Law Line specializes in advice, information, and brief services for low income Vermonters. Perhaps the most critical area we work in Is housing. Resources do not allow representation to all tenants in housing cases. Most tenants being evicted are pro se. Our research shows that pro se tenants do not succeed in eviction cases. They frequently default and are unable to present legitimate claims against landlords. We have developed several forms for tenants including answers, counterclaims, motions to dismiss, and motions to reopen default. The forms are not easy for pro se tenants to use. We want to use HotDocs with the A2J overlay to make the forms interactive and easier for low income tenants to use. This would strengthen our web site and help us empower tenants to protect their rights and preserve their housing.

Does the current grant(s) requsts build on knowledge or expertise gained from this **Grant?**

This grant introduced us to HotDocs and A2J software. It enabled us to develop expertise and knowledge in the use of these tools. This expertise and knowledge will be critical in the current project.

Lessons Learned from other Technology Projects

What other projects - either TIG or funded by another source - have sought to address this or similar issues?

This project will build on three other TIG funded projects. The first is the HotDocs server developed by Ohio Legal Services, The second is the Idaho Supreme Court/Legal Services partnership grant to develop HotDocs forms. The third is the Family Law Startup Kit developed by Capstone Practice Systems and funded by ? Legal Services.

How will the proposed project differ from and incorporate the lessons from those projects?

The HotDocs server developed by Ohio Legal Services is essential to our project. We will use the server to store our templates and make them available from our web site. There are many similarities between our project and the Idaho project. We have confered with Idaho court and staff to discuss our proposal. This was particularly important in working out governance issues and planning for long term sustainability. Although we have not yet tested the Family Law Startup Kit, we believe that it will jump start our family court form development project.

Executive Summary

This is a joint project between Law Line of Vermont and the Vermont Supreme Court, with support from Vermont Legal Aid and the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition. We propose to use A2J Author software to develop an interface for pro se litigants to create Family Court pleadings, in order to enable pro se litigants to easily create accurate forms to file in Court. We will contract with the Court to create the A2J Author templates from the 60 forms which are located on the Supreme Court web site. Law Line will be able to provide training, on going support, and overall management for the project. The templates initially will be used to generate paper forms using HotDocs, which can be printed and filed. Parallel to this project the Court will implement a new case management system that will be able to accept filings directly from A2J Author so that low income families will be able to enter their data over the web and file their case electronically. This will allow us to channel information and assistance to pro se litigants that focuses on their particular problem. Additionally, in the second phase, it will allow people to file pleadings quickly and easily from anywhere in Vermont.

PROJECT NARRATIVE LAW LINE OF VT/VT SUPREME COURT PARTNERSHIP FAMILY COURT FORMS DEVELOPMENT TIG 08043

Need for the Project

Law Line focuses on advice, information and brief service to clients. Most of our legal services are provided over the telephone. We do a large volume of brief service cases in family law and frequently help people fill out forms. The volume of requests for assistance with family law cases is very high. We only provide assistance to households who are below 125% of the federal poverty levels. In order to maintain the volume we need technological solutions that can provide focused information to pro se litigants and make our practice more efficient.

Each of Vermont's 14 counties has a Family Court. The Family Courts are responsible for all family related legal matters, including divorce, child custody, dissolution of civil unions, child support, and orders of protection for victims of domestic violence. The Chief Administrative Judge for all of Vermont's trial courts is the Hon. Amy Davenport. The Family Court has developed more than 60 forms for use by pro se litigants in family legal matters. These forms are available at the Pro Se Services Center of the judiciary's web site, www.vermontjudiciary.org. They are displayed as Adobe .pdf forms and many can be filled out on line, then printed, signed and filed. They do not provide instructions for users who are filling them out.

Family court staff and case managers provide information and assistance to pro se litigants throughout the State. Much of this assistance is focused on explaining the forms.

Law Line and Vermont Legal Aid have developed a very successful web site with steadily increasing usage. Our experience and recent studies have shown that some clients will not complete forms if they are required to download a copy of the blank form and fill it in by hand. Nor will they use instructions that are separate from the form itself. A guided, easier to understand form filling process is a much more successful strategy to help insure that the client will understand the forms, complete them accurately, and file them with the court. In addition, with guided interactive forms available, Law Line advocates will be able to work more efficiently, directing clients to work with the on-line forms and focusing the attorney's time on coaching, strategizing, and answering questions. Similarly, court staff and lay advocates at shelters will be better able to guide pro se litigants through the process.

