The following items were approved for acceptance at the November 15, 2010 Joint Fiscal Committee meeting:

JFO #2464 — \$365,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to the Department of Corrections (DOC). These funds will allow DOC to develop and operate Circles of Support and Accountability (COSAs) for 24 high risk offenders reentering the community during the grant period. [*JFO received 10/07/10*]

JFO #2468 — \$1,000,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to the Department of Vermont Health Access. This grant will be used to help determine if a health insurance exchange should be established in Vermont, and to support the planning activities for the development of an exchange. One (1) limited service position is associated with this request. [*JFO received 10/28/10*]

JFO #2469 — \$50,000 grant from the State Justice Institute to the Judiciary. This grant will support the strategic planning process focused on the legislatively-approve judicial restructuring and unification project. [*JFO received 11/5/10*]

Budget Narrative

Non-Federal Cash Match- Total: \$0

VT DOC has experienced unprecedented budgetary reductions during the last two fiscal years and while we have the human resources to successfully implement and sustain this project, we are not in a financial position to provide a cash match. As such, we are requesting that the cash match requirement be waived and have provided a letter from our Commissioner documenting our fiscal hardship. The letter is attached as a separate document entitled, "Fiscal Hardship Letter."

Non-Federal In-Kind Match- Total: \$365,000

<u>Section A. Personnel and B. Fringe Benefits- (\$365,000)</u>: VT DOC will provide \$365,000 of in-kind match from the time devoted to grant activities by involved DOC staff as well as municipal Community Justice Center employees at 8 sites who will staffing the local COSA programs. Position descriptions for involved DOC and CJC personnel are included in Attachment 3 and detail how these roles directly support the proposed project. As our approach is highly collaborative, we are able to ensure that the total value of salary and benefits for the personnel time exclusively dedicated to the project will meet or exceed 50% of the total project costs.

Federal Request- Total: \$365,000

Section C. Travel- (\$12,000): The Grant Coordinator will be directly involved in all local program operations and be travelling to each CJC on a quarterly basis with additional technical assistance visits expected. Travel for statewide Grant Coordination, BJA Grant

Conferences in Washington DC, and mileage reimbursement for Reentry Task Force members to attend quarterly meetings will cost \$12,000.

<u>Section E. Supplies- (\$4,000)</u>: Supplies will cost \$4,000, as we anticipate that the purchase of a laptop for the Grant Coordinator to facilitate documentation during site visits statewide. Additional supply needs include those associated with preparing hard-copy reports for quarterly Reentry Task force meetings and internal DOC presentations on grant activities.

<u>Section G. Contracts/Consultants- (\$324,000)</u>: VT DOC will use the majority of our grant funds to partner with municipal Community Justice Centers (CJCs) statewide for the coordination and delivery of Circles of Support and Accountability (COSAs) to serve a total of 24 reentering high risk offenders.

VT DOC will allocate \$300,000 of our federal request to municipal Community Justice Centers (CJCs) for developing individualized Circles of Support Accountability for offenders in the target population. We expect to make eight (8) operationally specific awards of varying amounts to CJCs based on the number of high risk offenders projected to reenter during the grant period. An example of such an award is attached as a separate document entitled, "Sample CJC Sub-Grant."

In addition to tracking and reporting on the required performance metrics, VT DOC will also allocate \$24,000 to hire an independent evaluator to design and implement a study to correlate the quality of the stakeholder relationships connected to a COSA and the offender's reentry success. Section H. Other- (\$25,000): VT DOC will work on developing an automated reporting system for use by CJCs and community partners to facilitate consistent, timely and broadly replicable data gathering and analysis capacity. We will allocate \$24,000 to the design and development of this valuable utility. Depending on the outcome of the design process, this expense may ultimately be incurred through an inter-agency agreement with a State IT systems developer or through the acquisition of a customizable pre-existing product. Given these potentialities, and a cost center representing less than 10% of the overall budget, we have itemized it in this budget category.

