Note: Based on the LOI feedback we received from the NBRC, the scope and outline of our proposed full application was slightly modified. There was overlap with other proposed projects seeking NBRC funding for the Do North Forestry Accelerator. We have removed the Vermont Forest Innovation Cooperative content from the proposed application, which included the funding for the Do North Forestry Accelerator. All other LOI objectives and deliverables remain in the proposed final application. With the progress FPR has made on the Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap within the last month and the Roadmap now moving toward implementation, we have taken the opportunity to place the proposed NBRC-funded project in the context of the larger Roadmap. Our proposed grant application now focuses on supporting the first three years of Roadmap implementation, Phase One, which aligns with NBRC goals and priorities. Our original request for NBRC funds in our LOI was \$427,196.88, and we are now requesting \$565,640.88. The reason for the increased budget amount is to support the final identified application collaborators, and provide the funds necessary for them to support the implementation of Phase One of the Roadmap.

Narrative

RATING CRITERIA 1 – ALIGNMENT WITH PURPOSE, GOAL, AND INVESTMENT CRITERIA OF THE FEP

OVERALL PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Vermont Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation (FPR), in partnership with key collaborators, is seeking funding to implement Phase One of the <u>Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap</u>. The Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap (Roadmap) was established by the Vermont General Assembly in 2021 to develop strategies and a framework to strengthen, modernize, promote, and protect Vermont's forest products sector and broader forest economy. The Vermont General Assembly charged FPR with developing the Roadmap in collaboration and consultation with an <u>Advisory Panel</u> composed of representatives from forest products enterprises, public agencies, investors, forest landowners, foresters, loggers, truckers, wood products manufacturers, recreation professionals, education, trade organizations, and other partners. In addition to the funded collaborators, this proposed project is supported by the Roadmap Advisory Panel. To date, the work to develop the Roadmap has resulted in a <u>project update report</u>, with the final Roadmap to be submitted to the legislature by January 2024.




Figure 1. Roadmap strategic framework.

The Roadmap provides a strategic framework consisting of five pillars that support the Roadmap's overall vision (Figure 1). The vision represents the preferred future for Vermont's forest economy: a strong forest products sector and a prosperous forest economy.

This preferred future was identified with the Advisory Panel and validated through multiple stakeholder and public engagement sessions reaching more than 1,000 people. For each pillar, the Advisory Panel

spent considerable time identifying, refining, and developing objectives and actions needed to achieve this vision. For Phase One, specific ready-to-implement Roadmap actions were identified with collaborative partners. The proposed project for Phase One implementation will focus on actions that fall under Pillars 2, 3, 4, and 5 as these actions align best with the scope of the FEP funding opportunity.

Pillar 2 – Business Environment and Conditions

Creating a business environment and workforce that supports the competitiveness of the Vermont forest products sector.

In Phase One, FPR and partners will take a collaborative, multi-pronged approach to promote forest products entrepreneurship, support forest-based businesses, and develop the next generation of workers. Pillar 2 actions include:

- 2A. Attracting the next generation of workers by funding a statewide forest industry workforce coordinator.
 - Recruit and hire a part-time School Outreach & Education Coordinator.
 - Promote use of forest products industry applied learning opportunities, skill sharing, and mentoring resources in local schools.
 - Identify existing resources; increase awareness of existing resources among school faculty and staff; facilitate cross-district knowledge transfer and collaboration with regional and statewide gatherings.
 - Establish and maintain relationships with high school technical programs in natural resources and forestry.
 - Oconduct an intensive outreach campaign to Vermont and interstate high schools with technical forestry and natural resources programs. There are an estimated 17 high schools that have a forestry/natural resources technical program or are affiliated with a career center that has a forestry/natural resources technical program. This will include direct outreach to program staff and faculty, newsletters (email and print mail), and offering student memberships to related professional organizations.
 - Coordinate internships and/or apprenticeships for high school and technical students, as appropriate based on age.
 - O Provide opportunities for hands-on learning and experience in the forest products industry through internships and/or apprenticeships for students and recent graduates of high school forestry/natural resources technical programs. Assigned mentors will help students and recent graduates identify age-appropriate opportunities and connect them with forest products businesses. Vermont forest products industry leaders have volunteered to serve as mentors for this project.
- 2B. Improving the coordination, accessibility, and effectiveness of technical assistance for new forest enterprises by identifying gaps in current offerings and expanding services for business start-ups, business skills development, continuing education, and regulatory compliance.
 - Evaluate technical assistance needs of businesses in collaborating stakeholder and collaborator programs.
 - Conduct outreach to assess needs and attract clients. This will include attending association meetings; direct outreach to businesses; newsletters (email and print mail),