We have reviewed many different document assembly systems. We feel confident that A2J Author is the flexible, easy to understand tool that will provide empowering information and knowledge to clients and help them file the pleadings they need to be heard in Family Court.

Project Goals and Objectives

The principal goal of this project is to make it easier for low income people to represent themselves effectively in Vermont's Family Court. This will increase the ability of attorneys to assist them effectively and allow legal services attorneys to focus on critical legal issues. The Vermont Family Court has developed approximately 60 forms that are available as Adobe pdf forms on their web site, www.vermontjudiciary.org. They include forms for in forma pauperis, relief from abuse actions, child support forms, divorce forms, enforcement forms, forms for legal separation and parentage, forms for establishing custody and visitation, and forms for the dissolution of a civil union. We will begin with the Family Law Startup Kit developed by Legal Semantics in an earlier TIG grant to Legal Aid of Western New York. We hope to create A2J Author templates for every form but will begin by prioritizing the forms to be created in case we are unable to write all of the forms.

Creating the A2J Author templates is the first part of a larger strategy. When the forms are complete they will be used to generate pleadings from the NPADO server, linked from our web site, www.vtlawhelp.org. The grant will also create essential expertise in Vermont, at the Court as well as in legal services, for continuing the development of A2J Author templates in other areas. The Court is particularly eager to move forward on this in Probate Court, evictions, foreclosures, and Small Claims Court.

The availability of A2J Author templates also is an important step toward creating pro se service centers in Vermont courthouses and increasing the ability of court staff to provide assistance to litigants. This will allow us to focus resources more effectively to help pro se litigants.

Finally, the A2J Author templates will move the courts toward electronic filing in a way that will not jeopardize the ability of low income litigants who do not have lawyers to access the court system. The Court is currently receiving bids on a new case management system that will enable it to be more efficient and will allow it to accept electronic data and create cases. This step will require creating a transform to take the A2J Author data and convert it to the court's data, but this does not appear to be a major hurdle.

The Vermont Court has made a significant commitment to use the TIG grant to start this process and carry it forward to better pro se assistance and electronic filing.

State Justice Community Partnerships

The Vermont Supreme Court and the Office of the Court Administrator are the principal administrative managers for all state courts. They will be part of the advisory committee that will be guiding this project. They are committed to the sustainability of this effort as well. Attached to this application are letters from Hon. John Dooley, Associate Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court, Hon. Denise Johnson, Associate Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court, and Lee Suskin, Vermont Court Administrator. Justice Dooley is Chair of the Court Technology Committee, which developed and is implementing a plan for electronic filing in the Vermont

courts. He has written extensively on legal services and poverty law and has worked extensively to develop legal services in post Soviet Eastern Europe. Justice Johnson is a member of the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition and of the ABA Commission on IOLTA. She has written extensively on access to justice issues.

Vermont Legal Aid, a state wide legal services organization, will also partner with us and take part in the advisory group. They will also provide technical support.

Law Line is a member of the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition. Other charter members are the Vermont Supreme Court, the Vermont Bar Foundation, the Vermont Law School, Vermont Legal Aid and the Vermont Bar Foundation. The Vermont Access to Justice Coalition is also a supporter of this project and will assist in oversight. The Access to Justice Coalition brings together members of the Vermont Supreme Court, the Vermont Bar Association, the Vermont Bar Foundation, the Vermont Law School Legal Clinic, Vermont Legal Aid and Law Line of Vermont. The Coalition was created in January 2004 with four principle goals: to increase public awareness of and support for civil legal assistance in Vermont; to promote cooperation, effectiveness and efficiency in expanding access to justice; to expand participation by the private bar in pro bono efforts; and to increase services and funding available for civil access to justice.

Finally, this project will be assisted by Kate Bladow at the National Document Assembly Project.

Replication

This project will build on the work of the Family Law Startup Kit, developed by Legal Semantics in an earlier TIG grant. A2J Author is well tested and widely used. Our project will continue work done by others and support continuing efforts in this area.

We have discussed the project with several others including the Idaho Supreme Court, ProBono.net, and A2J Author software. There is significant interest in creating the ability to link A2J data to a court case management system and thereby enable electronic filing for pro se litigants.

