Enclosed please find two (2) items that the Joint Fiscal Office has received from the administration.

JFO #2838 – \$24,000 grant from the National Park Service to the VT Dept. of Housing and Community Development. The grant funds will be used by the Department to create a geospatial map of the southern portion of Mount Independence State Historic Site. The map will contain visible historical features and be compared against other historical documents to assess the use of the southern side of the Mount in Revolutionary War engagements. [JFO received 8/3/16]

JFO #2839 - \$200,000 grant from various sources (see below) to the VT Dept. of Health. The funds will be used to develop and implement a physician-based "produce prescription program" in two Vermont counties. Patients who receive supplemental nutrition assistance program (SNAP) benefits will be given coupons by their physicians to buy fresh or frozen produce in participating local stores. The Department will evaluate the success of the program during the one-year funding period. Grantors are as follows:

8. Purpose of Grant:

The project seeks to create a comprehensive geospatial map of the southern (landward) portion of Mount Independence. It will build on work completed under previous grants from the South Lake Champlain Fund that facilitated initial identification and GPS point collection of visible features across the Mount. We propose to hire a consultant to use this initial data set to map all landward features with a total station and render these data in real space using Geographic Information Systems software. Once imputed, we propose to compare the data to historic maps and archives to assess their use in the engagements that occurred along that portion of the Mount during the Revolutionary War. This project focuses on a section of the battlefield that has not has received much scholarly attention, and will allow the State to provide long-term stewardship of these important resources.

9. Impact on existing program if grant is not Accepted:

This project is to continue the efforts of the archaeological walkovers that have been happening over the past decade. Should this grant not be accepted, this project will not go forward and the data collected from the walkovers will not be analyzed or available for research.

The Vermont Division for Historic Preservation (VDHP) respectfully requests approval to accept a grant from the National Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program. The funds will be used for the "Geospatial Mapping of the Landward Section of Mount Independence," one of VDHP's State-owned Historic Sites.

This project seeks to create a comprehensive geospatial map of the southern (landward) portion of Mount Independence. It will build on work completed under previous grants from the South Lake Champlain Fund that facilitated initial identification and GPS point collection of visible features across the Mount. We propose to hire a consultant to use this initial data set to map all landward features with a total station and render these data in real space using Geographic Information Systems software. Once imputed, we propose to compare the data to historic maps and archives to assess their use in the engagements that occurred along that portion of the Mount during the Revolutionary War. This project focuses on a section of the battlefield that has not has received much scholarly attention, and will allow the State to provide long-term stewardship of these important resources.

Mount Independence represents one of the largest defenses built by the Americans during the Revolutionary War, and was a critical site in the naval defense of Lake Champlain and points south. In the fall of 1776, the military complex represented one of the largest communities in North America, rivaling the population of Boston. Today, it contains remnants of the occupations and defensive fortifications of American, British, and German soldiers. Its current status as a State-owned Historic Site assures careful stewardship of the property; yet identification and accurate mapping of the resources are essential to the site's long-term preservation and interpretation. Mount Independence is a recognized National Historic Landmark.

Mount Independence is protected from development because it is a State-owned Historic Site, and the setting, feeling and association of the battlefield remain largely intact. Yet, a comprehensive inventory of visible features related to the Revolutionary War has never been completed for the southern portion of the Mount. Moreover, within the past decade, a rapid increase in energy generation and telecommunication projects on both sides of Lake Champlain suggests that similar projects may in the future adversely affect the integrity of the battlefield. Additionally, storms and icing combined with winter frost heaving and the sloping topography and shallow soils across much of the Mount have resulted in significant tree falls and related ground disturbance in recent years. This has caused the displacement of some archaeological features. Finally, despite a dedicated staff, looters often take advantage of the large site area and wooded topography to metal detect and dig, particularly in areas that are not clearly marked and delineated.

VDHP is grateful to the National Park Service and the American Battlefield Protection Program (ABPP) for this assistance, guidance, and support.