Lastly, the Reentry Task force will be convened by the Grant Coordinator on a quarterly basis at a total cost of \$1,000 to cover costs associated with room rental and refreshments.

VT DOC is confident that we have constructed a responsible, viable and efficient budget which will allow us to demonstrate the success of our strategy while providing a sustainable, evidence-based process for high risk offenders returning to our communities.

Program Narrative VT Department of Corrections Coming Home Full Circle: Restorative Reentry in Vermont

1. Statement of the Problem

<u>1.1 Description of the Problem:</u> In Vermont, recidivism is driving our prison population to unsustainable levels. Recidivism is compounded by the tendency of government and the community to treat re-entering offenders as a threat. This has led to two critical system flaws: fragmented reentry services and inadequate support and accountability structures. These combine to deny offenders appropriate reintegration options and diminish their ability to develop the pro-social relationships and skills integral to community life. After nearly doubling in size over the past decade, the VT prison population will increase three times as fast as the general resident population over the next decade, at a cost of at least \$82 million, according to an independent study released by the Council of State Government's Justice Center. This rate exceeds the increase projected in the prison populations of five other states in the Northeast.

The Justice Center's analysis of the Vermont prison population revealed that, like all states with growing prison populations, as the state incarcerates more people, more are inevitably released. Between 2001 and 2006, the number of people released from Vermont prisons increased 23 percent. Recidivism rates in Vermont are particularly high and are a significant reason why the prison population is projected to continue growing.

<u>1.2.1 Jurisdiction to be Served</u>: As the state Corrections department, our project will serve Vermont cities that host municipal Community Justice Centers (CJCs) where high risk offenders are scheduled to reintegrate during the grant period.

<u>1.2.2 Target Population</u>: The target population for this grant proposal is felons assessed as being at high risk for reoffending who have served more than one year and will be reentering into a city

or town served by a Community Justice Center. We propose to serve twenty-four (24) inmates who meet these criteria during the grant period.

<u>1.2.3 Number of Offenders Returning to the Community:</u> Vermont's prison and jail populations are housed in an integrated system. The table below shows that 500 inmates released for the first time last year had served more than 1 year (some with shorter periods include violators of release conditions). This is the cohort from which the target population for this proposal will be drawn.

Sentenced Releases - FY2009

The table below shows reconviction rates among Vermont felony-level inmates released between 1993 and 2006, and followed for 3 years in Court disposition records. The total recidivism rate for adult felons who serve more than 1 year is 52%. In a 13-year study, the peak rate (for the 1996 and 1997 release cohorts) was 60%.

<u>1.2.4 Number and Type of Offenders in Facilities:</u> The table below represents the risk banding for all adult inmates in Vermont on June 30, 2009, from the Level of Services Inventory-Revised (LSI-R) and demonstrates that VT inmates are, for the most part, high risk violent felons.

Risk versus Severity: Sentenced Inmates on June 30, 2009

Between June 2008 and June 2009, the number of sex offenders in prison rose by 13%. 94% of the incarcerated population is male. Overcrowding has led to outsourcing incarceration for an additional 673 inmates at a supplemental cost of \$24,000 per bed year for each inmate.

1.3 Basic Components of Reentry Process

<u>1.3.1 Assessment:</u> Vermont DOC has LSI-R assessments on 97% of the incarcerated population. Additionally, Vermont's sex offender assessment and treatment programs use validated instruments to offer empirical evidence in dealing with a highly difficult population. The Offender Responsibility Plan (ORP) is an explicit social contract through which an offender cocreates the guidelines by which he will be judged, and then demonstrates responsibility through his or her actions. It marks an improved and collaborative approach reflective of our organizational principles and knowledge of evidence-based practices which stem directly from validated risk assessment instruments including the Level of Service Inventory (LSI), RASOR, VASOR and Static-99, as well as the Vermont Treatment Program for Sexual Aggressors (VTPSA) Treatment Progress Scale attached as a separate document entitled, "Treatment Progress Scale."

