I am pleased to inform you of the National Park Service's decision to award two grants to Vermont organizations. We look forward to assisting both organizations in their battlefield preservation efforts. The two grant projects are:

- Lake Champlain Maritime Museum is awarded \$36,608. The Museum has conducted
  extensive underwater archeology at this battlefield site through a previous ABPP grant,
  and will create a brochure that details the best practices of working with volunteer
  underwater archeologists.
- Vermont Division of Historic Preservation is awarded \$41,115 to document the Hubbardton battlefield using military terrain analysis, determine its boundaries, and produce digital maps.

The American Battlefield Protection Program (ABPP) provides assistance to organizations and agencies throughout the country in their efforts to preserve the significant battlefields from all wars fought on American soil. Projects funded by the ABPP grant program have no potential to cause effects to historic properties for purposes of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act in accordance with 36 CFR 800.3(a)(1). Therefore, this letter serves as notification that neither the National Park Service nor the grant recipients, have any further obligations under Section 106 or its implementing regulations. This year's grant awards include projects at battle sites from Indian Wars, Revolutionary War, War of 1812, Second Seminole War, Civil War, and World War II. The Division for Historic Preservation, Historic Sites Program has applied for and received a grant from the National Park Service, American Battlefield Protection Program to conduct property boundary survey, to digitally map the survey, and to conduct a military analysis of the terrain of the Hubbardton Battlefield State Historic Site in Hubbardton. In working with the County Forester on a site management plan, it became clear that the boundaries of the state-owned property were unclear and there were possible encroachments by adjoining property owners.



- How does this project contribute to the long-range goals for the site? As funding allows the VDHP has been systematically documenting and analyzing the history of the Hubbardton Battlefield, one of Vermont's first state-owned historic sites. The information is then used for better site stewardship and protection, and public programming and interpretation, which has increased greatly at the site over the past ten years (thus also is increasing attendance). In this case, the project information will be of great importance in preparation for the VDHP's response to the upcoming threat, will be used for the current land use planning, and the goal of designation of the battlefield as a National Historic Landmark. Information will also be used for programs and forthcoming interpretive efforts, including a projected trail open to the public along the old Hubbardton Military Road.
- 16. Why is the proposed project the most appropriate preservation action or strategy for this site at this time?

  This project is the next logical step in the process to evaluate, protect, and promote the Hubbardton Battlefield. The VDHP will be better prepared to protect the site in the upcoming environmental review process for the wind turbine project and expected view shed analysis if it has accurate information on the boundaries of state-owned land and more information about the battle in the Pittsford Ridge area. The information from this project will then be used to pursue National Historic Landmark designation. Accurate boundary lines also are necessary to complete the current land use plan being prepared for the VDHP's battlefield land by the VT Department of Fish and Wildlife.
- 17. What special factors contribute to the present opportunity for this project (e.g., personnel, timing, availability of matching funds, community support, or other unique circumstances)? The current threat to the nearly pristine setting of the battlefield is the catalyst for proposing the project. The VDHP receives limited state funding from year to year for the state historic sites, so the potential availability of this grant is opportune timing. The state sites program plans to tackle preservation opportunities and actions in a logical and orderly manner, as funding allows, to fulfill its mission of the protection, enhancement, and promotion of the sites and holding them in the public trust. The Hubbardton community and reenactors from all over the northeast and Canada have been particularly supportive of the site, particularly since the build up for the 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2002 and 230<sup>th</sup> in 2007.

The applicant and main property owner is the Vermont Division for Historic Preservation (VDHP), which is the State Historic Preservation Office. It has extensive experience with state funding for the office and state sites, annual National Park Service funding for its federal programs, and other NPS grants for state sites (including \$299,000 for trail construction at the Mount Independence State Historic Site). The VDHP regularly applies for and receives federal and state grants for its sites, including VT Agency of Transportation enhancement grants, Institute for Museum and Library Services (IMLS) grants, and a Save America's Treasures grant.

Elsa Gilbertson, the regional historic site administrator, has 24 years of professional historic preservation experience in the VDHP, including seven years as regional site administrator. She was project manager for the \$299,000 trail construction project at Mount Independence (see #19), and has applied for, received, and been project director for numerous other successful federal, state, and private grant projects, large and small, for the three state historic sites she manages. The most recent such grant is a two year \$250,000 Partnership for a Nation of Learners IMLS grant, with three official partners and a dozen supporting organizations.



- How does this project contribute to the long-range goals for the site? As funding allows the VDHP has been systematically documenting and analyzing the history of the Hubbardton Battlefield, one of Vermont's first state-owned historic sites. The information is then used for better site stewardship and protection, and public programming and interpretation, which has increased greatly at the site over the past ten years (thus also is increasing attendance). 

Clear boundaries will allow better protection of the site and a better and more accurate land management plan. 2) use the boundary survey information to do GIS mapping of the battlefield and its key features. 3) conduct a military evaluation of the battlefield terrain (using a KOCOA analysis—Key terrain, Obstacles, Cover and concealment, Observation and fields of fire, Avenues of approach and retreat), as recommend by the National Park Service Battlefield Protection Program to concur with the NPS core their significance and integrity. 4) Use the information developed for further interpretation efforts at the state historic site. This project and the information developed will be vital for the VDHP in its environmental review of the proposed wind turbine farm project on Pittsford Ridge (which would have a serious effect on the setting and integrity of the battlefield).
