The Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation (FPR) seeks the approval of four (4) Request for Grant Acceptance (AA-1) forms for 4 separate Federal Awards.

While reconciling our federal awards for our annual Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA) report, we discovered that the AA-1 forms requesting approval for 4 new federal awards were never submitted. All 4 federal awards have expenditures in FY24, and we have received revenue for three of the awards.

The FPR Business Office has experienced turn-over in every single position in the last two years. FPR was without a Grants Manager for many months and the position has also turned over twice in two years. The checks-and-balances were not in place when these awards were executed, and critical workflows were either missed, or staff were not adequately trained. Current staff have been extremely diligent in turning things around by establishing protocol, and this important step is now well known and will be adhered to going forward.

- C. <u>SYSTEM FOR AWARD MANAGEMENT REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT</u> (SAM). VT FPR shall maintain current information in the System for Award Management (SAM) until receipt of final payment. ATTACHMENT A: FOREST SERVICE AWARD PROVISIONS

- A. <u>COLLABORATIVE ARRANGEMENTS</u>. Where permitted by terms of the award and Federal law, VT FPR a may enter into collaborative arrangements with other organizations to jointly carry out activities with Forest Service funds available under this award.
- B. <u>FOREST SERVICE LIABILITY TO THE RECIPIENT</u>. The United States shall not be liable to VT FPR for any costs, damages, claims, liabilities, and judgments that arise in connection with the performance of work under this award, including damage to any property owned by VT FPR or any third party.
- C. <u>NOTICES</u>. Any notice given by the Forest Service or VT FPR will be sufficient only if in writing and delivered in person, mailed, or transmitted electronically by e-mail or fax, as follows:

To the Forest Service Program Manager, at the address specified in the award.

To VT FPR, at the address shown in the award or such other address designated within the award.

Notices will be effective when delivered in accordance with this provision, or on the effective date of the notice, whichever is later.

D. <u>SUBAWARDS</u>. Prior approval is required to issue subawards under this grant. The intent to subaward must be identified in the approved budget and scope of work and approved in the initial award or through subsequent modifications. Approval of each individual subaward is not required, however the cooperator must document that each sub-recipient does NOT have active exclusions in the System for Award Management (sam.gov).

The Cooperator must also ensure that they have evaluated each subrecipient's risk in accordance with 2 CFR 200.332 (b).

Any subrecipient under this award must be notified that they are subject to the OMB guidance in subparts A through F of 2 CFR Part 200, as adopted and supplemented by the USDA in 2 CFR Part 400. Any sub-award must follow the regulations found in 2 CFR 200.331 through .333.

The letter must contain the complainant's name, address, telephone number, and a written description of the alleged discriminatory action in sufficient detail to inform the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights (ASCR) about the nature and date of an alleged civil rights violation. If the material is too small to permit the full Non-Discrimination Statement to be included, the material will, at a minimum, include the alternative statement: "This institution is an equal opportunity provider."

O. DISPUTES.

- 1. Any dispute under this award shall be decided by the Signatory Official. The Signatory Official shall furnish VT FPR a written copy of the decision.
- 2. Decisions of the Signatory Official shall be final unless, within 30 days of receipt of the decision of the Signatory Official, VT FPR appeal(s) the decision to the Forest Service's Director, State & Private Forestry (SPF). Any appeal made under this provision shall be in writing and addressed to the Director, SPF, USDA, Forest Service, Washington, DC 20024. A copy of the appeal shall be concurrently furnished to the Signatory Official.
- 3. In order to facilitate review on the record by the Director, SPF, VT FPR shall be given an opportunity to submit written evidence in support of its appeal. No hearing will be provided.
- 4. A decision under this provision by the Director, SPF is final.
- 5. The final decision by the Director, SPF does not preclude VT FPR from pursuing remedies available under the law.

P. <u>AWARD CLOSEOUT</u>. VT FPR must submit, no later than 120 calendar days after the end date of the period of performance, all financial, performance, and other reports as required by the terms and conditions of the Federal award.

Any unobligated balance of cash advanced to VT FPR must be immediately refunded to the Forest Service, including any interest earned in accordance with 2 CFR 200.344(d).