social media; and collaborative outreach campaigns with industry organizations. We will work with partner organizations (including FPR, Vermont Sustainable Jobs Fund, Vermont Logger Education to Enhance Professionalism (LEAP), Vermont Forest Products Association (VFPA), Northern Forest Center (NFC), and others) to assess business coaching needs and gaps in workshop content, and will work with contracted business advisors to meet those gaps. We will develop workshop content in partnership with qualified specialists – this may include workshops on accessing capital, analyzing profitability and efficiency, marketing, and other topics.

- Deliver Individualized Coaching & Workshops
 - o Individualized coaching: Match 18 clients by the end of year 3 of the grant with appropriate advisors and coaches to meet their needs, and will contract with those advisors to deliver in-depth assistance. Depending on needs, this may range from 20-100 hours of assistance on business plan development, cash-flow management, analyzing new enterprises, creating accurate financial statement, transferring businesses to the next generation, and more. All in-depth clients will conclude the program with a written business plan, transfer plan, or other comprehensive planning document that includes up to date financial statements.
 - Workshops: Based on the needs assessment conducted in activity 1, contract with qualified specialists to deliver workshop content, and/or partner with existing certification program and continuing education programs where businesses regularly go for education, such as LEAP. We expect to hold approximate 6 workshops or other cohort-based educational programs, reaching at least 50 businesses by the end of year 3
- Monitoring & Evaluation of Technical Service Support
 - Monitor progress on business coaching engagement, and make sure that all clients' needs are being met over the three years grant duration. We will use a streamlined evaluation for workshop attendees to collect feedback and outcomes and will use a more extensive evaluation to measure impact from individualized coaching. We have extensive experience collecting data on program outcomes, including changes in skills, jobs, income, and capital accessed. We expect that 95% of participants will improve business management skills as a result of participation.

Pillar 3 – Research, Innovation, and Technology

Promoting innovation and adaptability in the Vermont forest products sector by supporting technological development, cross-sector collaboration, and processing capability for both new and existing forest products.

In Phase One, FPR and partners will focus efforts on creating and retaining jobs, expanding markets for forest products, and promoting economic development. Pillar 3 actions include:

- 3A. Convening a working group to identify opportunities to facilitate cross-sector knowledge sharing and examine emerging trends in regional and global value chains and markets that affect demand for local processing and products.
 - Identify opportunities to facilitate cross-sector knowledge.

- Conduct outreach among existing and new stakeholders and partners working in forest products innovation to build additional connections and relationships with aligned business sectors.
- Leverage existing communications channels to inform and share with Roadmap stakeholders, as well as additional state and regional partners, the evolving strategies and actions included in the Roadmap.
- Study emerging trends in regional and global value chains.
 - Organize, design and facilitate quarterly convenings of stakeholders, across the forest industry supply chain, engaged in the Roadmap's Research, Innovation and Technology Pillar to identify and communicate about existing or emerging trends and markets.
- Identify markets that affect demand for local processing and products.
 - Facilitate one learning journey for a set of stakeholders to see an innovative technology or product (e.g., University of Maine at Orono's Forest Bioproducts Research Institute), and get exposed to emerging businesses, research or commercialization opportunities.