1.3.2/1.3.3 Case Management (transition plans, pre- and post-release programs and services):

The ORP is the Case Management System for coordinating, delivering, and tracking the range of treatment and work readiness development services specific to the offender's strengths and needs. It constructs a customized map of stakeholder relationships and services. The document evolves over time to reflect the offender's progress, including pre-release services such as vocational assessment, housing readiness, benefits eligibility, transition planning and post-release supervision and services as well as transitional and permanent housing, behavioral assessments and therapy, substance abuse treatment, employment, and parenting and other family obligations.

The ORP is a *restorative process* that encourages the returning offender to accept responsibility for the harm his or her crime caused. It is a fluid case plan developed collaboratively by DOC facility and field casework staff with the offender and all appropriate parties. The ORP case plan is attached as a separate document entitled, "ORP Case Plan." *1.3.4 Data Collection:* Vermont Department of Corrections has already created an Offender Responsibility Plan Progress Report which will be specifically enhanced to gather the requisite individual data and aggregated performance metrics. Administered quarterly to all offenders served through this grant, the report will gauge the offender's compliance with the specific criminogenic need areas and corresponding activities specified in the transition section of the ORP case plan. A sample ORP individual progress report is attached as a document entitled, "ORP Progress Report."

2. Project/Program Design and Implementation

VT DOC will award sub-grants to municipal Community Justice Centers (CJCs) for the development and operation of Circles of Support and Accountability (COSAs) for a total of 24 high risk offenders reentering during the grant period to be conducted in close collaboration with VT DOC supervision and case management. This design allows us to maximize the synergy between our ORP case management process and the existing statewide capacity through municipal partnerships for citizen involvement in an evidence-based approach to reentry.

2.1 Mandatory Requirements

<u>2.1.1 Reentry Strategic Plan:</u> Vermont Department of Corrections has developed a comprehensive reentry strategic plan that describes our long-term strategy, including measurable annual and 5-year performance outcomes relating to our long-term goals of increasing public safety and reducing recidivism. The reentry strategic plan is attached as a separate document entitled, "Reentry Strategic Plan."

<u>2.1.2 Implementation Schedule:</u> The reentry strategic plan incorporates a detailed implementation schedule for this program beginning with pre-grant activities and including activities to be conducted both during and beyond the grant period This implementation schedule is attached as a separate document entitled, "Project Timeline."

2.1.3 Reentry Task Force: VT DOC has established a valuable Reentry Task Force. This statewide representative group consists of CJC Directors, Agency of Human Services Field , Directors, a substance abuse and mental health counselor, an employment specialist, a housing specialist, a landlord, a faith community leader, a retired Police Chief, a furloughed offender and involved Corrections personnel. An inter-disciplinary practitioner group comprised of leaders

from all relevant stakeholder disciplines, this task force is integral to Vermont's reentry practices and coordinated civic and service engagement model.

The Reentry Task Force will be convened by the Grant Manager on a quarterly basis to review all COSA program operations and individual participant progress reports, coordinate resources and funding streams, promote collaboration, collect and analyze data on the initiative, and gather data and best practices from stakeholder agencies and organizations. The Reentry Task Force will also update our analysis of statutory, regulatory, rules-based, and practice-based hurdles to reintegration of individuals into the community. A complete list of Task Force members is attached as a separate document entitled, "Reentry Task Force."

<u>2.1.4 Stakeholder Coordination and Collaboration</u>: A Community Justice Center (CJC) is a local government program where citizens work on preventing crime, resolving conflict, and rendering justice on the issues that matter to them. The CJC serves as a community hub of restorative activity and relational influence. This collaborative enterprise forms partnerships with government agencies and nonprofit service providers including law enforcement, victim advocacy groups, the faith community, substance abuse treatment providers, health and mental health agencies, housing authorities, child welfare services, educational institutions, vocational rehabilitation and employment services to achieve its goals.