It has long been assumed that courts need to integrate form development and assistance with electronic filing. We intend to accomplish this. It will require solving some problems, such as how to enable the A2J Author software to communicate with a court case management system and how to provide a paper record for litigants using an electronic filing system. Solving these problems will enable significant improvements in the ability to understand and navigate the court system.

This technology will offer a workable, affordable solution to problems faced by every court system in the country. A critical part of this grant is to develop the understanding, knowledge and expertise in Vermont to sustain this project and enable us to carry it forward on our own, beyond family law, to the other courts and areas of practice in Vermont, as well as to share what we learn with other states engaged in similar projects.

Program Capacity and Project Staffing

Tom Garrett, Executive Director of Law Line of Vermont, will be responsible for supervising the project, documenting the work, and reporting on progress toward milestones. Laura Bierley, Web Content Coordinator at Law Line, will also provide assistance including editing and review of scripts.

Law Line has received several TIG grants and is currently completing a HotDocs/A2J grant in which we created five eviction templates for tenants. We will begin to make these forms available to Vermonters within a couple of weeks. We worked with Capstone Practice to create these templates. This work has allowed us to develop the expertise in HotDocs and A2J Author that will carry us to this larger project. Now that we have tested the software we are convinced of its value.

The Court will engage a full time staff person to work on this. Supervision of the person will be provided by Sandra Seidel, a senior administrative person at the court administrator's office. Overall supervision at the Court will be provided by the Hon. Amy Davenport, Chief Administrative Judge for the Vermont Courts.

Feasibility

This project builds on our earlier project and on work done by Capstone Practice, NPADO, Chicago-Kent Law School, and Idaho Legal Services. We have had thorough consultations with these organizations and with Marc Lauritsen of Capstone Practice, who has written several articles on electronic filing and document assembly. We have also discussed this with Judges and administrative staff who carried out a similar project in Idaho, and with other court staff in Western Missouri and Florida. We have reviewed this with technology specialists in the Vermont Courts. We are convinced that this project is affordable, feasible and practical.



WHAT IS LAW LINE?



We seek funding to continue to offer online courses nationally and to enable us to enact our three-and five-year growth plans with the goal of increasing online course enrollments by at least twenty percent annually, serving 50 legal aid professionals in 2006.

Law Line specializes in advice, information, and brief services for low Income Vermonters. Perhaps the most critical area we work in Is housing. Resources do not allow representation to all tenants in housing cases. Most tenants being evicted are pro se. Our research shows that pro se tenants do not succeed in eviction cases. They frequently default and are unable to present legitimate claims against landlords. We have developed several forms for tenants including answers, counterclaims, motions to dismiss, and motions to reopen default. The forms are not easy for pro se tenants to use. We want to use HotDocs with the A2J overlay to make the forms interactive and easier for low income tenants to use. This would strengthen our web site and help us empower tenants to protect their rights and preserve their housing.

Does the current grant(s) requsts build on knowledge or expertise gained from this **Grant?**

This grant introduced us to HotDocs and A2J software. It enabled us to develop expertise and knowledge in the use of these tools. This expertise and knowledge will be critical in the current project.

Lessons Learned from other Technology Projects

What other projects - either TIG or funded by another source - have sought to address this or similar issues?

This project will build on three other TIG funded projects. The first is the HotDocs server developed by Ohio Legal Services. The second is the Idaho Supreme Court/Legal Services partnership grant to develop HotDocs forms. The third is the Family Law Startup Kit developed by Capstone Practice Systems and funded by ? Legal Services.

How will the proposed project differ from and incorporate the lessons from those projects?

The HotDocs server developed by Ohio Legal Services is essential to our project. We will use the server to store our templates and make them available from our web site. There are many similarities between our project and the Idaho project. We have confered with Idaho court and staff to discuss our proposal. This was particularly important in working out governance issues and planning for long term sustainability. Although we have not yet tested the Family Law Startup Kit, we believe that it will jump start our family court form development project.

Executive Summary

This is a joint project between Law Line of Vermont and the Vermont Supreme Court, with support from Vermont Legal Ald and the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition. We propose to use A2J Author software to develop an interface for pro se litigants to create Family Court pleadings, in order to enable pro se litigants to easily create accurate forms to file in Court. We will contract with the Court to create the A2J Author templates from the 60 forms which are located on the Supreme Court web site. Law Line will be able to provide training, on going support, and overall management for the project. The templates initially will be used to generate paper forms using HotDocs, which can be printed and filed. Parallel to this project the Court will implement a new case management system that will be able to accept filings directly from A2J Author so that low income families will be able to enter their data over the web and file their case electronically. This will allow us to channel information and assistance to pro se litigants that focuses on their particular problem. Additionally, in the second phase, it will allow people to file pleadings quickly and easily from anywhere in Vermont.

