Joint Resolution Adopted in Concurrence

J.R.H. 17.

Joint resolution originating in the House of the following title was read and adopted in concurrence and is as follows:

Joint resolution accepting a Federal Emergency Grant designated as JFO #2371 to repair damage resulting from the December 2008 ice storm.

Offered by: Representatives Obuchowski of Rockingham, Ancel of Calais, Larson of Burlington and Heath of Westford

Whereas, on December 12, 2008, a severe ice storm struck the southern Vermont counties of Bennington and Windham, causing extensive damage to public facilities belonging to the state, to local governments, and to nonprofit organizations, and

Whereas, the severity of the damage resulted in the governor's declaring these counties as disaster areas in accordance with federal law, thus qualifying them for possible federal financial assistance to help pay for the required repair work, and

Whereas, the Federal Emergency Management Agency has recently awarded the state of Vermont a grant totaling \$825,845.40 to help pay the repair costs, and the Joint Fiscal Office has designated that grant as JFO #2371, and

Whereas, pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 5(1), the governor has sent his written approval of the state acceptance of the grant to the Joint Fiscal Office, and

Whereas, in accordance with 32 V.S.A. § 5(2), when the general assembly is in session, the governor's acceptance is final after 30 days if a member of the joint fiscal committee does not request that it be held for legislative approval, and

Whereas, the urgency of proceeding with the work for which these funds are intended necessitates ending the statutory waiting period as quickly as possible, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly accepts a Federal Emergency Management Agency grant designated as JFO #2371.

Dear Governor Douglas:

I have declared a major disaster under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5207 (the Stafford Act), for the State of Vermont due to damage resulting from a severe winter storm during the period of December 11-18, 2008. I have authorized Federal relief and recovery assistance in the affected area.

Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation will be provided. Consistent with the requirement that Federal assistance be supplemental, any Federal funds provided under the Stafford Act for Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation will be limited to 75 percent of the total eligible costs in the designated areas.

The Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), will coordinate Federal assistance efforts and designate specific areas eligible for such assistance. The Federal Coordinating Officer will be Mr. Mark H. Landry of FEMA. He will consult with you and assist in the execution of the FEMA-State Agreement for disaster assistance governing the expenditure of Federal funds.

Dear Mr. President:

Under the provisions of Section 401 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5206 (Stafford Act), and implemented by 44 CFR § 206.36, I request that you declare a major disaster for the State of Vermont as a result of excessive ice accretion that began on December 11, 2008 with emergency response ending December 18, 2008, that caused extended power outages due to significant damage to electric and telephone utilities, town roads blocked by debris and tree damage, loss of municipal and state business, and activation of the Red Cross for emergency shelters. The Vermont counties impacted to the highest degree of eligible damage include Bennington and Windham. Initial damage estimates exceed \$1.054 million. The ice damage was concentrated in the southern counties while the rest of the state received snow and sleet. This storm also caused extensive power outages and ice damage to the other New England States of New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and Maine.

In response to the situation, I have taken appropriate action under State law and directed the execution of the State Emergency Operations Plan through the Commissioner of the Department of Public Safety beginning on December 11, 2008 and continuing in operation through December 18th in accordance with Section 401 of the Stafford Act. In accordance with the State Emergency Operations Plan, the following State Agency Support functions were activated: Department of Public Safety, Vermont Emergency Management Division and Vermont State Police; Department of Public Service; Agency of Agriculture; Agency of Natural Resources; Agency of Administration; Agency of Transportation; Agency of Human Services and its Department of Health; and the American Red Cross. The communities of Athens, Halifax, Readsboro, Wilmington and Whitingham, Vermont each requested a local declaration of emergency due to excessive debris and damage impact to their public infrastructure. I declared through Executive Order that Bennington, Orange, Windsor

and Windham counties in Vermont were in a State of Emergency from December 11th through December 18th, 2008.

The State of Vermont has a standard State Mitigation Plan that was approved by FEMA in November of 2007. Approximately 85% of Vermont communities have FEMA approved local mitigation plans with the remaining communities' plans in various stages of draft form.