Pillar 4 – Industry Reputation and Market Profile

Strengthening positive market and consumer perceptions by communicating the importance of working forests and promoting the benefits and contributions of Vermont's forest products and forest economy.

In Phase One, FPR and partners will coordinate efforts to research, promote, and support wood energy throughout the state and region, advance Vermont's and the region's goals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through renewable energy, and support sustainable forest management with viable markets for lower economic value wood. Pillar 4 actions include:

- 4A. Re-establishing the Statewide Wood Energy Team (SWET) to expand Vermont's market leadership and provide science-based wood energy information for the region.
 - Convene SWET and meet four times per year.
 - Convene Vermont and regional stakeholders engaged in wood energy and bring them together for an hour quarterly meeting each year. The goal will be to present on a current issue/topic, share current work and identify collaborative projects.
 - Provide outreach and educational information to organizational stakeholders.
 - SWET and other colleagues will update the 2016 Clean Energy Development Fund Carbon Emissions from Advanced Wood Heating in Vermont and the Advanced Wood Heating in Vermont Roadmap created by the Biomass Energy Resource Center (BERC) in 2018.
 - o Create a messaging video using the updated science-based documents.
 - Develop and conduct a statewide Residential Fuel Assessment Survey.
 - Contract with a qualified organization to conduct the Vermont statewide Residential Fuel Assessment Survey. The last fuel assessment survey was in 2018-2019 heating season.

Pillar 5 – Forest Economy and Rural Communities

Protecting and enriching the positive impact of the forest economy on the rural communities embedded in the Vermont forest landscape.

In Phase One, FPR and partners will pilot a proactive outreach and education model to build support and awareness for a strong forest economy by engaging members of the outdoor recreation community and the general public in forest management, the regional and local use of forest products, and the role of working lands in Vermont. Pillar 5 actions include:

- 5A. Developing demonstration sites and conducting outreach to educate diverse audiences about sustainable forest management and the forest products industry.
 - Identify demonstration sites.
 - Select at least five woodlots or managed forest parcels that are publicly accessible, are actively engaged in forest management, that exemplify sound forest management practices, and that are suitable for public or community engagement events. Sites will be selected in consultation with key collaborators and forest economy stakeholders. At least one site will focus on recreational users.
 - Organize and host public/community events.
 - Organize and host at least one event at each demonstration site during the grant period. With five demonstration sites, we anticipate 1-2 events per year. Events will target diverse audiences and use multiple delivery formats, including in-person and virtual tours. Events will include presentations by specialists and experts on a variety of topics, including: landowner goals for forest management; the roles of land managers, foresters, loggers, and log truckers in forest management; the impact of working forests on the forest economy; forest product value chain linkages to forest management; and forest products users.
 - Participants will be surveyed to determine the impact of engagement with the demonstration site on their views, understanding, and expectations of forest management and the forest economy.
 - Develop supporting outreach and educational materials.
 - Design and produce temporary and/or moveable informational and educational signage for use at demonstration site events and demonstration site event marketing materials, including email campaigns, newsletters (email and print mail), and social media posts.
 - In collaboration with the School Outreach and Education Coordinator and key stakeholders, develop and promote a lesson plan for grades 3-5 to integrate demonstration projects into the curriculum, including alignment with the Next Generation Science Standards.
 - Develop adaptable guidelines for forest economy demonstration sites and create case studies documenting the process of establishing forest economy demonstration sites, including the different approaches to outreach and engagement and templates for outreach, education, and marketing materials.

Phase One of the Roadmap is critical to ensure a sustainable plan for implementation over the next three years, and to enable the plan to gain traction and support from key industry stakeholders. The Roadmap planning process was led by FPR and a consulting team, Future iQ, whose contract will end in January

2024, after which FPR will lead implementation of the ten-year Roadmap and oversee Phase One (Collaborative Implementation). However effective implementation of the Roadmap will require continued engagement, networking and collaboration among the stakeholders involved in the planning process.