If this award is closed without audit, the Forest Service reserves the right to disallow and recover an appropriate amount after fully considering any recommended disallowances resulting from an audit which may be conducted later.

- Q. <u>TERMINATION</u>. This award may be terminated, in whole or part pursuant to 2 CFR 200.340.
- R. <u>DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION</u>. VT FPR shall immediately inform the Forest Service if they or any of their principals are presently excluded, debarred, or suspended from entering into covered transactions with the federal government according to the terms of 2 CFR Part 180. ATTACHMENT C: WHISTLEBLOWER NOTICE

Whistleblowers perform an important service to USDA and the public when they come forward with what they reasonably believe to be evidence of wrongdoing. They should never be subject to reprisal for doing so. Federal law protects federal employees as well as personal services contractors and employees of Federal contractors, subcontractors, grantees, and subgrantees against reprisal for whistleblowing. USDA bears the responsibility to ensure that nothing in a non-disclosure agreement which a contractor, subcontractor, grantee, or subgrantee requires their employees to sign should be interpreted as limiting their ability to provide information to the Office of Inspector General (OIG).

41 U.S.C. § 4712 requires the head of each executive agency to ensure that its contractors inform their workers in writing of the rights and remedies under the statute. Accordingly, it is illegal for a personal services contractor or an employee of a Federal contractor, subcontractor, grantee, or subgrantee to be discharged, demoted, or otherwise discriminated against for making a protected whistleblower disclosure. In this context, these categories of individuals are whistleblowers who disclose information that the individual reasonably believes is evidence of one of the following:

- Gross mismanagement of a Federal contract or grant;
- A gross waste of Federal funds;
- An abuse of authority relating to a Federal contract or grant;
- A substantial and specific danger to public health or safety; or
- A violation of law, rule, or regulation related to a Federal contract (including the competition for or negotiation of a contract) or grant.

To be protected under 41 U.S.C. § 4712, the disclosure must be made to one of the following:

- A Member of Congress, or a representative of a committee of Congress;
- The OIG:
- The Government Accountability Office (GAO);
- A Federal employee responsible for contract or grant oversight or management at USDA;
- An otherwise authorized official at USDA or other law enforcement agency;
- A court or grand jury; or
- A management official or other employee of the contractor, subcontractor, or grantee who has the responsibility to investigate, discover, or address misconduct.

Under 41 U.S.C. § 4712, personal services contractors as well as employees of contractors, subcontractors, grantees, or subgrantees may file a complaint with OIG, who will investigate the matter unless they determine that the complaint is frivolous, fails to allege a violation of the prohibition against whistleblower reprisal, or has been addressed in another proceeding. OIG's investigation is then presented to the head of the executive agency who evaluates the facts of the investigation and can order the contractor, subcontractor, grantee, or subgrantee


to take remedial action, such as reinstatement or back pay.

Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) Subpart 3.903, Whistleblower Protections for Contractor Employees, Policy, prohibits government contractors from retaliating against a contract worker for making a protected disclosure related to the contract. FAR Subpart 3.909-1 prohibits the Government from using funds for a contract with an entity that requires its employees or subcontractors to sign internal confidentiality statements prohibiting or restricting disclosures of fraud, waste, or abuse to designated persons. This prohibition does not contravene agreements pertaining to classified information. The regulation also requires contracting officers to insert FAR clause 52.203-17, Contractor Employee Whistleblower Rights and Requirement to Inform Employees of Whistleblower Rights, in all solicitations and contracts that exceed the Simplified Acquisition Threshold as defined in FAR Subpart 3.908. This clause requires notification to contractor employees that they are subject to the whistleblower rights and remedies referenced in 41 U.S.C. § 4712.

Purpose

The purpose of this program is to provide financial, technical and related assistance to State Foresters or equivalent State officials and through them to other agencies and individuals.

The State Fire Assistance program is authorized by the Cooperative Forestry Assistance Act of 1978 (P.L. 95-313) as amended by the Forest Stewardship Act of 1990 (P.L. 101-624). This program supports State forestry agencies with responsibility for wildfire suppression by providing financial support for equipment and training. Funding provided through this program promotes mobilization readiness for efficient suppression of wildfires on all State and private lands to help maintain healthy sustainable forests and promote working relationships and service excellence.

