Summer and Extended Learning Opportunities Initiative

I. Background

Vermont youth need innovative and expanded opportunities to develop assets that lead to success in school, career and community citizenship. The Vermont Department of Education (VTDOE) invites interested parties to submit partnership proposals for the purpose of initiating, expanding and/or enhancing summer, before school, weekend, evening or vacation programming for school aged children. The purpose of this initiative is to address the needs of at-risk children, during times when working families need additional support. These programs should show a measurable, positive effect on student learning and developmental assets. This funding opportunity is also tied to the achievement of the vision of educational transformation. Transformation means focusing on student learning by creating educational environments that respond to the needs of students, provide flexible environments rich with 21st Century tools, and expect students to demonstrate deep understanding through a variety of means.

II. Program Goals

Youth participation in extended learning opportunities initiative will:

- 1. Build developmental assets.
- 2. Reduce summer learning loss of core content knowledge.
- 3. Develop life and career skills for the 21st Century.

III. Statewide Program Objectives

- 1. By 2014, 100% of students will report a 50% increase in youth asset measures over baseline.
- 2. By 2014, 50% of regular program attendees (30 days or more) will move up one level on an annual NECAP assessment when comparing two consecutive years.
- 3. By 2014, 100% of students will demonstrate acquisition of at least one life or career skill.

IV. Funding Duration

Funding will be available from September 1, 2010-August 31, 2013. Awards will be granted annually on a September to August basis. Refunding of programs will be awarded based on an annual assessment towards meeting program objectives and as funds are available.

V. Priorities

The VTDOE will give priority to successful applications that propose new programming that addresses an unmet need.

IV. Eligible Grantees:

Eligible applicants must be a local educational agency and include partners such as (LEAs); communitybased organizations (CBOs); other public or private entities, faith-based organizations, or a consortium of two or more agencies, organizations, or entities. Municipalities may also apply. In addition, eligible communities are those that serve 30% or higher proportion of youth who quality for free and reduced lunch. Please consult the most recent free and reduced lunch report at:

VII. Allowable Uses of Funds

Requests will be considered in the \$10,000-\$50,000 range per project. Projects proposed over \$25,000 should be mindful of the sustainability challenge over time and proposed only if significant outcomes are achievable. Only full comprehensive programs should be proposed.

A list of allowable activities should include but are not limited to:

- □ Arts and music education activities;
- □ Nutrition and physical activity programs;
- □ Service-learning programs;
- □ Telecommunications and technology education programs;
- □ Expanded library service hours;
- □ Academic enrichment learning programs;
- □ Entrepreneurial education programs;
- **u** Tutoring services (including those provided by senior citizen volunteers) and mentoring programs;
- Programs that provide activities for limited-English proficient students that emphasize language skills;
- □ Programs that promote parental involvement and family literacy;
- □ Programs that provide assistance to students who have been truant, suspended, or expelled;
- Drug and violence prevention programs, counseling programs, and character education programs;
- □ Job and career development programs.

VI. Proposals

Include a detailed narrative that demonstrates how these funds will assist grantees in meeting/enhancing at least one of the three goals above. Proposals must not exceed 5 pages of narrative (12 point font, single spaced) plus a budget. Attachments are limited to 5 pages. Do not include Letters of Support.

A) Need for the program

In this section applicants should reference local data that establishes specific needs.

B) **Program(s)** description(s)

Strong applications will provide a detailed description of the program including: numbers of students to be served, a full schedule showing number of program days, student to staff ratios, comprehensive program components, and rationale for the program design. Applicants should note section V which identifies components of a high-quality program.

C) Capacity and resources for success

(15 points)

Identify how the organization and partners(s) will provide leadership, high quality staff, space and other resources to achieve its goals.

D) Budget

(15 points)

Include line items that are reasonable and necessary. Indirect costs may be requested only for LEAs that have approval by the Vermont Department of Education. Supply costs should not be substantial. Successful applications will be required to fully participate in an evaluation process established by the Vermont Department of Education and the Office of Juvenile Justice and Prevention.