Vermont will locate COSA programs at municipal CJCs in St. Albans, Burlington, Barre, Montpelier, Springfield, Brattleboro, St. Johnsbury and Newport- communities where local capacity as well as available services and infrastructure necessary for successful reentry can be effectively harnessed to provide adequate resources for coordination and direct service delivery. Each CJC COSA program will have protocols established with the regional Correctional Facility regarding the case referral process, and with the local Probation & Parole office for on-going case communication including participant demographic and progress data.

<u>2.1.4a Certification of Collaboration</u>: VT DOC certifies the active involvement of local government and all aforementioned agencies and organizations. Indeed, it is the foundation upon which our approach is built. These systemic partnerships provide a comprehensive framework for reentry policy, practice and resource development.

<u>2.1.5 Inter-Agency Collaboration</u>: On a State government level, we have formed critical new partnerships with offender-serving agencies including the Department of Labor's Vocational Rehabilitation Division, the Social Security Administration, the Veteran's Association, the Office of Child Support and the Agency Of Human Services' Housing and Economic Benefits Divisions. Through MOUs with these agencies, we have enlisted their on-going support in proactive reentry planning, resulting in valuable utilities such as reentry employment specialists, housing search and retention specialists, electronic benefit cards and personal identification provision prior to release.

Through these initiatives, we have fundamentally changed the reentry service delivery system in Vermont. With overarching guidance and support from the Reentry Task Force, the combination of localized reentry services as supported by statewide agency collaborations ensures a comprehensive, effective approach to reducing recidivism and enhancing public safety.

The ORP case management structure is in place, as is state law and policy to support Restorative Reentry. We have incorporated the leveraging of stakeholder relationships on both an interagency and interpersonal level into our case planning and reentry practices. <u>2.1.6 Role of Corrections</u>: In Vermont, the Department of Corrections is located within the Agency of Human Services. In the past three years, Vermont has restructured the Agency of Human Services as a community-based service delivery system, focused on providing services to Vermonters in need, regardless of funding source restrictions. VT Corrections is an integrated system of facilities, probation, and parole. This greatly facilitates the implementation of systemic changes and best practices.

<u>2.1.6a Housing Support</u>: Vermont has begun building a network of transitional housing options across the state with State General Funds. In the next few years our plan is to double the capacity for transitional and supportive housing.

<u>2.1.6b Restorative Justice</u>: What differentiates Vermont's response to recidivism from traditional approaches is the philosophical foundation of restorative justice principles. By providing returning offenders with high measures of support and accountability, fostering meaningful, participatory community connections, and leveraging the informal social influence exercised by families and neighbors, we effectively complement our evidence based assessment and risk-based management practices.

<u>2.1.6c Letters of Support</u>: VT DOC has the requisite support from the executives responsible for correctional facilities and for field services (probation and parole). Letters of support from these Directors are attached as separate documents entitled, "Facility Executive Letter of Support" and "Field Services Executive Letter of Support."

<u>2.1.7 Commissioner Support</u>: VT DOC has the full support of our Commissioner. His letter of support is attached as a separate document entitled, "Commissioner Letter of Support."
 <u>2.1.8. Evidence-Based Methodology and Outcomes</u>: Results from the COSA Pilot Project in

South-Central Ontario show that the offenders who participated in COSA had significantly lower rates of any type of reoffending than did the offenders who did not participate in COSA.

<u>2.1.8a Reparative Data:</u> A recent NIJ study of our Reparative Probation program has demonstrated that restorative approaches for offenders achieve significantly positive reductions in recidivism (over 23%). The same principles underlie our reentry practices.

<u>2.1.8b CJC COSA Design</u>: DOC facility or field staff will refer the offender to a Community Justice Center for COSA consideration 6 - 8 weeks prior to an offender's anticipated release.

When a case is referred, Community Justice Center staff will meet with prospective candidates to explain the program's supports and expectations, confirm interest in participation and secure a signed release of information.