Joint Federal, State, and local surveys of the damaged areas were conducted on December 29-30, 2008 in Windham and Bennington counties. Preliminary assessments by State and local officials indicated the most severe impacts were to town and state roads that received debris damage and to municipal utilities in the town of Readsboro and the village of Jacksonville.

I have determined that this incident is of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capabilities of the State and the affected local governments and that supplementary Federal assistance is necessary. I am specifically requesting Federal assistance utilizing the following federal programs: Public Assistance for the counties of Bennington and Windham, Vermont. The State of Vermont also requests that the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (Section 404) be available throughout the State. No direct federal assistance was requested during the event.

Preliminary estimates of the types and amount of assistance needed under the Stafford Act are tabulated in Attachment A.

The following information is furnished on the nature and amount of State and local resources that have been or will be used to alleviate the conditions of this disaster. The following State agencies were directed to provide immediate assistance as a result of the extensive power outages and debris damage: Department of Public Safety, Vermont Emergency Management Division and Vermont State Police; Department of Public Service; Agency of Agriculture; Agency of Natural Resources; Agency of Administration; Agency of Transportation; Agency of Human Services and its Department of Health; and the American Red Cross. The ice storm that caused extreme damage in Bennington and Windham counties resulted from a storm system that according to the National Weather Service officially began on December 11, 2008 and went through December 12, 2008. A description of the storm system prepared by the National Weather Service office that serves most of Vermont is attached as Attachment B.

Utilities reported there were approximately 40,000 customers out of power, some for up to five days. Vermont Route 9, a major connector between Brattleboro and Bennington, was closed for two days. Town and state road crews worked for five days to clear the debris on public roads and to open access routes for emergency vehicles and utility crews. Public and private utility companies brought line crews in from

Pennsylvania and Canada for additional help to restore power. The Red Cross supported seven shelters and warming stations where 612 meals were served. Local shelters were also open for several days while power was out. Several private properties received some damage and there was limited business loss, which was not enough to meet the threshold to seek SBA Disaster Assistance or an IA declaration.

I certify that for this major disaster, the State and local governments will assume all applicable non-Federal share of costs required by the Stafford Act. Total state/local share expenditures are expected to exceed \$264,000.

In addition, I anticipate the need for debris removal, which poses an immediate threat to lives, public health, and safety. Pursuant to Sections 403 and 407 of the Stafford Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5170b & 5173, the State agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the United States of America for any claims arising from the removal of debris or wreckage for this disaster. The State agrees that debris removal from public and private property will not occur until the landowner signs an unconditional authorization for the removal of debris.

I have designated Barbara Farr, Director of Vermont Emergency Management, as the State Coordinating Officer for this request. Ms. Farr will work with the Federal Emergency Management Agency in damage assessments and may provide further information or justification on my behalf.

Weather Summary for Winter Storm 11-12 December 2008

A significant winter storm affected much of the northeast United States, including Vermont during the late afternoon of December 11th through the early morning hours of December 12th. In Vermont, the most significant impact was the freezing rain and subsequent ice accumulation of ½ to ¾ of an inch across southern Vermont causing thousands to lose power for several days, making it the worst Ice Storm to affect Vermont since January 1998




Figure 1. Surface Map at 7 am EST December 11, 2008

This storm system developed in the Gulf of Mexico during the morning hours of December 11th and moved along an old cold frontal boundary to a position near New York City on the morning of December 12th (Figures 1-3). This cold frontal boundary delivered much colder air across much of New England and New York during the night of December 10th and laid the groundwork for sub-freezing surface temperatures for this event. The following three figures demonstrate the convergence of two systems into one system over two days causing the icing in southern Vermont on December 12, 2008.





Figure 2. Surface Map at 7 pm EST December 11, 2008



This storm had a deep, moisture laden connection to the Gulf of Mexico with an ample moisture supply which delivered significant amounts of precipitation (1 to 3 inches water equivalent) to portions of central and southern Vermont (Figure 4).

Precipitation fell in the form of snow across northern and central Vermont, while across southern Vermont, warmer air aloft resulted in rain. With temperatures at or below freezing for the entire storm, much of this rain resulted in substantial ice accumulating on trees, power lines and roads. Isolated areas of light icing also occurred in portions of the Upper Connecticut River Valley.