VII. Selection Process

All proposals will be read and reviewed by a small team of independent readers with experience in programming in the allowable uses. It is estimated that the available amount is \$500.000. All awards will be subject to the availability of federal funds. Grantees will be required to sign a grant award which includes an assurance that grant funds will not supplant other State, local, or Federal funds.

Summer and Extended Learning Opportunities Initiative

I. Background

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II. Program Goals

Youth participation in extended learning opportunities initiative will:

- 1. Build developmental assets.
- 2. Reduce summer learning loss of core content knowledge.
- 3. Develop life and career skills for the 21st Century.

III. Statewide Program Objectives

- 1. By 2014, 100% of students will report a 50% increase in youth asset measures over baseline.
- 2. By 2014, 50% of regular program attendees (30 days or more) will move up one level on an annual NECAP assessment when comparing two consecutive years.
- 3. By 2014, 100% of students will demonstrate acquisition of at least one life or career skill.

IV. Funding Duration

Funding will be available from September 1, 2010-August 31, 2013. Awards will be granted annually on a September to August basis. Refunding of programs will be awarded based on an annual assessment towards meeting program objectives and as funds are available.

V. Priorities

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- □ Expanded library service hours;

Include line items that are reasonable and necessary. Indirect costs may be requested only for LEAs that have approval by the Vermont Department of Education. Supply costs should not be substantial. Successful applications will be required to fully participate in an evaluation process established by the Vermont Department of Education and the Office of Juvenile Justice and Prevention.

VII. Selection Process

All proposals will be read and reviewed by a small team of independent readers with experience in programming in the allowable uses. It is estimated that the available amount is \$500.000. All awards will be subject to the availability of federal funds. Grantees will be required to sign a grant award which includes an assurance that grant funds will not supplant other State, local, or Federal funds.

IX. Grant Award Decisions, Requirements, and Disposition of Proposals

The Vermont Department of Education reserves the right not to award all parts, to negotiate specific grant amounts, and to select certain proposals to meet requirements or State Board of Education priorities. Funding is contingent upon receipt of federal funds. Grantees will be required to submit reports in a manner required by the U.S. Office of Juvenile Justice and Prevention and the Vermont Department of Education.

Dear Commissioner Vilaseca:

Congratulations on your recent award. In establishing financial assistance programs, Congress linked the receipt of Federal funding to compliance with Federal civil rights laws. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice is responsible for ensuring that recipients of financial aid from OJP, its component offices and bureaus, the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) comply with applicable Federal civil rights statutes and regulations. We at OCR are available to help you and your organization meet the civil rights requirements that come with Justice Department funding.

Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs

As you know, Federal laws prohibit recipients of financial assistance from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded programs or activities, not only in respect to employment practices but also in the delivery of services or benefits. Federal law also prohibits funded programs or activities from discriminating on the basis of age in the delivery of services or benefits.

Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals

In accordance with Department of Justice Guidance pertaining to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, recipients of Federal financial assistance must take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP). For more information on the civil rights responsibilities that recipients have in providing language services to LEP individuals, please see the website at http://www.lep.gov.

Ensuring Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations

The Department of Justice has published a regulation specifically pertaining to the funding of faith-based organizations. In general, the regulation, Participation in Justice Department Programs by Religious Organizations; Providing for Equal Treatment of all Justice Department Program Participants, and known as the Equal Treatment Regulation 28 C.F.R. part 38, requires State Administering Agencies to treat these organizations the same as any other applicant or recipient. The regulation prohibits State Administering Agencies from making award or grant administration decisions on the basis of an organization's religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors.

The regulation also prohibits faith-based organizations from using financial assistance from the Department of Justice to fund inherently religious activities. While faith-based organizations can engage in non-funded inherently religious activities, they must be held separately from the Department of Justice funded program, and customers or beneficiaries cannot be compelled to participate in them. The Equal Treatment Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs funded by the Department of Justice are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion. For more information on the regulation, please see OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/etfbo.htm.