If the case is accepted, Center staff will review assessments including the LSI, Static-99 and Treatment Progress Scale to better understand the behavioral arc of the individual's specific criminogenic need areas during incarceration and the implications for COSA composition. Assessments will identify housing and employment options, counseling requirements (including sex offender treatment, substance abuse and mental health needs), family resources, and other pertinent information. CJC staff will also meet with DOC staff to identify supervision requirements and concerns, victim's needs, community issues and other considerations.

At the same time, CJC staff will begin recruiting the participant's (aka core member) COSA. The COSA will include at least three volunteers who commit to work with the core member for at least one year. Once established, the COSA will receive foundational training in Motivational Interviewing, Stages of Change, Sex Offender management and typologies, understanding risk assessments, and targeted training that reflects the specific needs and strengths of the core member. The COSA will meet with the core member within one week of his or her release and, if possible, will first meet at the correctional facility prior to reentering the community. The basic COSA operating structure will be comprised of weekly meetings with the core member and periodic larger group Case Conference to ensure the core member's compliance with the ORP and other expectations, to deal with changing conditions and new opportunities, and to keep stakeholders adequately informed, thus able to provide responsive, instead of reactive services. The Case Conference brings together all of the stakeholders involved in the offender's reentry including the probation officer, victim advocate, treatment providers, family members, employment specialists, landlord, COSA volunteers and Justice Center staff.

Through this process, pro-social relationships are developed which increase offender investment in the community and improve the public perception of those reentering, addressing the root causes of recidivism and fragmented services.

<u>2.1.8c Outcome Measures</u>: Through the previously referenced ORP Progress Report, VT DOC will track all offenders participating in COSAs and compare the recidivism rate for this cohort to the 52% norm for this population.

2.1.9 Broad Replicability: If demonstrated to be effective, VT DOC is well positioned to broadly replicate COSA programs. Vermont has Community Justice Centers located statewide, comprising a geographically comprehensive service infrastructure. At the core of this approach is the citizen volunteer base, which is both economically and operationally sustainable. Vermont's Reparative Probation program offers clear evidence of our ability to broadly replicate and sustain a successful strategy. A winner of the 1998 Innovations in Government Award, the Reparative Probation program had 650 volunteers serving on 70 Reparative Boards and handled 1200 cases in FY09. By demonstrating effectiveness with a smaller but challenging portion of our Target Population, the CJCs could broaden their service areas using savings accrued from diminished out-of-state inmate costs and reallocated to our community justice network.

<u>2.1.10 Reentry Barrier Analysis:</u> The Vermont Legislature has recently conducted a detailed analysis of the statutory, regulatory and practice-based hurdles to reintegration of offenders into the community. The ORP case management process has been developed in direct response to this analysis. Through its diversified composition and local involvement, the Reentry Task Force will update the legislative analysis to reflect new learning and best-practices.

2.2 Approved Uses of Award Funds: VT DOC will carry out all proposed grant activities in connection with Approved Use # 3- Provide Sustained Case Planning/Management in the Community. As described, the DOC Offender Responsibility Planning process begins at the outset of incarceration and dovetails with the CJC COSA process, which is initiated prior to release and continues for at least one year with an emphasis on coordination and proactive support and problem-solving especially during the critical first few months of reintegration. 2.3 Priority Considerations: As evidenced by our target population and program design, we will provide reentry services through this grant consistent with priority numbers 3, 7 and 10. Specifically, we will serve 24 high risk sex and violent offenders by using validated assessment tools including the LSI, RASOR, VASOR and Static-99. Through the synergy between our Offender Responsibility Plan and COSAs, we will also demonstrate integrated assessment and case management in partnership with a community-based restorative reentry process.

