No Joint Fiscal Committee member has requested that the following items be held for review:

JFO #2483 — \$194,800 grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to the Vermont Department of Economic, Housing and Community Development. These funds will be used to support repair and restoration work on 13 landmark historic buildings around the state. [JFO received 2/09/11]

JFO #2484 — \$561,915 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Vermont Department of Health. These funds will be used to establish an evidence-based nurse home visiting program for families with young children who are identified to be "at risk" by pre-set parameters. This grant is awarded under the Affordable Care Act. One limited service position is associated with this request.

**JFO #2485** — \$211,840 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to the Vermont Department of Corrections. This grant funds two modules for the Vermont Automated Notification Service (VANS) to provide services to victims of domestic violence, and expand services currently available to victims. [*JFO received 2/09/11*]

JFO #2486 — \$420,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Vermont Department of Health. These funds will be used to expand the capacity of the Office of Minority Health by funding one limited service position. [JFO received 2/09/11]

JFO #2488 — \$1,250,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Vermont Department of Health. These funds will be used to establish evidence-based comprehensive sexuality education for high risk and vulnerable youth in Vermont. This grant is awarded under the Affordable Care Act. One limited service position is associated with this request. [JFO received 2/14/11]

**JFO #2489** — \$2,803,443 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Vermont Department of Children and Families. These funds will be used to implement the Learning Together Program, a parent training initiative for adolescent parents and parents-to-be. [*JFO received 2/14/11*]

JFO #2490 — \$48,505 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to the Vermont Department Education. These funds will be used to provide grants to low-income designated schools for investment in their food service programs. [*JFO received 2/14/11*]

**JFO #2491** — \$33,393,402 grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce to the Vermont Telecommunications Authority (VTA). These funds will be used to construct an approximately 770 mile fiber optic communications network designed to provide high-capacity connections to specific community anchor institutions. [*JFO received 2/23/11*]

The Governor's approval may now be considered final. We ask that you inform the Secretary of Administration and your staff of this action.

**JFO #2489** — \$2,803,443 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Vermont Department of Children and Families. These funds will be used to establish evidence-based comprehensive sexuality education for high risk and vulnerable youth in Vermont. [*JFO received 2/14/11*]

**JFO #2490** — \$48,505 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to the Vermont Department Education. These funds will be used to provide grants to low-income designated schools for investment in their food service programs. [*JFO received 2/14/11*]

#### Summary of Personal Responsibility Education Program Vermont Department of Health, January, 2011

The Vermont Department of Health has been awarded an annual grant of \$250,000 for the Personal Responsibility Education Program. This program was authorized under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. Funding for continuing annual awards is available through Federal Fiscal Year 2014. The funds will support the Department of Health, in collaboration with the Department of Education, to establish evidence based comprehensive sexuality education for high risk and vulnerable youth in Vermont.

The approved grant budget contains funds for the MCH division to hire a public health programs administrator as the grant administrator. A major duty of this position is to establish the essential partnerships in Vermont for accessing at risk youth. These partners include groups within the Agency of Human Services (Woodside, Community High School, Department of Children and Families) and community partners (Runaway and Homeless Youth, Youth in Foster Care). This grant will establish an evidence-based curriculum which is medically accurate, changes behavior including delaying sexual activity, increasing condom or contraceptive use and reducing pregnancy among youth.

The Health Department is hereby requesting authorization to receive and expend \$76,443 in new Federal funds in State Fiscal Year 2011 and the establishment of a new limited service position. #### Vermont Teen Pregnancy and Birth Data

In 2005, the U.S. teenage pregnancy rate reached its lowest point in more than 30 years, down 41% since its peak in 1990. However, in 2006, the rate increased for the first time in more than a decade, rising 3%.<sup>1</sup> This trend mirrors the trend we see in Vermont. Although Vermont one of the lowest teen birth rates in the country, the birth rates for teenagers 15-19 increased in 2006 to 20.8 from 18.6 in 2005.<sup>2</sup>

#### Sexual Behaviors

The biennial Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) surveys 8-12 grade students who are in school in Vermont, however it is the most reliable and complete source of youth sexual risk behavior in our state. According to the 2009 Vermont YRBS, 40 percent of students reported having sexual intercourse and overall, 22 percent of sexually active students reporting having used drugs or alcohol before their most recent sexual experience.<sup>3</sup> These rates represent an increase over time. Less than half of sexually active students used a condom during their most recent sexual experience; only slightly more than one third used prescription birth control and 8 percent of students reported not using any method to prevent pregnancy.<sup>4</sup>