CHALLENGE THE PROJECT SEEKS TO ADDRESS

Vermont's forest economy is an important source of income, employment, and environmental benefits for the state and its residents. Vermont's forest products sector, as part of the forest economy, generates \$1.4 billion dollars in direct economic contributions and 10,555 jobs statewide each year. Vermont's forest products sector faces many challenges today, including the loss of local markets, supply chain disruptions, workforce shortages, inadequate infrastructure, aging technology, and the impacts of severe weather events associated with climate change. These ongoing challenges threaten the long-term viability and success of Vermont's forest products sector. Since the early 1990s, Vermont has experienced a steady decline in the number of sawmills (-78%), forest product utilization (-69%), and the harvest of Vermont forest products (-21%). Recognizing the ongoing challenges facing the forest products sector, the Vermont General Assembly established the Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap to strengthen, modernize, protect, and promote Vermont's forest products sector. After extensive stakeholder engagement, the Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap project update report presents a preferred future and vision of "Growing a Strong Vermont Forest Products Sector and Prosperous Forest Economy." The proposed project will support the regions forest products sector with a framework focused on supporting forest product businesses, the importance of the forest products industry on the region, workforce and education development, and outreach and messaging.

ALIGNMENT WITH INVESTMENT GOALS, STATED PURPOSE, AND GOALS OF FEP

Project activities associated with Pillar 2(a), Pillar 4, and Pillar 5 actions directly align with the NBRC Forest Economy Program's investment priorities 1, 3, 4, and 5, and are well positioned to meet the program's goal of supporting the forest-based economy throughout the region. This work will leverage existing regional partnerships and plans by building on the Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap project update report, the 2017 Vermont Forest Action Plan, the 2022 Vermont Comprehensive Energy Plan, and the 2020 Northeast Wood Markets Retention and New Market Recruitment Initiative reports.

Project activities associated with Pillar 2(b) and Pillar 3 actions directly align with the NBRC Forest Economy Program's investment priorities 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, and are well positioned to meet the program's goal of supporting the forest-based economy throughout the region. This work will leverage existing regional partnerships and plans by building on the Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap project update report, the 2017 Vermont Forest Action Plan, the Vermont 2020 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy, and the 2020 Northeast Wood Markets Retention and New Market Recruitment Initiative reports.

COLLABORATING PARTNERS AND THEIR ROLES

Pillar 2 – Business Environment and Conditions

Vermont Housing & Conservation Board (VHCB) Farm & Forest Viability Program was formed

by the Vermont General Assembly at the Vermont Housing & Conservation Board in 2003 to support working lands businesses to improve their economic viability. VHCB will expand our program for individualized business coaching and business development workshops to Vermont's forest products sector, in alignment with the goals of Vermont's Forest Future Strategic Roadmap. This project will allow VHCB's Farm & Forest Viability Program, a nationally recognized model for delivering business assistance, to engage a minimum of 68 forest sector businesses. VHCB consistently helps businesses who participate increase their sales, profitability, financial management skills, and other quality of life improvements. Some statistics from participants completing the program in 2022/23 include:

- 100% of clients report improving their skill level in understanding their financials
- 100% of clients report improving their skill level in finding resources or specialists to assist business development
- 98% of clients report improving their skill level in short- & long-term financial planning
- 98% of clients report improving their skill level in overall business planning
- 92% of clients report improving their skill level in accounting and bookkeeping
- 92% of clients report improving their skill level in production & operations management
- 65% of clients increased their net income
- Over \$5.1 million in grants and loans accessed by clients
- 41% of businesses enrolled increased their numbers of full-time employees

VHCB plans to use NBRC funds to provide 18 forest products businesses with individualized business development support, and deliver at least 6 workshops or cohort learning programs reaching an additional 50 or more businesses. Ninety-five percent (95%) of participants will improve business management skills through participation in the program.

