Enclosed please find two (2) items that the Joint Fiscal Office has received from the administration.

JFO #2690 – \$15,000 grant from the National Alcohol Beverage Control Association to the Vermont Department of Liquor Control (DLC). These funds cover costs associated with an educational event designed to improve understanding of alcohol regulations, current DLC operations, and privatization risks. The event will bring together policy makers, licensees, law enforcement professionals, and others. [JFO received 07/11/14]

JFO #2691 – \$10,250 grant from the Alma Gibbs Donchian Foundation to the Vermont Department of Housing and Community Development. These funds will be used by the Historic Preservation division for various improvements at the Hubbardton Battlefield (\$4,500), to support two Grace Coolidge Musicale events in Plymouth (\$2,750) and to cover the cost of staffing at the Justin Morrill Homestead for three additional days per week during the 2014 season (\$3,000).

Enclosed is a request by the Department of Liquor Control (DLC) for approval of a one-time grant to be used towards payment of the December symposium, "The Vermont Experience with Alcohol-1933 to Present".

The NABCA grant in the amount of \$15,000 will be used to pay for the services of the event coordinator as well as partially fund other operating expenses related to the symposium. The outlay from DLC is expected to be minimal.

The Vermont Liquor Control Board, together with the DLC, proposes to host a day-long event bringing together policy makers, licensees, industry professionals, local authorities, law enforcement professionals and prevention experts for a discussion of the relevance of alcohol regulation in today's marketplace. The symposium proposes to start with a global overview of alcohol beverages, drilling down from the national to the local level through a series of guest speakers and panel discussions.

Evaluations of the symposium will be requested from the participants, compiled and the results will be reported to NABCA. The expected outcome of this symposium is that all stake holders will develop a greater understanding for, and respect for, our system of liquor regulation and significantly increase support for Vermont's control approach to alcohol sales while drastically reducing any movement toward privatization.

Vermont Experience with Alcohol Symposium – 1933 to Present

Project Summary

The Vermont Liquor Control Board, together with the Vermont Department of Liquor Control, proposes to host a day-long event bringing together policy makers, licensees, industry professionals, local authorities, law enforcement professionals and prevention experts for a discussion of the relevance of alcohol regulation in today's marketplace. In the face of numerous states' moves to privatize, we feel it is essential that we be proactive in our discussion of the benefits of the three-tier and control state systems. These methods of controlling the sale and distribution of alcohol beverages have served the state of Vermont well since the repeal of Prohibition 81 years ago. We believe alcohol regulation is still relevant today and is necessary to balance the goals of businesses with the interests of our local communities. This symposium proposes to start with a global overview of alcohol beverages, drilling down to a national, then local level. In a series of guest speakers and panel discussions, key questions will be addressed including: why the three-tier and the control state systems were created and their role in today's market; how privatization (with particular attention to the recent events in Washington State) presents financial, social, and health risks to surrounding communities; and, why a combined effort to control the negative impact of alcohol abuse is essential to our state's well-being. We surmise that a majority of Vermonters, even many in the alcohol beverage industry and legislature, do not know how our system works or the numerous benefits it provides the state. To this point, many residents still think we have "state stores" when the last DLC-owned store closed in 1996.

Criteria

This event specifically "supports education efforts by highlighting agency operations and responsibilities to the public and government officials" (NABCA Program Application criteria #2). This symposium will be a forum in which to share information about what we do, why and how we do it, and the benefits of our system to the state, both financially and socially.

Time Line

Preparation for this meeting has already begun and will continue through the symposium (December 3, 2014) and ending when all feedback from the symposium has been gathered and assessed. We should be able to submit project evaluations by the end of 2014.


Evaluation

We sincerely hope that this symposium will significantly increase support for Vermont's control approach to alcohol sales while drastically reducing any movement toward privatization.