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

Need for the Project

Law Line focuses on advice, information and brief service to clients. Most of our legal services are provided over the telephone. We do a large volume of brief service cases in family law and frequently help people fill out forms. The volume of requests for assistance with family law cases is very high. We only provide assistance to households who are below 125% of the federal poverty levels. In order to maintain the volume we need technological solutions that can provide focused information to pro se litigants and make our practice more efficient.

Each of Vermont's 14 counties has a Family Court. The Family Courts are responsible for all family related legal matters, including divorce, child custody, dissolution of civil unions, child support, and orders of protection for victims of domestic violence. The Chief Administrative Judge for all of Vermont's trial courts is the Hon. Amy Davenport. The Family Court has developed more than 60 forms for use by pro se litigants in family legal matters. These forms are available at the Pro Se Services Center of the judiciary's web site, www.vermontjudiciary.org. They are displayed as Adobe .pdf forms and many can be filled out on line, then printed, signed and filed. They do not provide instructions for users who are filling them out.

Family court staff and case managers provide information and assistance to pro se litigants throughout the State. Much of this assistance is focused on explaining the forms.

Law Line and Vermont Legal Aid have developed a very successful web site with steadily increasing usage. Our experience and recent studies have shown that some clients will not complete forms if they are required to download a copy of the blank form and fill it in by hand. Nor will they use instructions that are separate from the form itself. A guided, easier to understand form filling process is a much more successful strategy to help insure that the client will understand the forms, complete them accurately, and file them with the court. In addition, with guided interactive forms available, Law Line advocates will be able to work more efficiently, directing clients to work with the on-line forms and focusing the attorney's time on coaching, strategizing, and answering questions. Similarly, court staff and lay advocates at shelters will be better able to guide pro se litigants through the process.

We have reviewed many different document assembly systems. We feel confident that A2J Author is the flexible, easy to understand tool that will provide empowering information and knowledge to clients and help them file the pleadings they need to be heard in Family Court.

Project Goals and Objectives

The principal goal of this project is to make it easier for low income people to represent themselves effectively in Vermont's Family Court. This will increase the ability of attorneys to assist them effectively and allow legal services attorneys to focus on critical legal issues. The Vermont Family Court has developed approximately 60 forms that are available as Adobe pdf forms on their web site, www.vermontjudiciary.org. They include forms for in forma pauperis, relief from abuse actions, child support forms, divorce forms, enforcement forms, forms for legal separation and parentage, forms for establishing custody and visitation, and forms for the dissolution of a civil union. We will begin with the Family Law Startup Kit developed by Legal Semantics in an earlier TIG grant to Legal Aid of Western New York. We hope to create A2J Author templates for every form but will begin by prioritizing the forms to be created in case we are unable to write all of the forms.

Creating the A2J Author templates is the first part of a larger strategy. When the forms are complete they will be used to generate pleadings from the NPADO server, linked from our web site, www.vtlawhelp.org. The grant will also create essential expertise in Vermont, at the Court as well as in legal services, for continuing the development of A2J Author templates in other areas. The Court is particularly eager to move forward on this in Probate Court, evictions, foreclosures, and Small Claims Court.

The availability of A2J Author templates also is an important step toward creating pro se service centers in Vermont courthouses and increasing the ability of court staff to provide assistance to litigants. This will allow us to focus resources more effectively to help pro se litigants.

Finally, the A2J Author templates will move the courts toward electronic filing in a way that will not jeopardize the ability of low income litigants who do not have lawyers to access the court system. The Court is currently receiving bids on a new case management system that will enable it to be more efficient and will allow it to accept electronic data and create cases. This step will require creating a transform to take the A2J Author data and convert it to the court's data, but this does not appear to be a major hurdle.

The Vermont Court has made a significant commitment to use the TIG grant to start this process and carry it forward to better pro se assistance and electronic filing.