Vermont Forest Products Association (VFPA) is a trade association representing all aspects of the forest products industry and member companies throughout Vermont and the surrounding region. VFPA will recruit and hire a part-time School Outreach & Education Coordinator, lead engagement efforts with local schools and career centers, and coordinate internships/apprenticeships with local forest products enterprises.

Pillar 3 – Research, Innovation, and Technology

Vermont Sustainable Jobs Fund (VSJF), through its Forest Products Development Program, has built a network of forest economy businesses and service providers and convenes stakeholders annually through events like the Vermont Forest Industry Summit. VSJF has served on the Project Team leading development of the Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap and will play a key role helping FPR develop an implementation strategy for the 10-year Roadmap. VSJF also is a key collaborator on a new regional initiative, the Coalition of Northern Forest Innovation Research (CONFIR) that aims to develop a regional forest products innovation hub that attracts new businesses in the sector to locate and grow in Northern New England, as well as other local or regional efforts to develop new markets for forest and wood products. VSJF aims to create and retain jobs, expand local forest product markets, and boost economic development.

Pillar 4 – Industry Reputation and Market Profile

The Northern Forest Center (NFC) supports Maine, New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont and New York with leadership, investment, and project management for the forest products industry. NFC leads the

Feel Good Heat campaign, working to build consumer awareness and demand for modern wood heat as an alternative to fuel oil and propane; a strategy that saves money, reduces climate impacts, and provides an important market for wood residuals. NFC will support the proposed project with a science-based collaborative messaging video about wood heat and forest management. NFC will participate in the Vermont SWET and act as an advisor in updating the Clean Energy Development Fund Carbon Emissions from Advanced Wood Heating in Vermont and updating the Wood Energy Roadmap documents (last updated in 2016). These documents in return will support the video messaging development to be shared with the NBRC region.

Vermont Energy Investment Corporation (VEIC) was founded in 1986 to reduce the economic and environmental costs of energy use. Since 1999, VEIC has administered the nation's first statewide, regulated "energy efficiency utility," Efficiency Vermont. VEIC will support the proposed project with scientific information needed to update the Clean Energy Development Fund Carbon Emissions from Advanced Wood Heating in Vermont and the Wood Energy Roadmap documents.

Pillar 5 – Forest Economy and Rural Communities

Vermont Woodlands Association (VWA) provides education, training, and management assistance to private forest landowners and a platform to coordinate networking and information sharing opportunities. VWA will participate in the selection of forest economy demonstration sites, lead the organization and hosting of public and/or community engagement events, coordinate expert speakers with other project partners, and assist in the development of outreach and educational materials related to the forest economy demonstration sites.

Kingdom Trails Association (KTA) manages an extensive non-motorized, multi-use recreation trail network in the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont and will participate in the selection of at least one forest economy demonstration site in a high-use recreation location, engage in outreach and education efforts related to the forest economy and outdoor recreation, and support the development of outreach and education materials related to the forest economy demonstration sites.

RATING CRITERIA 2: BUDGET AND WORK PLAN

WORK PLAN

The proposed work plan (Table 1) represents the implementation of Phase One of the Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap. These actions were identified in the Roadmap planning process as ready for implementation with strategic collaborators in place. This work plan will be the first step in implementing the Roadmap and will be key to developing an engaged, active, and collaborative framework for moving all Roadmap actions forward in the future.

ANTICIPATED OBSTACLES

Pillar 2 – Business Environment and Conditions

2A. Attracting the next generation of workers by funding a statewide forest industry workforce coordinator.

While Vermont is a small state, our rural school infrastructure presents challenges to initiating a comprehensive outreach program in a widely dispersed community. Additionally, the natural resources and forestry technical programs at Vermont high schools are experiencing high staff turnover. To mitigate these challenges, the School Outreach and Education Coordinator job description will clearly state the travel requirements for the position and the activity budget will include a substantial transportation stipend to support an intensive outreach schedule with frequent contact points.