#### Vermont Demographics

There are approximately 129,326 children and youth under the age of eighteen living in Vermont. Ten percent of the Vermont population lives below the federal poverty level. 95 percent of Vermonters are white, non-hispanic. In 2009, 97% of Vermont children (aged 0-17) were insured.<sup>6</sup> In 2008 there were 1,200 children in Vermont's foster care system.<sup>7</sup> In 2007, there were 888 homeless children in Vermont.<sup>8</sup> While the number of homeless children in Vermont had been trending downward, the 2007 data represents an upswing in the number of Vermont's homeless children. The Community High School of Vermont (CHS-VT), an accredited independent school run by the Vermont Department of Corrections serves youth in corrections, adjudicated youth and youth who have withdrawn from the public school system. In the FY09 school year CHS-VT had 866 enrollments.<sup>9</sup> According to the CHS-VT FY09 annual report, while their students are required to take 1 credit of health education (180 hours of student work) as a graduation requirement, most schools offer between 49 and 75 classroom hours, and a few reported as few as 2 classroom hours spent in health education. This may largely be due to CHS-VT educator lack of comfort and confidence with teaching topics related to health education, including sex education and limited access to resources.

As a rural state, community-based health education programs and services are few and far between. Many rural schools systems do not have nearby community health centers or other community-based youth oriented service organizations. Out-of-school youth are even further

removed from vital services. Transportation in our rural state is a major barrier to necessary and important supports and services for Vermont's young people.

#### How the program will benefit the population

The Vermont Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) will be designed to meet the needs of Vermont's youth, especially those youth at highest risk for teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections. A collaboratively designed state-wide program will target homeless and runaway youth, youth in foster care, adjudicated youth and youth currently in corrections through a targeted but widespread pregnancy/STI prevention program. Vermont plans to incorporate youth engagement strategies such as on-line learning as a supplement to classroom education, and peer-led and youth engagement initiatives to enhance the likelihood of program success.

In order to reach youth at highest risk for pregnancy and STI's, we will engage currently existing youth-serving organizations and Vermont's 20 community coalitions, in addition to Vermont largest high school, the Community High School of Vermont (CHS-VT), to implement the PREP program. We will develop a cadre of educators to work side-by-side with local organization staff to reach students at the CHS-VT, youth-serving agencies and participating community coalitions.

#### Summary of Vermont's goals:

□ To decrease the number of youth who engage in risky sexual behaviors that may lead to teen pregnancy or sexually transmitted diseases.

- To increase the number of students living in low income households who choose health enhancing behaviors
- To increase the number of students currently in the foster care system who choose health enhancing behaviors
- To increase the number of schools, including the Community High School of Vermont, using research based pregnancy prevention education curricula.
- □ To increase the ability of educators that serve youth-serving organizations to deliver quality pregnancy prevention education.

#### Developing the State Plan

Vermont will engage the currently existing Joint Committee on School Health, which includes representatives from the Vermont Department of Health, the Vermont Department of Education, the Vermont School Nurses Association, and the Vermont Medical Society, in the development of the state plan for PREP implementation. This committee will develop the state PREP plan as its top priority for the 2010-2011 school year. We will partner with several state programs including Department of Children and Families, Planned Parenthood of Northern New England and the Vermont Coalition for Runaway and Homeless Youth Programs to develop this plan. The state plan will include creating medically accurate program models that fit with Vermont Grade Expectations for Health Education, the development of a communications plan and implementation plan, and securing commitment from local partners for program implementation and success. The Vermont Department of Health Maternal and Child Health director, who is both an pediatric and adolescent physician and a certified health educator (grades K-12) will serve as state program director for this program and will oversee the Joint Committee to ensure that

medical accuracy is maintained throughout the planning process, development of curriculum tools and during local implementation of PREP program activities.

#### <u>Assurances</u>

The Vermont Department of Health Maternal and Child Health director will serve as program director and will provide direct program oversight. The program coordinator for implementation, housed at the Vermont Department of Education, will report program activities to the program director monthly, maintaining detailed logs of all program activity. The program coordinator will ensure that all funded programs/sub-awardees will address the required components of PREP, including ensuring that all programs will use or adapt evidence-based pregnancy and STI prevention models. A work group of physicians, STI and pregnancy prevention specialists and health educators will coordinate implementation of evidenced-based programming. Once the state plan is established by the Joint Committee on School Health, all entities receiving PREP funding to implement established program will receive training and all tools necessary for program implementation. All participating entities will provide bi-annual reports of program activities and successes. The program coordinator will also make at least two site-based monitoring visits to all participating entities to ensure adherence to program requirements.