3. Capabilities/Competencies

<u>3.1 Grant Coordination</u>: All grant-related activities will be coordinated and overseen by the DOC Restorative Systems Administrator (RSA). The RSA is responsible for the direct application of restorative justice principals and practices across all VT Corrections services, with an operational emphasis on reentry. Organizationally, the RSA reports directly to the Executive for Community and Restorative Justice, an integral member of the Executive Management Team

of VT DOC. The RSA coordinated VT DOC's successful SVORI from grant from 2004 -2006 and already works closely with all aforementioned parties to this proposal. Furthermore, VT DOC already has a pre-existing grantor/grantee relationship to CJCs, as their base operating funds are provided by grants from VT DOC and, as such, are regularly reviewed for compliance and performance outcomes. He will exercise direct operational and fiduciary supervision of all CJC COSA programs stemming from this proposal. The RSA will convene the Reentry Task Force on a quarterly basis and develop all related assignments in connection with their stated purpose and goals. While the CJCs already enjoy strong working relationships with local DOC facilities and field offices, the Grant Coordinator will also act as an operational liaison between parties to ensure clear on-going communication and expectations specific to cases served through the grant. A sample COSA sub-grant agreement is attached as a separate document entitled, "Sample CJC Sub-Grant."

<u>3.2 Reentry Task Force Capability:</u> The Reentry Task Force is effective because it convenes locally engaged leaders across the state who the key components of reintegration. Beginning with our FY2002 SVORI grant, Vermont has built the necessary relationships, community capacity and specific structure for stakeholders to participate in reentry with the direct assistance of the individuals and agencies on our Task Force. As a result, eight (8) Community Justice Centers in major population centers have already developed COSAs. While several programs continue to offer limited services, Second Chance Act resources are critical to completing our program development, evaluation and sustainability. A program manual from one such CJC in Newport, VT, is attached as a separated document entitled, "CJC COSA Manual." This restorative approach has been at the core of our success. And these are the very same people on our Reentry Task Force.

5. Impact/Outcomes, Evaluation, Sustainment and Performance Measures

<u>5.1 Performance Metrics:</u> The attached "ORP Progress Report" will adhere to the requisite individual data and aggregated performance metrics specified in the grant solicitation for each offender served through this project. Administered quarterly by the DOC supervising officer, the report will gauge the offender's compliance with the specific criminogenic need areas and corresponding activities specified in the transition section of the ORP case plan. Additionally, and as specified in the attached "Sample DOC/CJC Sub-Grant", each CJC will collect all necessary demographic information on each COSA participant.

5.2 Goals & Objectives for Program Development: Vermont has developed an effective community-based infrastructure for reentry support and accountability services through Community Justice Centers in collaboration with VT DOC supervision across the state. By providing COSAs for 24 high-risk offenders who will be returning to VT communities during the course of the grant period, Vermont will be able to improve public safety while allowing us to definitively evaluate the effectiveness of enhancing formal Corrections supervision with the citizen-based source of informal social control and civic connection offered through COSAs. Moreover, the data will also be used to identify opportunities for continuous improvement of our reentry practices through identification of service gaps and barriers to successful reintegration. *5.3 Performance Measurement and Impact:* All data from both DOC casework staff and CJC program staff about offenders served through this project will be reported to the Grant Coordinator on a quarterly basis. The Grant Coordinator will track each individual offender's progress while identifying any emerging themes and prepare quarterly reports for review and analysis by the Reentry Task Force.

5.4 Evaluation and Collaborative Partnerships: In addition to data collection on all required performance measures, VT DOC also plans to contract with an independent evaluator to design and conduct a study examining the correlation between the self-reported quality of the relationships both within and connected to the COSAs, and offender reentry success indicated by compliance with the ORP case plan.

The collaborative relationship VT DOC has built with municipal partners and systemwide stakeholders has enabled us to develop our restorative approach to reentry and ensures the long-term support and resources for program success and continuation. This is evident in our ORP case planning process, as well as in our community justice infrastructure.