2B. Improving the coordination, accessibility, and effectiveness of technical assistance for new forest enterprises by identifying gaps in current offerings and expanding services for business start-ups, business skills development, continuing education, and regulatory compliance.

Businesses can be hard to reach, industry associations can be stretched for capacity to engage; new methods of outreach and types of services may need to be developed to meet needs. During the pandemic most workshops stopped, and it may be difficult to re-build significant momentum; businesses are often stretched for capacity to engage and struggle with profitability; advisors will need to support businesses with many pivots/innovations to meet changing market conditions. During monitoring of clients, we may find that they have additional needs that the program is not currently set up to accommodate. We will need to either make quality referrals or identify new contractors to meet those needs.

Pillar 3 – Research, Innovation, and Technology

3A. Convening a working group to identify opportunities to facilitate cross-sector knowledge sharing and examine emerging trends in regional and global value chains and markets that affect demand for local processing and products.

The only obstacle we anticipate at this time is the availability of stakeholders to fully participate in working group meetings or a learning journey. We're confident we can find ways to make participation easy and worthwhile for stakeholders.

Pillar 4 – Industry Reputation and Market Profile

4A. Re-establishing the Statewide Wood Energy Team (SWET) to expand Vermont's market leadership and provide science-based wood energy information for the region.

Participation in the SWET quarterly meetings. In anticipation of this, FPR, The Department of Public Service and VEIC have discussed the SWET member participants and have a comprehensive list. We will be reaching out to the identified participants via the person with the strongest current working relationship. We have drafted an overall objective and focus for this team to encourage participation. We have an alternative participant list for those who feel they cannot attend.

Pillar 5 – Forest Economy and Rural Communities

5A. Developing demonstration sites and conducting outreach to educate diverse audiences about sustainable forest management and the forest products industry.

Forest economy demonstration sites are an opportunity to expose forest users and the general public to exemplary forest management and the forest products value chain where and when it occurs on the landscape; however, extreme weather can prevent demonstration sites from showing active forest management. In Vermont, many forest management and harvesting activities were delayed due to the catastrophic rainfall and flooding that occurred during the summer months this year. If forest management activities are delayed during the grant period, the forest economy demonstration sites will focus on highlighting forest management in various pre- and post-harvest conditions to expose forest users and the general public to the advance preparation and realized outcomes of forest management. While this adaptation would not expose forest users and the general public to active forest management or harvest, it provides a unique opportunity to increase the understanding of the challenges that a changing climate poses to land managers and the forest economy.

RATING CRITERIA 3: COLLABORATION AND CAPACITY

The proposed project has the support and collaborative capacity of the Roadmap Advisory Panel, numerous stakeholders and agencies involved in the planning process, and the Vermont General Assembly. The Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap was established by the Vermont General Assembly in 2021 with an appropriation to support FPR in hiring a consultant and conducting the strategic planning process to create the Roadmap. The 2024 budget, as currently proposed, includes an additional appropriation for Roadmap implementation.

FPR is equipped to implement and lead the proposed project. FPR has successfully led the Roadmap process for the past two years. The proposed project will be a continuation of this work. The FPR Forest Economy Program has been heavily involved in managing the Roadmap strategic planning process, working directly with the Commissioner and Director of Forests. This project will be managed and implement by the Forest Economy Program in collaboration with the FPR Business Office, which will assist with grant administration. FPR positions that will support the proposed project implementation and grant management include, but are not limited to:

The Roadmap has been an extensive collaborative process outside of FPR. To date, the process has focused on exploring stakeholder perceptions, building future scenarios, and developing a strategic framework. This work has involved extensive stakeholder engagement. To date, nearly 1,000 people

have participated in surveys and workshops, demonstrating FPR's desire to engage staff and the public in the process, which has included:

- Over 850 survey responses providing feedback on the Roadmap strategies;
- Over 50 people participated in a two-part workshop to help refine the goals and strategies;
- Nearly 20 virtual and in-person workshops and project update sessions to provide general feedback on the Roadmap as it developed;
- Five industry roundtables across the state to provide feedback on the Roadmap development;
- A Strategic Pillar workshop with approximately 70 stakeholders to provide feedback;
- An online Project Portal with weekly updates;
- 10 newsletters accessible to all community members; and
- Monthly Advisory Panel meetings, including quarterly in-person meetings.