State Justice Community Partnerships

The Vermont Supreme Court and the Office of the Court Administrator are the principal administrative managers for all state courts. They will be part of the advisory committee that will be guiding this project. They are committed to the sustainability of this effort as well. Attached to this application are letters from Hon. John Dooley, Associate Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court, Hon. Denise Johnson, Associate Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court, and Lee Suskin, Vermont Court Administrator. Justice Dooley is Chair of the Court Technology Committee, which developed and is implementing a plan for electronic filing in the Vermont

courts. He has written extensively on legal services and poverty law and has worked extensively to develop legal services in post Soviet Eastern Europe. Justice Johnson is a member of the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition and of the ABA Commission on IOLTA. She has written extensively on access to justice issues.

Vermont Legal Aid, a state wide legal services organization, will also partner with us and take part in the advisory group. They will also provide technical support.

Law Line is a member of the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition. Other charter members are the Vermont Supreme Court, the Vermont Bar Foundation, the Vermont Law School, Vermont Legal Aid and the Vermont Bar Foundation. The Vermont Access to Justice Coalition is also a supporter of this project and will assist in oversight. The Access to Justice Coalition brings together members of the Vermont Supreme Court, the Vermont Bar Association, the Vermont Bar Foundation, the Vermont Law School Legal Clinic, Vermont Legal Aid and Law Line of Vermont. The Coalition was created in January 2004 with four principle goals: to increase public awareness of and support for civil legal assistance in Vermont; to promote cooperation, effectiveness and efficiency in expanding access to justice; to expand participation by the private bar in pro bono efforts; and to increase services and funding available for civil access to justice.

Finally, this project will be assisted by Kate Bladow at the National Document Assembly Project.

Replication

This project will build on the work of the Family Law Startup Kit, developed by Legal Semantics in an earlier TIG grant. A2J Author is well tested and widely used. Our project will continue work done by others and support continuing efforts in this area.

We have discussed the project with several others including the Idaho Supreme Court, ProBono.net, and A2J Author software. There is significant interest in creating the ability to link A2J data to a court case management system and thereby enable electronic filing for pro se litigants.

It has long been assumed that courts need to integrate form development and assistance with electronic filing. We intend to accomplish this. It will require solving some problems, such as how to enable the A2J Author software to communicate with a court case management system and how to provide a paper record for litigants using an electronic filing system. Solving these problems will enable significant improvements in the ability to understand and navigate the court system.

This technology will offer a workable, affordable solution to problems faced by every court system in the country. A critical part of this grant is to develop the understanding, knowledge and expertise in Vermont to sustain this project and enable us to carry it forward on our own, beyond family law, to the other courts and areas of practice in Vermont, as well as to share what we learn with other states engaged in similar projects.

Program Capacity and Project Staffing

Tom Garrett, Executive Director of Law Line of Vermont, will be responsible for supervising the project, documenting the work, and reporting on progress toward milestones. Laura Bierley, Web Content Coordinator at Law Line, will also provide assistance including editing and review of scripts.

Law Line has received several TIG grants and is currently completing a HotDocs/A2J grant in which we created five eviction templates for tenants. We will begin to make these forms available to Vermonters within a couple of weeks. We worked with Capstone Practice to create these templates. This work has allowed us to develop the expertise in HotDocs and A2J Author that will carry us to this larger project. Now that we have tested the software we are convinced of its value.

The Court will engage a full time staff person to work on this. Supervision of the person will be provided by Sandra Seidel, a senior administrative person at the court administrator's office. Overall supervision at the Court will be provided by the Hon. Amy Davenport, Chief Administrative Judge for the Vermont Courts.

Feasibility

This project builds on our earlier project and on work done by Capstone Practice, NPADO, Chicago-Kent Law School, and Idaho Legal Services. We have had thorough consultations with these organizations and with Marc Lauritsen of Capstone Practice, who has written several articles on electronic filing and document assembly. We have also discussed this with Judges and administrative staff who carried out a similar project in Idaho, and with other court staff in Western Missouri and Florida. We have reviewed this with technology specialists in the Vermont Courts. We are convinced that this project is affordable, feasible and practical.

Law Line specializes in advice, information, and brief services for low Income Vermonters. Perhaps the most critical area we work in is housing. Resources do not allow representation to all tenants in housing cases. Most tenants being evicted are pro se. Our research shows that pro se tenants do not succeed in eviction cases. They frequently default and are unable to present legitimate claims against landlords. We have developed several forms for tenants including answers, counterclaims, motions to dismiss, and motions to reopen default. The forms are not easy for pro se tenants to use. We want to use HotDocs with the A2J overlay to make the forms interactive and easier for low income tenants to use. This would strengthen our web site and help us empower tenants to protect their rights and preserve their housing.