5.5 Sustainability: By demonstrating effectiveness with a smaller but challenging portion of our Target Population, the CJCs could broaden their service areas using savings accrued from diminished out-of-state inmate costs and reallocated to our community justice network. Specifically, we anticipate that a COSA for a reentering offender will cost approximately half the amount of an out-of-state bed for one year. According to our projections, each successful COSA participant will represent a savings to VT DOC of \$12,000. If 18 of the 24 (75%) COSA participants stay out of prison we will half our current recidivism rate for this population and, in doing so, save \$216,000, which could cover the reduced annual costs associated with on-going program maintenance statewide

<u>5.6 Methodology for Tracking</u>: The Grant Coordinator, in collaboration with the supervising field officers, will utilize the ORP Case Progress Report on each offender served through this project for 3 years after release. This will allow us to gain a clear longitudinal picture of the effectiveness associated with our strategy and it's implications for reentry practices in Vermont.

6. Collaboration

<u>6.1 Integration</u>: The proposed community-based COSA approach clearly enhances the existing ORP transition plan which VT DOC has been comprehensively implemented in each of our facilities and field offices statewide.

<u>6.2.1 Prior Collaboration</u>: We have incorporated the leveraging of stakeholder relationships on both an interagency and interpersonal level into our case planning and reentry practices. The design and capacity to realize this collaborative strategy are firmly in place. The ORP case management structure is effect, as is the law and policy to support Restorative Reentry. Vermont is poised to fully deliver COSAs for high risk offenders, and in doing so, define best practice both in our local and national professional community.

<u>6.2.2 Applying Prior Experience</u>: The support and informal authority derived from relationships increases offender investment and opportunity. We have seen this with our prior COSA experience and empirically demonstrated it though Reparative Probation. Increased citizen participation will diminish public resistance and marginalization of returning offenders, dramatically improving their potential for success and achieving a significant reduction in recidivism.

JFO #2464 — \$365,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to the Department of Corrections (DOC). These funds will allow DOC to develop and operate Circles of Support and Accountability (COSAs) for 24 high risk offenders reentering the community during the grant period. [*JFO received 10/07/10*]

JFO #2465 — \$48,020 grant from the Commonwealth Fund to the Legislature – Health Care Reform Commission (HCRC). These funds will support health care design study by providing funding for the modeling of 1) the baseline scenario showing the impact of federal health care reform and 2) a macroeconomic impact of each design option on Vermont's economy. Expedited review of this item has been request by HCRC. Joint Fiscal Committee members will be contacted by October 22 with a request to waive the statutory review period and accept this item. [*JFO received 10/12/10*]

JFO #2466 — \$25,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets. These funds will be used to develop a training program that can be used by owners and employees of slaughterhouses for purposes of helping to ensure that plant practices remain consistent with the Humane Methods of Slaughter Act and with state regulations. [JFO received 10/14/10]

Budget Narrative

Non-Federal Cash Match- Total: \$0

VT DOC has experienced unprecedented budgetary reductions during the last two fiscal years and while we have the human resources to successfully implement and sustain this project, we are not in a financial position to provide a cash match. As such, we are requesting that the cash match requirement be waived and have provided a letter from our Commissioner documenting our fiscal hardship. The letter is attached as a separate document entitled, "Fiscal Hardship Letter."

Non-Federal In-Kind Match- Total: \$365,000

<u>Section A. Personnel and B. Fringe Benefits- (\$365,000)</u>: VT DOC will provide \$365,000 of in-kind match from the time devoted to grant activities by involved DOC staff as well as municipal Community Justice Center employees at 8 sites who will staffing the local COSA programs. Position descriptions for involved DOC and CJC personnel are included in Attachment 3 and detail how these roles directly support the proposed project. As our approach is highly collaborative, we are able to ensure that the total value of salary and benefits for the personnel time exclusively dedicated to the project will meet or exceed 50% of the total project costs.

Federal Request- Total: \$365,000

Section C. Travel- (\$12,000): The Grant Coordinator will be directly involved in all local program operations and be travelling to each CJC on a quarterly basis with additional technical assistance visits expected. Travel for statewide Grant Coordination, BJA Grant

Conferences in Washington DC, and mileage reimbursement for Reentry Task Force members to attend quarterly meetings will cost \$12,000.