Figure 5. December 12, 2008 Storm Total Snowfall and Ice Graphic (Northeast)

Snowfall accumulations of 6 to 8 inches were common across northern and Central Vermont (Figure 5). Ice accumulations ranged from 1/4" to 1/2" across south-central Vermont with widespread 1/2" to 3/4" amounts of ice across Bennington and Windham Counties. This was the most severe ice storm to affect Vermont since the disastrous 1998 storm. Local reports of up to one inch of ice accumulation at higher elevations were received.




Figure 6 and Table 1. Ice Accumulations Reported to the National Weather Service

I have declared a major disaster under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5207 (the Stafford Act), for the State of Vermont due to damage resulting from a severe winter storm during the period of December 11-18, 2008. I have authorized Federal relief and recovery assistance in the affected area.

Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation will be provided. Consistent with the requirement that Federal assistance be supplemental, any Federal funds provided under the Stafford Act for Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation will be limited to 75 percent of the total eligible costs in the designated areas.

The Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), will coordinate Federal assistance efforts and designate specific areas eligible for such assistance. The Federal Coordinating Officer will be Mr. Mark H. Landry of FEMA. He will consult with you and assist in the execution of the FEMA-State Agreement for disaster assistance governing the expenditure of Federal funds.

Dear Mr. President:

Under the provisions of Section 401 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5206 (Stafford Act), and implemented by 44 CFR § 206.36, I request that you declare a major disaster for the State of Vermont as a result of excessive ice accretion that began on December 11, 2008 with emergency response ending December 18, 2008, that caused extended power outages due to significant damage to electric and telephone utilities, town roads blocked by debris and tree damage, loss of municipal and state business, and activation of the Red Cross for emergency shelters. The Vermont counties impacted to the highest degree of eligible damage include Bennington and Windham. Initial damage estimates exceed \$1.054 million. The ice damage was concentrated in the southern counties while the rest of the state received snow and sleet. This storm also caused extensive power outages and ice damage to the other New England States of New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and Maine.

In response to the situation, I have taken appropriate action under State law and directed the execution of the State Emergency Operations Plan through the Commissioner of the Department of Public Safety beginning on December 11, 2008 and continuing in operation through December 18th in accordance with Section 401 of the Stafford Act. In accordance with the State Emergency Operations Plan, the following State Agency Support functions were activated: Department of Public Safety, Vermont Emergency Management Division and Vermont State Police; Department of Public Service; Agency of Agriculture; Agency of Natural Resources; Agency of Administration; Agency of Transportation; Agency of Human Services and its Department of Health; and the American Red Cross. The communities of Athens, Halifax, Readsboro, Wilmington and Whitingham, Vermont each requested a local declaration of emergency due to excessive debris and damage impact to their public infrastructure. I declared through Executive Order that Bennington, Orange, Windsor

and Windham counties in Vermont were in a State of Emergency from December 11th through December 18th, 2008.

The State of Vermont has a standard State Mitigation Plan that was approved by FEMA in November of 2007. Approximately 85% of Vermont communities have FEMA approved local mitigation plans with the remaining communities' plans in various stages of draft form.

Joint Federal, State, and local surveys of the damaged areas were conducted on December 29-30, 2008 in Windham and Bennington counties. Preliminary assessments by State and local officials indicated the most severe impacts were to town and state roads that received debris damage and to municipal utilities in the town of Readsboro and the village of Jacksonville.

I have determined that this incident is of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capabilities of the State and the affected local governments and that supplementary Federal assistance is necessary. I am specifically requesting Federal assistance utilizing the following federal programs: Public Assistance for the counties of Bennington and Windham, Vermont. The State of Vermont also requests that the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (Section 404) be available throughout the State. No direct federal assistance was requested during the event.

Preliminary estimates of the types and amount of assistance needed under the Stafford Act are tabulated in Attachment A.