Lessons Learned from other Technology Projects

What other projects - either TIG or funded by another source - have sought to address this or similar issues?

This project will build on three other TIG funded projects. The first is the HotDocs server developed by Ohlo Legal Services. The second is the Idaho Supreme Court/Legal Services partnership grant to develop HotDocs forms. The third is the Family Law Startup Kit developed by Capstone Practice Systems and funded by ? Legal Services.

How will the proposed project differ from and incorporate the lessons from those projects?

The HotDocs server developed by Ohio Legal Services is essential to our project. We will use the server to store our templates and make them available from our web site. There are many similarities between our project and the Idaho project. We have confered with Idaho court and staff to discuss our proposal. This was particularly important in working out governance issues and planning for long term sustainability. Although we have not yet tested the Family Law Startup Kit, we believe that it will jump start our family court form development project.

Executive Summary

This is a joint project between Law Line of Vermont and the Vermont Supreme Court, with support from Vermont Legal Ald and the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition. We propose to use A2J Author software to develop an interface for pro se litigants to create Family Court pleadings, in order to enable pro se litigants to easily create accurate forms to file in Court. We will contract with the Court to create the A2J Author templates from the 60 forms which are located on the Supreme Court web site. Law Line will be able to provide training, on going support, and overall management for the project. The templates initially will be used to generate paper forms using HotDocs, which can be printed and filed. Parallel to this project the Court will implement a new case management system that will be able to accept filings directly from A2J Author so that low income families will be able to enter their data over the web and file their case electronically. This will allow us to channel information and assistance to pro se litigants that focuses on their particular problem. Additionally, in the second phase, it will allow people to file pleadings quickly and easily from anywhere in Vermont.

Need for the Project

Law Line focuses on advice, information and brief service to clients. Most of our legal services are provided over the telephone. We do a large volume of brief service cases in family law and frequently help people fill out forms. The volume of requests for assistance with family law cases is very high. We only provide assistance to households who are below 125% of the federal poverty levels. In order to maintain the volume we need technological solutions that can provide focused information to pro se litigants and make our practice more efficient.

Each of Vermont's 14 counties has a Family Court. The Family Courts are responsible for all family related legal matters, including divorce, child custody, dissolution of civil unions, child support, and orders of protection for victims of domestic violence. The Chief Administrative Judge for all of Vermont's trial courts is the Hon. Amy Davenport. The Family Court has developed more than 60 forms for use by pro se litigants in family legal matters. These forms are available at the Pro Se Services Center of the judiciary's web site, www.vermontjudiciary.org. They are displayed as Adobe .pdf forms and many can be filled out on line, then printed, signed and filed. They do not provide instructions for users who are filling them out.

Family court staff and case managers provide information and assistance to pro se litigants throughout the State. Much of this assistance is focused on explaining the forms.

Law Line and Vermont Legal Aid have developed a very successful web site with steadily increasing usage. Our experience and recent studies have shown that some clients will not complete forms if they are required to download a copy of the blank form and fill it in by hand. Nor will they use instructions that are separate from the form itself. A guided, easier to understand form filling process is a much more successful strategy to help insure that the client will understand the forms, complete them accurately, and file them with the court. In addition, with guided interactive forms available, Law Line advocates will be able to work more efficiently, directing clients to work with the on-line forms and focusing the attorney's time on coaching, strategizing, and answering questions. Similarly, court staff and lay advocates at shelters will be better able to guide pro se litigants through the process.

We have reviewed many different document assembly systems. We feel confident that A2J Author is the flexible, easy to understand tool that will provide empowering information and knowledge to clients and help them file the pleadings they need to be heard in Family Court.

Project Goals and Objectives

The principal goal of this project is to make it easier for low income people to represent themselves effectively in Vermont's Family Court. This will increase the ability of attorneys to assist them effectively and allow legal services attorneys to focus on critical legal issues. The Vermont Family Court has developed approximately 60 forms that are available as Adobe pdf forms on their web site, www.vermontjudiciary.org. They include forms for in forma pauperis, relief from abuse actions, child support forms, divorce forms, enforcement forms, forms for legal separation and parentage, forms for establishing custody and visitation, and forms for the dissolution of a civil union. We will begin with the Family Law Startup Kit developed by Legal Semantics in an earlier TIG grant to Legal Aid of Western New York. We hope to create A2J Author templates for every form but will begin by prioritizing the forms to be created in case we are unable to write all of the forms.