<u>Section E. Supplies- (\$4,000)</u>: Supplies will cost \$4,000, as we anticipate that the purchase of a laptop for the Grant Coordinator to facilitate documentation during site visits statewide. Additional supply needs include those associated with preparing hard-copy reports for quarterly Reentry Task force meetings and internal DOC presentations on grant activities.

<u>Section G. Contracts/Consultants- (\$324,000)</u>: VT DOC will use the majority of our grant funds to partner with municipal Community Justice Centers (CJCs) statewide for the coordination and delivery of Circles of Support and Accountability (COSAs) to serve a total of 24 reentering high risk offenders.

VT DOC will allocate \$300,000 of our federal request to municipal Community Justice Centers (CJCs) for developing individualized Circles of Support Accountability for offenders in the target population. We expect to make eight (8) operationally specific awards of varying amounts to CJCs based on the number of high risk offenders projected to reenter during the grant period. An example of such an award is attached as a separate document entitled, "Sample CJC Sub-Grant."

In addition to tracking and reporting on the required performance metrics, VT DOC will also allocate \$24,000 to hire an independent evaluator to design and implement a study to correlate the quality of the stakeholder relationships connected to a COSA and the offender's reentry success. Section H. Other- (\$25,000): VT DOC will work on developing an automated reporting system for use by CJCs and community partners to facilitate consistent, timely and broadly replicable data gathering and analysis capacity. We will allocate \$24,000 to the design and development of this valuable utility. Depending on the outcome of the design process, this expense may ultimately be incurred through an inter-agency agreement with a State IT systems developer or through the acquisition of a customizable pre-existing product. Given these potentialities, and a cost center representing less than 10% of the overall budget, we have itemized it in this budget category.

Lastly, the Reentry Task force will be convened by the Grant Coordinator on a quarterly basis at a total cost of \$1,000 to cover costs associated with room rental and refreshments.

VT DOC is confident that we have constructed a responsible, viable and efficient budget which will allow us to demonstrate the success of our strategy while providing a sustainable, evidence-based process for high risk offenders returning to our communities.

Key/Major Deliverables: 1) COSAs for 24 high risk offenders; 2) Independent evaluation. *Coordination Plans:* VT DOC identifies offenders assessed through validated instruments as being high risk, and who will be returning to a municipality with a Community Justice Center (CJC). CJC staff recruit and train at least three community volunteers to work with each offender in a COSA for at least one year. CJC staff also convenes a Case Conference every six weeks, bringing together an expanded set of professional and personal stakeholders in the offender's reentry process to share new information, address violations, discuss concerns, identify next steps, and celebrate successes. Through this process, pro-social relationships are developed which increase offender investment in the community and improve the public perception of those reentering, addressing the root causes of recidivism and fragmented services. This design allows us to maximize the synergy between our Offender Responsibility Plan case management process and the existing statewide capacity through municipal partnerships for citizen involvement in an evidence-based approach to reentry.

As Commissioner of the Vermont Department of Corrections, I respectfully request that the Attorney General waive the cash match requirement for our FY2010 Second Chance Act Adult Reentry Demonstration Project due to fiscal hardship.

Vermont, like other States, has been struggling with record revenue reductions over the last couple of years. It is projected Vermont will have a \$150 million dollar revenue shortfall in State Fiscal Year 2012, with 2013 being even larger.

Since State Fiscal Year 2008, the Department of Corrections has reduced its employment by 128 full time employees, which includes closing one correctional facility and retasking two other facilities. The department has been recently, one week ago, been instructed by our legislature to develop a plan to reduce our General Fund need by \$10 million.

Vermont Department of Corrections, along with our statewide reentry partners, has the human resources, experience and collective commitment to ensure the success and sustainability of this project. I am confident we will demonstrate a strategy that makes our communities safer while reducing the unaffordable costs associated with recidivism.
