Enclosed please find eight (8) items that the Joint Fiscal Office has received from the administration. One limited service position is associated with these items.

JFO #2643 – \$150,000 grant from New England Waste Services of Vermont to the Vermont Agency of Transportation. These funds will be used to match federal funding designated for improvements to the Newport State Airport.

JFO #2644 – Donation of truck and trailer valued at \$17,870 from Fletcher Allen Health Care to the Vermont Department of Health. This equipment will become part of the Public Health Preparedness program (in support of the Medical Reserve Corp, Medical Surge, and Mobile Hospital) and be deployed when requested by Vermont hospitals and local emergency response agencies. JFO #2645 – \$60,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to the Vermont Department of Corrections. These funds will be used to create a system-wide approach to reentry by assembling a task force of stakeholders to analyze current conditions and develop a plan that includes recidivism reduction goals.

JFO #2646 – \$300,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to the Vermont Judiciary. These funds will be used in Windham County to implement a domestic violence docket that will enhance services to victims of domestic violence. One (1) limited service position is associated with this request. [JFO received 10/28/13]

JFO #2647 – \$325,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Vermont Department of Health. These funds will be used to enhance health policies focused on Vermont youth, such as measuring the health environment at schools and conducting the Youth Risk Behavior Survey. [JFO received 10/28/13]

JFO #2648 – \$450,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Vermont Agency of Human Services. This grant will fund an employment program aimed at helping older

refugees find employment. The funding will also support younger refugees making the transition from secondary school to the workforce or higher education.

JFO #2649 – \$64,902 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to the Vermont Center for Crime Victim Services (VCCVS). These funds will be used to develop a plan for increasing accessibility to VCCVS services among people with disabilities.

JFO #2650 – \$264,104 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to the Vermont Center for Crime Victim Services (VCCVS). These funds will be used support a training program (for law enforcement and advocates) designed to promote cooperation and produce a plan aimed at reducing fatalities associated with domestic violence and stalking.

# Helping Hands; a refugee employment program to address barriers to employment for refugee youths in transition and older workers

#### **Executive Summary**

This \$150,000/year, 3-year grant was awarded by the federal Office of Refugee Resettlement to the State Refugee Coordinator to address substantial barriers encountered by two specific groups of refugees in achieving economic self-sufficiency and finding employment. At this time, \$87,000 was awarded to the state. However, the finalization of the budget for this grant will occur by the end of October, at which time the additional \$63,000 will be awarded. There is a need of only \$75,000 during SFY 2014.

For <u>older employable refugees</u> who are at least 45 years old, the project will strengthen and widen the network of employment support services. This cohort of potential workers faces age discrimination, health limitations and fear of higher costs by employers, in addition to the numerous obstacles familiar to all refugees, including a lower level of education and English proficiency than their younger peers. As a result, the employment rate of employable refugees between 45 and 64 years old, who arrived in the US between 10/1/2006 and 4/17/2013, was only 44.58%, as opposed to 71.6% for the general employable refugee population. With this funding, we will establish partnerships with employers who need support to encourage them to hire older workers. This will lead to better employment outcomes.

The other refugees who need special attention are <u>youths</u> in transition to the <u>workforce or higher education</u>. Parents, education specialists and refugee serving-agencies say that they are without direction, unprepared for the job market's expectations, and uncertain of their choices. There are options, but the mainstream agencies struggle with providing services to this group; they do not understand their needs or how to meet them. This project will offer hope to younger refugees by showing them how to become informed and active participants in the opportunities of the American education system and the requirements of the world of work. Young refugees will be offered a range of culturally and linguistically appropriate services, tailored to support them in choosing available and appropriate options to gain experience and income through employment while continuing their education, if they so desire and ensuring a brighter future.

The State will sub grant the totality of this funding to community-based agencies using its regular procurement process to ensure that the most qualified, creative and cost-effective agencies, with the best culturally relevant plans, are selected. These services will be integrated into the network of employment services already provided to refugees to complement them.

#### Narrative

100% of the funding will be contracted to one or more refugee-serving or community based organization after RFP process. This approach complies with the State of Vermont procurement process and will ensure that the best qualified organization(s), with the most realistic and better developed plan will be selected. It will also give more time to interested applicants to create partnerships for the project and submit thoughtful proposals.

We anticipate one or two lead agencies (a natural division of responsibilities would be between the two components of the program, one with the youth in transition to work component and the other of the older workers part, although possibly one single agency could win the entire funding) with secondary partners. Partnerships will be given priority because they generally produce better outcomes for participants.

Please note that the following projected expense budgets are only estimates as actual budgets will be proposed and negotiated with the RFP winners. However, we believe that they are a good approximation of expenditures for the first year.

Below are projected expenses for the two main components of the project (could be merged if only one agency wins the bid.

There is a possibility that some of the on-site support to employer / employee could be contracted out to Working Bridges, if the employer is already a participant in that program.

#### Other:

- -Mileage in-state is for the employment specialist to establish relationships with employers, conduct job searches, to take clients to job interviews, to visit workplaces to ensure job retention
- -Interpreters will be for support to employers and employees in their first year of employment
- Office space and insurance share of the program estimated at approximately \$3,000
- -Translation of material, estimated at \$100/page for 45 pages
- -Printing and copies of job applications, brochures, etc. Postage for communicating with clients employers, etc.
- -Other support services are to address punctual emergency barriers to employment with specific employers and employees; they could include transportation, child care, case management, health-related support, etc. and would be provided on an individual basis. Short-term, specific and adapted group training could also be offered if employer is willing to hire several refugees and participate in a tailored training.

Chittenden County, and more specifically the cities of Burlington and Winooski, resettles almost 100% of the refugee population in Vermont. In proportion to its small population, these two cities' contribution to resettlement is huge. In FFY 2010 and 2011, Chittenden County received 695 refugees, more people than at least two counties in other States that receive Targeted Assistance (TAG) formula allocations. Yet, Chittenden County does not benefit from TAG formula funding because counties are re-qualified only once every three years. Neither do we receive TAG discretionary funding though the need for more assistance exists. With Helping Hands, the State of Vermont Refugee Office will address substantial barriers encountered by two specific groups of refugees in achieving economic self-sufficiency and finding employment.