Creating the A2J Author templates is the first part of a larger strategy. When the forms are complete they will be used to generate pleadings from the NPADO server, linked from our web site, www.vtlawhelp.org. The grant will also create essential expertise in Vermont, at the Court as well as in legal services, for continuing the development of A2J Author templates in other areas. The Court is particularly eager to move forward on this in Probate Court, evictions, foreclosures, and Small Claims Court.

The availability of A2J Author templates also is an important step toward creating pro se service centers in Vermont courthouses and increasing the ability of court staff to provide assistance to litigants. This will allow us to focus resources more effectively to help pro se litigants.

Finally, the A2J Author templates will move the courts toward electronic filing in a way that will not jeopardize the ability of low income litigants who do not have lawyers to access the court system. The Court is currently receiving bids on a new case management system that will enable it to be more efficient and will allow it to accept electronic data and create cases. This step will require creating a transform to take the A2J Author data and convert it to the court's data, but this does not appear to be a major hurdle.

The Vermont Court has made a significant commitment to use the TIG grant to start this process and carry it forward to better pro se assistance and electronic filing.

State Justice Community Partnerships

The Vermont Supreme Court and the Office of the Court Administrator are the principal administrative managers for all state courts. They will be part of the advisory committee that will be guiding this project. They are committed to the sustainability of this effort as well.

Attached to this application are letters from Hon. John Dooley, Associate Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court, Hon. Denise Johnson, Associate Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court, and Lee Suskin, Vermont Court Administrator. Justice Dooley is Chair of the Court Technology Committee, which developed and is implementing a plan for electronic filing in the Vermont

courts. He has written extensively on legal services and poverty law and has worked extensively to develop legal services in post Soviet Eastern Europe. Justice Johnson is a member of the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition and of the ABA Commission on IOLTA. She has written extensively on access to justice issues.

Vermont Legal Aid, a state wide legal services organization, will also partner with us and take part in the advisory group. They will also provide technical support.

Law Line is a member of the Vermont Access to Justice Coalition. Other charter members are the Vermont Supreme Court, the Vermont Bar Foundation, the Vermont Law School, Vermont Legal Aid and the Vermont Bar Foundation. The Vermont Access to Justice Coalition is also a supporter of this project and will assist in oversight. The Access to Justice Coalition brings together members of the Vermont Supreme Court, the Vermont Bar Association, the Vermont Bar Foundation, the Vermont Law School Legal Clinic, Vermont Legal Aid and Law Line of Vermont. The Coalition was created in January 2004 with four principle goals: to increase public awareness of and support for civil legal assistance in Vermont; to promote cooperation, effectiveness and efficiency in expanding access to justice; to expand participation by the private bar in pro bono efforts; and to increase services and funding available for civil access to justice.

Finally, this project will be assisted by Kate Bladow at the National Document Assembly Project.

Replication

This project will build on the work of the Family Law Startup Kit, developed by Legal Semantics in an earlier TIG grant. A2J Author is well tested and widely used. Our project will continue work done by others and support continuing efforts in this area.

We have discussed the project with several others including the Idaho Supreme Court, ProBono.net, and A2J Author software. There is significant interest in creating the ability to link A2J data to a court case management system and thereby enable electronic filing for pro se litigants.

It has long been assumed that courts need to integrate form development and assistance with electronic filing. We intend to accomplish this. It will require solving some problems, such as how to enable the A2J Author software to communicate with a court case management system and how to provide a paper record for litigants using an electronic filing system. Solving these problems will enable significant improvements in the ability to understand and navigate the court system.

This technology will offer a workable, affordable solution to problems faced by every court system in the country. A critical part of this grant is to develop the understanding, knowledge and expertise in Vermont to sustain this project and enable us to carry it forward on our own, beyond family law, to the other courts and areas of practice in Vermont, as well as to share what we learn with other states engaged in similar projects.

Program Capacity and Project Staffing

Tom Garrett, Executive Director of Law Line of Vermont, will be responsible for supervising the project, documenting the work, and reporting on progress toward milestones. Laura Bierley, Web Content Coordinator at Law Line, will also provide assistance including editing and review of scripts.

Law Line has received several TIG grants and is currently completing a HotDocs/A2J grant in which we created five eviction templates for tenants. We will begin to make these forms available to Vermonters within a couple of weeks. We worked with Capstone Practice to create these templates. This work has allowed us to develop the expertise in HotDocs and A2J Author that will carry us to this larger project. Now that we have tested the software we are convinced of its value.

