected to have an effect on the environment; or

5) Implementation of a program involving the use of chemicals.

Consequently, the subject federal action meets the Office of Justice Programs' criteria for a categorical exclusion as contained in paragraph 4(b) of Appendix D to Part 61 of Title 28 of the Code of Federal Regulations. Additionally, the proposed action is neither a phase nor a segment or a project which when viewed in its entirety would not meet the criteria for a categorical exclusion.

State of Vermont School Safety Public Education Initiative- SurviVermont

Program Abstract

SURVIVermont is a locally developed program to educate the public on active shooter response best practices in any venue and specifically in Vermont schools. The program builds from three federally-recognized programs- "See Something, Say Something", "Run, Hide, Fight", and "Stop the Bleed". The City of St. Albans utilized strong partnerships with the state Department of Health, the local hospital and EMS provider, law enforcement, local newspaper, and the Medical Reserve Corps to present this training as a way to educate the public on what to do in an active shooter event.

The State of Vermont seeks expand this education model around the state. If awarded, this grant will support the implementation of this program across the state, utilizing community partners as the main delivery point, and ensuring education of the whole community in response to active shooter events.

Description of Issue

Since 1999, the state of Vermont has been actively engaged in an "all hazards" approach to school emergency preparedness. Working under the leadership and direction of Vermont's Department of Public Safety, the Vermont School Crisis Planning Team (VSCPT) provides Vermont's public, private and independent schools with school safety planning, training and exercise resources. The VSCPT is comprised of representatives from Vermont's first response community and other state school safety partners that include but not limited to: Vermont State Police, Vermont Chief's and Sheriff's Associations, Division of Fire Safety, Vermont Department of Health (EMS/School Nurses), Vermont Emergency Management, Department of Mental Health, American Red Cross and Vermont Principal/Superintendent's/School Board Associations.

Vermont has not been immune from the tragic outcomes of school based violence. On August 24th, 2006, a lone gunman entered the halls of the Essex Elementary School and killed one teacher and left another teacher seriously injured. This incident highlighted the importance of our collective school safety work and focused our efforts to design and implement consistent school safety practices in schools across Vermont. To meet this need, in 2016 Vermont's Department of Public Safety and Agency of Education formalized their school safety partnership by spearheading the development of Vermont's School Safety Center (VSSC). Working in collaboration with federal, state and local school safety partners, the VSSC now provides the operational framework and leadership for Vermont's school emergency preparedness efforts and serves as the single point of contact for all of Vermont's school safety planning, training and exercise initiatives. Since its inception, the VSSC has developed and delivered school safety training in the areas of Incident Command and Crisis Communication, Active Shooter Response, Individual and Organizational Resiliency Following a Critical Incident, Mental Health Preparedness, De-Escalation and Prevention of Violence, School Bus Safety and Suspicious Activity Reporting.

School communities consist of students, staff, teachers, parents, extended family members and community members who frequently attend sporting or community based events at Vermont schools. DPS seeks to take a *whole community* approach to active shooter response through the expansion of an established and successful local education program called SurviVermont. This program builds on the successes of three federally-recognized programs-"See Something, Say Something", "Run, Hide, Fight", and "Stop the Bleed".

The City of St. Albans utilized this *whole community* approach to active shooter response by leveraging their established partnerships with local, county and state first response organizations, hospitals, local media, medical reserve corps and Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) to educate and inform the public and school communities in what to do when responding to an active shooter event. DPS seeks to model this program at the state level by broadening the partnerships with local, county, state and federal partners, medical professionals, press outlets, local and regional planning commissions, local emergency management directors and others to bring this program to all schools and communities in the state.

Program Design and Implementation

DPS will seek to utilize one full-time equivalent (FTE) employee for each of the two years of this project to design and implement the SurviVermont active shooter and emergency preparedness program across Vermont. This dedicated employee will be charged with developing all training materials, coordinating with the local, county, state and federal partners and would also be charged with developing a training cadre to assist in providing this active shooter and emergency preparedness training and outreach programs to communities across Vermont. We seek to not only develop a SurviVermont awareness program but to also develop a robust "train the trainer" program that would provide for the sustainability of this program beyond the three year grant period. We envision the awareness training as a three-hour program, with one hour dedicated to each of the program methodologies. We envision the train-the-trainer program being a one day training session. We would encourage a multi-discipline approach for our instructor cadre bringing first responders, medical professionals, community leaders and others into the ranks of our SurviVermont instructor pool.

By leveraging the existing programs of Run, Hide Fight/ Stop the Bleed/If You See Something, Say Something, little time would need to be spent on the development of training materials or curricula, which allows more time to be spent on developing a community-based training cadre that could bring this program to their friends, neighbors and co-workers. The Commissioner of the Department of Public Safety, the Director of Vermont Emergency Management, leaders from the Vermont State Police and Vermont's School Safety Liaison Officer all had the opportunity to witness first-hand the delivery of this training to the St. Albans community. The value of this training relies upon community members teaching community members how to respond to these types of violent events. It works to establish trust, faith and confidence among community members and their emergency first response, medical, and school professionals. The program provides the opportunity for this difficult subject matter to be taught by individuals with whom school officials and community members were familiar with and trusted.

Training Materials and Public Outreach

As mentioned above, we seek to leverage these federally-recognized emergency preparedness programs and training materials to deliver them to schools and communities across Vermont. Utilizing an aggressive public information campaign under the direction of Vermont Emergency Management, the state would utilize all print, social media, radio and television "ad" campaigns to reinforce our program initiatives. Working with the VT Department of Health, Department of Mental Health, American Red Cross, local medical professionals and first response organizations, we will develop age and audience appropriate public messaging that meets the needs of all Vermonters. The state will modify all training materials and outreach documents to ensure they meet all language and disability requirements to ensure every citizen and student of the state is able to understand and apply these life saving techniques. This also ensures that all participants have the opportunity to take away educational materials if they so choose.

Documentation and Program Analysis

Utilizing the staff mentioned earlier in this program narrative, we will validate the effectiveness of these programs by conducting outreach to the communities that have participated in the

SurviVermont program. This outreach would provide an opportunity to identify program strengths and opportunities for improvement. An annual report will be developed and delivered to the Director of Vermont Emergency Management that details the number of programs conducted, number of citizens/students trained, number of outreach initiatives and public awareness programs conducted and their level of effectiveness.

Conclusion

Vermont has always taken an "all hazards" approach to emergency preparedness and we see the SurviVermont program as a testament to this methodology. Working with key stakeholders and our emergency preparedness partners, we are confident that if adopted, SurviVermont could be a shining example of an active shooter and emergency preparedness approach that could be adopted by states across the country.