Vermont is a small rural state whose character is defined by healthy, sustainable and well-managed forests. Wildland fire management, prevention, and suppression are aimed at maintaining this character and the components of this State Fire Assistance grant satisfy objectives set forth in the 2017 Vermont Forest Action Plan and The National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy: Northeast Regional Action Plan.

The Division of Forests developed the Vermont 2017 Forest Action Plan to provide strategic direction in managing the state's forests. This plan outlines five Desired Future Conditions and the strategies identified that align with State Fire Assistance grant activity.

- 1. Biological Diversity: Conserve native biological diversity across all landscapes
- 2. **Forest Health and Productivity:** Maintain and enhance forest ecosystem health and ecological productivity
- 3. **Forest Products and Ecosystem Services:** Maintain and enhance forest contribution to ecosystem services
- 4. **Land Ethic:** Maintain and enhance an ethic of respect for the land, sustainable use and exemplary management

5. **Legal, Institutional and Economic Framework:** Vermont has a legal, institutional and economic framework in place for forest conservation and sustainability

Specific goals and strategies in the 2017 Vermont Forest Action Plan that align with the State Fire Assistance program and are associated with the methodology and timeline below are:

- **DFC2 Strategy 16:** Prepare for, mitigate, and respond to emergency events such as wildland fires and significant weather events.
- **DFC4 Strategy 53:** Provide training and technical support, and maintain partnerships for wildland fire prevention and response.
- DFC5 Strategy 57: Work with partners to support organizational viability and capacity

Specific goals from the National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy: Northeast Regional Action Plan which align with the State Fire Assistance program and are associated with the methodology and timeline below are:

- National Strategy Goal 1: Restore and Maintain Resilient Landscapes—Landscapes across all jurisdictions are resilient to fire-related disturbances in accordance with management objectives.
 - Regional Option 1A: Expand the use of prescribed fire as an integral tool to meet management objectives in the Northeast. Develop and adopt prioritized prescribed burning strategies. Adopt a prioritized implementation and coordination strategy among partners through which prescribed burning needs can be met and opportunities maximized.
- **National Strategy Goal 2:** Fire Adapted Communities—Human populations and infrastructure can withstand a wildfire without loss of life and property.
 - Regional Option 2C: Focus on promoting and supporting prevention programs and activities (targeting them toward reducing when and where fires occur).
- **National Strategy Goal 3:** Wildfire Response—All jurisdictions participate in making and implementing safe, effective, efficient risk-based wildfire management decisions.
 - Regional Option 3A: Improve the organizational efficiency and effectiveness of the wildland fire community (pre-suppression and preplanning, administration).

Scope of Work

The purpose of the State Fire Assistance Program (SFA) is to provide financial, technical and related assistance to State Foresters or equivalent State officials and through them to other agencies and individuals. Funding provided through State Fire Assistance should be focused to address critical preparedness needs and hazard mitigation. Critical preparedness needs include firefighter safety, fire planning, firefighter training, increased initial attack capability and mobilization readiness for the efficient suppression and prevention of wildfires on non-Federal forest lands and other non-Federal

lands. Hazard mitigation activities should focus on creating fire-adapted communities by reducing hazardous fuels, developing Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPPs), providing prevention and mitigation education and achieving Firewise programming and community hazard mitigation. SFA funding promotes sustainable economic development, both traditional and non-traditional partnerships and service excellence.

The 2022 and 2023 SICF funds will be utilized specifically for firefighter training with a goal of increasing the number of qualified wildland fire fighters in Vermont. The focus will be on State resources but there will be opportunities to provide trainings to town and municipal resources as well as regional partner resources. There will be a concentration to provide NWCG trainings to build wildland firefighter qualifications and maintain a team of trained responders. We anticipate bringing on needed capacity to provide these trainings and develop a training plan for building state resources which would be available to respond to a wildland fire incident. This would improve the States' readiness capability as well as strengthen state and regional resources for wildland fire management.