The Court will engage a full time staff person to work on this. Supervision of the person will be provided by Sandra Seidel, a senior administrative person at the court administrator's office. Overall supervision at the Court will be provided by the Hon. Amy Davenport, Chief Administrative Judge for the Vermont Courts.

Feasibility

This project builds on our earlier project and on work done by Capstone Practice, NPADO, Chicago-Kent Law School, and Idaho Legal Services. We have had thorough consultations with these organizations and with Marc Lauritsen of Capstone Practice, who has written several articles on electronic filing and document assembly. We have also discussed this with Judges and administrative staff who carried out a similar project in Idaho, and with other court staff in Western Missouri and Florida. We have reviewed this with technology specialists in the Vermont Courts. We are convinced that this project is affordable, feasible and practical.



This is a key part of our plan to help pro selltigants in Vermont as we move toward a stronger web presence, more focused assistance for court users, and electronic filing. This project will enable us to help more Vermonters who are representing themselves in our Family Courts.

Our most recent data shows that more than 70% of the litigants in Family Court are not represented by an attorney. We have taken many steps to make sure that Family Courts are open to everyone and that court staff provide the right help to those who need help. Similarly, Law, Line of Vermont focuses attention on pro se litigants with the same goal in mind, to ensure necess to justice for all Vermonters.

We are beginning the process of developing a new, comprehensive case management system for the Vermont courts. Documents Online (NPADO) system. After reviewing what is available we have decided that the A2J Author software offers the flexibility, ease of use, and clarity that we want along with the ability to provide extensive help on-line. We are convinced that it will greatly increase our ability to serve the needs of all Vermonters, including most directly those who cannot afford a lawyer.

I am pleased to support Legal Services Law Line of Vermont's application for funding to support a Court/Law Line project to develop Family Court templates using A2J Author software.

Our most recent data shows that more than 70% of the litigants in Family Court are not represented by an attorney. Although we have taken many steps to ensure that Family Courts are open to everyone and that court staff provide the right help to those who need it, we cannot provide pro se service centers in every Family Court venue. The only practical and efficient way to reach the many small venues spread across our rural state is to use technology to do it. Law Line of Vermont, which focuses attention on pro se litigants, has already been a leader in using technology to promote services to pro se litigants. By joining with Law Line in the A2J project, we hope to further both of our goals to casus access to justice for all Vermonters.

I have been working on access to justice issues here at the Court since my appointment in 1990, and have been the Supreme Court's representative on the Access to Justice Coalition since its founding. The Access to Justice Coalition grew out of the work of another committee that I co-chaired that undertook a legal needs study. The Coalition has focused on the recommendations of that study to increase resources for legal services, increase services for pro-se litigants, and increase pro-bono services by lawyers. Thus, a key part of our mission is to strengthen support for pro-se litigants. Our goal is to create an electronic pro-se services center, but one that will be consonant with the Court's long-range goal of moving to electronic filing. The A2J project will allow the court to expand services toward the services center model, and yet take full advantage of the technology that we expect to have in the near future.

We see this grant as an opportunity to substantially advance our services to prose litigants in Family Court. The Court is fully committed to this project. We accept our responsibility to

WHAT IS LAW LINE?

Law Line is a non-profit legal services law firm, established in 1996, that provides free consultation, advice, and community education for low income Vermonters. We are supported by a grant from the <u>Legal Services Corporation</u> in Washington, D.C. We are available by telephone to any low income Vermonter with a civil legal problem. Law Line's cases are referred by <u>Vermont Legal Aid</u> who can be reached toll free from anywhere in Vermont by calling 1-800-889-2047.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION AND REFERRALS

In addition to counsel and advice, Law Line provides information, workshops, training, and referrals for low income Vermonters. Where possible, we try to connect a client with a full service attorney through the <u>Vermont Volunteer Lawyers Project</u>, the <u>South Royalton Legal Clinic</u>, <u>Vermont Legal Aid</u>, or Vermont Protection & Advocacy.

OUR PHILOSOPHY

Law Line believes that people are often best helped when given the support, assistance and information they need to help themselves. In other words, people can get power in their lives by learning how to handle some legal problems on their own.

Law Line attorneys and paralegals help people represent themselves by learning the facts, explaining the law, helping with paperwork, and discussing the best strategies for winning.