State Administering Agencies and faith-based organizations should also note that the Safe Streets Act, as amended; the Victims of Crime Act, as amended; and the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act, as amended, contain prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of religion in employment. Despite these nondiscrimination provisions, the Justice Department has concluded that the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) is reasonably construed, on a case-by-case basis, to require that its funding agencies permit faith-based organizations applying for funding under the applicable program statutes both to receive DOJ funds and to continue considering religion when hiring staff, even if the statute that authorizes the funding program generally forbids considering of religion in employment decisions by grantees.

Questions about the regulation or the application of RFRA to the statutes that prohibit discrimination in employment may be directed to this Office.

Enforcing Civil Rights Laws

All recipients of Federal financial assistance, regardless of the particular funding source, the amount of the grant award, or the number of employees in the workforce, are subject to the prohibitions against unlawful discrimination. Accordingly, OCR investigates recipients that are the subject of discrimination complaints from both individuals and groups. In addition, based on regulatory criteria, OCR selects a number of recipients each year for compliance reviews, audits that require recipients to submit data showing that they are providing services equitably to all segments of their service population and that their employment practices meet equal employment opportunity standards.

Complying with the Safe Streets Act or Program Requirements

In addition to these general prohibitions, an organization which is a recipient of financial assistance subject to the nondiscrimination provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act (Safe Streets Act) of 1968, 42 U.S.C. § 3789d(c), or other Federal grant program requirements, must meet two additional requirements:(1) complying with Federal regulations pertaining to the development of an Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP), 28 C.F.R. § 42.301-.308, and (2) submitting to OCR Findings of Discrimination (see 28 C.F.R. § 42.205(5) or 31.202(5)).

1) Meeting the EEOP Requirement

In accordance with Federal regulations, Assurance No. 6 in the Standard Assurances, COPS Assurance No. 8.B, or certain Federal grant program requirements, your organization must comply with the following EEOP reporting requirements:

If your organization has received an award for \$500,000 or more and has 50 or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare an EEOP and submit it to OCR for review within 60 days from the date of this letter. For assistance in developing an EEOP, please consult OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm. You may also request technical assistance from an EEOP specialist at OCR by dialing (202) 616-3208.

If your organization received an award between \$25,000 and \$500,000 and has 50 or more employees, your organization still has to prepare an EEOP, but it does not have to submit the EEOP to OCR for review. Instead, your organization has to maintain the EEOP on file and make it available for review on request. In addition, your organization has to complete Section B of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

If your organization received an award for less than \$25,000; or if your organization has less than 50 employees, regardless of the amount of the award; or if your organization is a medical institution, educational institution, nonprofit organization or Indian tribe, then your organization is exempt from the EEOP requirement. However, your organization must complete Section A of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

2) Submitting Findings of Discrimination

In the event a Federal or State court or Federal or State administrative agency makes an adverse finding of discrimination against your organization after a due process hearing, on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex, your organization must submit a copy of the finding to OCR for review.

Ensuring the Compliance of Subrecipients

If your organization makes subawards to other agencies, you are responsible for assuring that subrecipients also comply with all of the applicable Federal civil rights laws, including the requirements pertaining to developing and submitting an EEOP, reporting Findings of Discrimination, and providing language services to LEP persons. State agencies that make subawards must have in place standard grant assurances and review procedures to demonstrate that they are effectively monitoring the civil rights compliance of subrecipients.

Subject: Categorical Exclusion for Vermont Department of Education

The recipient agrees to assist OJJDP to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and other related federal environmental impact analyses requirements in the use of these grant funds either directly by the recipient or by a subrecipient. Accordingly, prior to obligating grant funds, the grantee agrees to first determine if any of the following activities will be related to the use of the grant funds and, if so, to advise OJJDP and request further NEPA implementation guidance. Recipient understands that this special condition applies to its activities whether or not they are being specifically funded with these grant funds. That is, as long as the activity is being conducted by the recipient, a subrecipient, or any third party and the activity needs to be undertaken in order to use these grant funds, this special condition must first be met. The activities covered by this special condition are: a. new construction; b. minor renovation or remodeling of a property either; (1) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places or; (2) located within a 100-year flood plain; c. a renovation, lease, or any other proposed use of a building or facility that will either; (1) result in a change in its basic prior use or; (2) significantly change its size and; d.