The strategic planning process and public outreach conducted throughout the development of the Roadmap is a testament to FPR's ability and commitment to implementing the proposed project and maintaining established working partnerships to build a strong forest products support network. FPR recognizes that the collaborative nature of the Roadmap will increase state and regional impact by leveraging relationships and resources to implement the proposed activities for this project and beyond. This work will leverage existing regional partnerships and plans by building on the Vermont Forest Future Strategic Roadmap Project Update Report, the 2017 Vermont Forest Action Plan, the Vermont 2020 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy, and the 2020 Northeast Wood Markets Retention and New Market Recruitment Initiative reports. FPR offers numerous and diverse grant programs. Past federal grants management by the FPR Forest Economy Program include USFS Landscape Scale Restoration (multiple), USFS Wood Innovations (multiple), and USDA Rural Energy Development Assistance grants.

RATING CRITERIA 4: CLARITY OF OUTCOMES

To implement and track the identified intended outcomes and measures project success, we use a vision, objective, strategy, and action approach. Each objective (identified as a pillar in the Roadmap) is supported by strategies that have measurable action items. For this proposed project, success will be measured by the implementation of the identified action items identified in Table 2 for each pillar.

RATING CRITERIA 5: SUSTAINABLE INNOVATION

The Roadmap process has been strategic with strong partnerships and research. The strategic Roadmap project has resulted in key actions to build a robust forest products sector and prosperous forest economy. Lessons learned from previous work have been incorporated to create a focused and achievable Roadmap. The volume of previous work highlights the importance of the forest economy and the significant contributions it makes to Vermont, both in terms of economic impact and recreational, cultural, and environmental benefits.

The goal of the Roadmap is to assess the current state of Vermont's forest economy and identify opportunities to strengthen, modernize, promote, and protect the forest products sector for the future. As part of the Roadmap development, parties representing all users of Vermont forests have participated in a robust public engagement process. The Roadmap is designed to protect the long-term viability of forest-based businesses through actionable strategies that:

- Increase sustainable economic development and jobs in the Vermont forest economy,
- Promote ways to expand the workforce and strengthen forest product enterprises,
- Promote the importance of healthy, resilient, and sustainably managed working forests, and
- Strengthen, modernize, promote, and protect Vermont's forest products sector.

The Roadmap also builds on previous research and studies to increase the sustainability of the plan. Throughout the process, previous research was reviewed and incorporated to understand what has changed and where there have been successes. An in-depth analysis of previous work was conducted to explore recommendations and their continued relevance to the development of the Roadmap. In addition to this industry-specific literature review, the Roadmap project examined macro trends related to changing societal values, mass urbanization and its impact, and industrial innovation. These trends helped inform the strategic framework and actions. A selected subset of these actions will be implemented with the proposed project to support the regional industry with innovative ideas to improve existing markets.

RATING CRITERIA 6: COST SHARE AND MATCH

For the proposed project FPR and collaborating partners have a 1:1 match. We have \$279,787.50 in secured match both in-kind and cash from FPR and collaborators. We have an additional \$300,000.00 expected to be appropriated by the legislature for the 2024 budget to implement the Roadmap. The proposed project has more than the match required for NBRC.

FPR Wood Energy and Forest Products Specialist: 25% of this position's time will be used toward delivering the proposed grant objectives. The amount was calculated at 48 weeks per year for 3 years equaling 1,440 hours over the three-year grant period, at a rate of \$33.33 for a total cost of \$47,995. Half of the salary will be paid for with requested NBRC grant funds at \$23,997.60 and half will be used for match at \$23,997.60. 