The following information is furnished on the nature and amount of State and local resources that have been or will be used to alleviate the conditions of this disaster. The following State agencies were directed to provide immediate assistance as a result of the extensive power outages and debris damage: Department of Public Safety, Vermont Emergency Management Division and Vermont State Police; Department of Public Service; Agency of Agriculture; Agency of Natural Resources; Agency of Administration; Agency of Transportation; Agency of Human Services and its Department of Health; and the American Red Cross. The ice storm that caused extreme damage in Bennington and Windham counties resulted from a storm system that according to the National Weather Service officially began on December 11, 2008 and went through December 12, 2008. A description of the storm system prepared by the National Weather Service office that serves most of Vermont is attached as Attachment B.

Utilities reported there were approximately 40,000 customers out of power, some for up to five days. Vermont Route 9, a major connector between Brattleboro and Bennington, was closed for two days. Town and state road crews worked for five days to clear the debris on public roads and to open access routes for emergency vehicles and utility crews. Public and private utility companies brought line crews in from

Pennsylvania and Canada for additional help to restore power. The Red Cross supported seven shelters and warming stations where 612 meals were served. Local shelters were also open for several days while power was out. Several private properties received some damage and there was limited business loss, which was not enough to meet the threshold to seek SBA Disaster Assistance or an IA declaration.

I certify that for this major disaster, the State and local governments will assume all applicable non-Federal share of costs required by the Stafford Act. Total state/local share expenditures are expected to exceed \$264,000.

In addition, I anticipate the need for debris removal, which poses an immediate threat to lives, public health, and safety. Pursuant to Sections 403 and 407 of the Stafford Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5170b & 5173, the State agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the United States of America for any claims arising from the removal of debris or wreckage for this disaster. The State agrees that debris removal from public and private property will not occur until the landowner signs an unconditional authorization for the removal of debris.

I have designated Barbara Farr, Director of Vermont Emergency Management, as the State Coordinating Officer for this request. Ms. Farr will work with the Federal Emergency Management Agency in damage assessments and may provide further information or justification on my behalf.

Weather Summary for Winter Storm 11-12 December 2008

A significant winter storm affected much of the northeast United States, including Vermont during the late afternoon of December 11th through the early morning hours of December 12th. In Vermont, the most significant impact was the freezing rain and subsequent ice accumulation of ½ to ¾ of an inch across southern Vermont causing thousands to lose power for several days, making it the worst Ice Storm to affect Vermont since January 1998




Figure 1. Surface Map at 7 am EST December 11, 2008

This storm system developed in the Gulf of Mexico during the morning hours of December 11th and moved along an old cold frontal boundary to a position near New York City on the morning of December 12th (Figures 1-3). This cold frontal boundary delivered much colder air across much of New England and New York during the night of December 10th and laid the groundwork for sub-freezing surface temperatures for this event. The following three figures demonstrate the convergence of two systems into one system over two days causing the icing in southern Vermont on December 12, 2008.





Figure 2. Surface Map at 7 pm EST December 11, 2008




Figure 4. 24 hour Observed Precipitation Accumulation ending 7 am December 12th.




Figure 5. December 12, 2008 Storm Total Snowfall and Ice Graphic (Northeast)




Figure 6 and Table 1. Ice Accumulations Reported to the National Weather Service

As you have all requested an update as to when you can expect to see FEMA payments, I will send one status report to you all. At this point, FEMA has obligated all the funds for the approved project worksheets for your towns. So from a FEMA perspective, payments can begin now. We have received all of your grant agreements back and are now setting up the necessary expenditure accounts and contracts (State system). Those should be done this week (at least for your towns; some towns haven't returned signed agreements yet). However, until we receive authority from the Legislative Joint Fiscal Committee to receive the federal funds, we cannot make any payments. I believe that the request to the Joint Fiscal Committee may have left the Agency of Administration sometime this week. The Joint Fiscal Committee has 30 days to either approve the request or send no response which results in an automatic approval. So at this point, I would expect that the soonest we will be able to start processing payments will be the week of April 27th.

On behalf of the State of Vermont, I would like to apologize for the delay. We are attempting to come up with a more efficient method of gaining this approval so that this will not happen in the future.
